Once again Northern Districts navigated a challenging 12 months extremely well, but it is fitting to open the report by acknowledging the hard work that went into the successful launch of the Northern Brave.

Once again Northern Districts navigated a challenging 12 months extremely well, but it is fitting to open the report by acknowledging the hard work that went into the successful launch of the Northern Brave.

The combined branding of Northern District's T20 sides saw both male and female teams playing under the same brand in the Dream11 Super Smash, and was an obvious highlight.

The behind the scenes efforts from Morgan Seifert and Charlotte Twigg to launch a new brand during lockdown did not go unnoticed and despite the inability to bring people together physically they were able to successfully roll this out online.

Northern Districts is the only Major Association to take this historical step and we believe this displays our commitment to Play our Way. This step forward was supported by success on the pitch with our men winning the Dream11 Super Smash in a pulsating final at Seddon Park.

Our world-class grounds were beamed across the globe during the ICC Women's Cricket World Cup. Seddon Park and Bay Oval hosted countless magical moments and special performances throughout 14 matches of the global event held under trying circumstances.

Our own Brooke Halliday was among the WHITE FERNS who helped elevate the positioning of women's cricket in New Zealand, and this continued with her selection in the historic team that attended the Commonwealth Games in Birmingham, the first-time women's cricket was included in the programme.

These achievements set a platform for the ground-breaking announcement that saw the men's and women's professional environments combined in under one new master agreement.

The five-year deal sees the WHITE FERNS and domestic women's players receiving the same match fees as the men across all their formats and competitions with the increased resourcing of the domestic game a key focus of the negotiations which Northern Districts played a key role in.

We have been advocating for pay equity for our women cricketers for many years and we are obviously thrilled with the massive step change this new master agreement presents. This a positive step towards more equitable outcomes for women's cricket, but there is always more to do.

Increasing professionalism in women's sports increases visibility and will hopefully encourage more women and girls to pursue a sporting career. While this is an amazing moment for women in cricket, it's important to note the challenge to achieving pay equity exists in many other codes and hopefully this move may act as a catalyst for change. Fundamentally, it's about women athletes being recognised, valued, and treated equally.

The new domestic contracts are positioned as a secondary work commitment with restricted obligations.

We believe it is a responsible step to acknowledge that cricket won't be a fulltime occupation for our domestic players, but the new agreement means we are able to pay our players for when they are cricketers with ND, and enable them to retain full-time employment, family, or study commitments.

COVID-19 ravaged our Plunket Shield campaign, with a record seven debutants lining up in the final match of the season broadening the base of male first-class cricketers in our Association.

Prior to this, Jeet Raval and Bharat Popli combined for a mammoth 334-run partnership, the largest for any wicket in any format ever for Northern Districts. Raval finished with 209 and Popli 150.

In the Hallyburton Johnstone Shield our women missed out on the final by net run rate, a tough result to take but we are sure the players will learn from the experience.

It was a phenomenal summer of cricket for all-rounder Nensi Patel, awarded with the Nicola Browne Medal for Female Player of the Year at the Northern Districts awards and named Women's Domestic Player of the Year at the ANZ New Zealand Cricket Awards, she was also awarded her first WHITE FERNS contract for the 2022-23 season.

Elsewhere, BLACKCAPS bowler Tim Southee was awarded the NZ Cricket supreme award, the Sir Richard Hadlee Medal, based on his sheer consistency throughout the summer, at home and abroad, in red and white ball cricket and continuing Northern Districts dominance of this award in recent years.

There was continued recognition at national level with Counties Manukau Cricket, alongside volunteers Karminder Thiara, Daman Kohli, Balpreet Singh and Pankaj Kumar winning the best diversity and inclusion initiative at the same awards with the “Counties Manukau Premier League” (CMPL) project.

Umpiring standards continue to improve with 65 active umpires across the region, including Brendon Davis who was named Official of the Year at the NZ Cricket Awards

Our people continue to be recognised at international level with six Northern Districts staff recognised at international level including Graeme Aldridge, Jo Broadbent, Dean Brownlie, Rob Nicol, Cory Miles, and BJ Watling.

All three international venues in the region hosted Dream 11 Super Smash matches, although Cobham Oval was affected by changing alert levels that impacted on public attendance. However, regardless of the fans inside the grounds, the staff continue to deliver three world class grounds.

This level of presentation is also emulated by the facilities around the region including St. Paul's Collegiate, Owen Delany Park, Weymouth Oval and Harry Barker Oval with the grounds staff, councils, trust, employees and volunteers all to be congratulated for their efforts.

Once again our partners have stood by us through another challenging season despite the limited experiences we were able to deliver. We are hopeful that the difficulties of the past two seasons are behind us and we can return to cricket as we remember for the upcoming season.

Our funders, in particular NZC, Grassroots Trust, The Lion Foundation and NZCT provide significant revenue that is used to support the growth and delivery of the game and allow us to achieve our purpose of Connecting People, Creating Memories.

This unwavering support has meant that ND recorded its ninth consecutive surplus in FY22.

Brent Harvey stood down from the ND Board in December last year but has remained connected with ND Cricket despite moving out of the region. This year we farewell former Chair Paul Heath and Renika Siciliano and we thank the trio for their contributions to the Board during their time in office and we are sure they will continue to support ND Cricket.

The Board also wishes to thank the staff at Northern Districts Cricket for the hard work in continuing to deliver on the five strategic objectives: Boots on the Ground, Grass to Fern, One Club, Two Teams, Spaces and Places and Our People.

Finally, we acknowledge the entire cricket community including members, supporters, parents, coaches, managers, scorers, umpires, and schoolteachers and without you we don't have a game.

# PERFORMANCE & TALENT REPORT

There's no doubt that the 2021-22 season was no ordinary one for our Performance and Talent Programmes.

From the excitement of launching the Northern Brave and rolling out our new Regional Academy model; to the challenges of managing our way through a global pandemic; and finally, to the huge high of winning the men's Dream11 Super Smash – it has definitely been a unique year!

It feels appropriate to acknowledge the tremendous efforts of all our players and staff during a complicated and challenging season.

To our playing groups, thank you for the professionalism and flexibility shown throughout the season. From online meetings, to showing creativity training whilst stuck at home, following strict COVID-19 protocols at the various alert levels, to the challenges of unavailability due to lockdowns or isolation; it has been very difficult to prepare and play under such unique circumstances, but you have all been a credit to yourselves and ND in the way you have carried yourselves and competed. We have seen some outstanding team and individual performances over the season that has made the entire organisation proud.

To our wider Performance and Talent staff, a massive thank you for your significant efforts over the last year. To coordinate and deliver what you have under the circumstances described above has been phenomenal. A special acknowledgment to Paul Head, our Performance Physiotherapist, who has done an amazing job managing and leading on all our COVID-19 protocols over the season.

There's no doubt in my mind that our successes and what we deliver is down to the skills, commitment and passion of our staff. They can be incredibly proud of the environments and opportunities they create to enable players to showcase their skills.

I also wanted to acknowledge the outstanding work of Daniel Archer who left us in September to take up the High Performance Manager role at Auckland Cricket. Arch has been directly responsible for the quality systems and programmes at ND, leading this area of the organisation with skill, passion, and dedication. I have personally enjoyed my time working with Arch and learnt so much from him. We all wish him the best at Auckland Cricket – except when we clash on the field!

Heading into the season we were fortunate to have a reasonably settled coaching set up. Both Graeme Aldridge (Head Coach) and Sriram Krishnamurthy (Performance & Talent Coach) had signed on to continue in our male programme set up. We also welcomed back Joanne Broadbent to lead the women's programme. Joanne made the huge commitment of coming over early from Australia just before the Trans-Tasman border closed towards the end of winter.

With the elevation of Rob Nicol into an assistant coach role at the White Ferns, we made the decision to split the assistant coach roles in the women's programme to be able to better service our decentralised group of players. Maia Lewis (HBJ) and Brett Sorrenson (SS) were given campaign roles as assistant coaches, and also helped support our training hubs and Academy programmes in Auckland and Hamilton respectively. This allowed us to have strong coaching coverage across the region and also into our Academy space which created a great link between our performance and talent programmes in the female game.

In the programme support space, we continue to evolve our relationship with Paul Head and Foundation Clinic to provide high quality physio and medical support for our players.

The inclusion of Rachel Lambert as the ND women's physio, and the ability to tap into the wider network of physios through Foundation Clinic, has been a game-changer in improving our level of service.

There has also been some significant structural changes with the implementation of our new Regional Academy model and the staffing to support our wider performance and talent programmes.

The Regional Academy model has seen us shift to having four key training hubs in our region – Northland, Counties, Waikato, and Bays (Bay of Plenty and Poverty Bay) – with our identified talent now being provided with a holistic programme of support from September to April that we hope will continue to see ND at the forefront of player development.

We have been able to appoint Dean Brownlie (Pathway & Talent Coach – Bays), Jason Onslow (Pathway & Talent Coach – Northland) to full-time roles, and also contract Barry Rhodes (Performance & Talent Coach – Counties Manukau, Male), Maia Lewis (Performance & Talent Coach – Counties Manukau, Female), BJ Watling (Performance & Talent Coach – Waikato, Male), and Brett Sorrenson (Performance & Talent Coach – Waikato, Female) to support the delivery in those regions. It has been fantastic to have these quality people now involved in our system and working in a more coordinated and coherent manner.

We were also able to fill the vacant Pathway & Talent Manager position in the new year, with Brett Sorrenson moving into this role in February. Brett has significant coaching experience in our pathway and talent programmes and had been Director of Cricket and Head of History at St Peter's in Cambridge for the last three years. He has a proven track record of developing young people and a deep understanding of our pathway and talent programmes. We look forward to him leading this space in the years to come.

Finally, Janice Fraser has moved into a Team Operations Lead role from the end of the season. Janice takes over all the logistics and admin support across our pathway, talent and performance programmes from Tash Narasy who has moved into an infrastructure role. I'm sure I speak on behalf of all the staff and players in saying a huge thank you to Tash for all her efforts over the last few years in providing outstanding support to our performance programmes.

## Women's Programme

On the field, our ND women definitely had a season of two halves. The first half of their season was heavily impacted by COVID-19 with large numbers of our players impacted by lockdowns and restrictions in Auckland and Waikato in particular. This meant that preparation was far from ideal. However, it was a credit to the coaching and support staff as well as the players, that they continued to prepare as best they could during this time. It did however mean that the early part of the season our players were underdone. We played our first rounds of the HBJ with seven of our Auckland-based players still in lockdown and two players overseas. After a disappointing Dream11 Super Smash campaign, the team went on to have an excellent second half of the season in the HBJ and missed out on a place in the final in heart-breaking circumstances – tying the last round robin game against Auckland and subsequently missing out on a finals spot by net run rate to eventual winners, Otago.

The team can rightly be proud of how they grew into the season, and we all felt that they showed their true colours in the second half of the season.

It has also been incredibly exciting to see the development of our individual players and celebrate some of their achievements. Brooke Halliday had a stand-out year – receiving a WHITE FERNS contract, leading our women's team so incredibly well, and playing in a World Cup on home soil.

Nensi Patel was named Nicola Browne Medallist at the ND Awards, and Domestic Player of the Season at the NZC Awards which was reward for an outstanding year of development for her. This has been topped off with her receiving a WHITE FERNS contract for 2022-23.

Other notable achievements include: Kate Anderson who secured a NZC Development Contract and had involvement at WHITE FERNS camps; Mikayla Templeton, Kayley Knight and Carol Agafili involvement with NZC Development Series; and Eimear Richardson's selection in the Ireland women's team that competed in the ICC Global Qualifying Tournament.

For me, the continued evolution of our women's programme under the guidance of Joanne Broadbent is exciting to see. We have some strong talent coming through our system and we will continue to make the incremental gains to our structures so we can continue to produce international level talent.

## Men's Programme

In the male programme, our ND men's team enjoyed a strong season performing consistently despite a number of COVID-19 and weather challenges.

The team finished fourth in the Ford Trophy that was heavily impacted by the weather with four of our 10 rounds being washed out which ultimately took us out of contention in this competition.

In the Plunket Shield, after a delayed start due to covid we eventually finished third after being in the hunt for most of the season. Our last round was also heavily impacted by covid and saw seven players make their debuts up in Whangarei. Whilst challenging circumstances, it was a great opportunity to see some of our best young talent get the opportunity to test themselves at first class level. There was also some outstanding individual performances during the

campaign, including: 334 run opening partnership between Jeet Raval (209) and Bharat Popli (150) setting a new record for the highest ever partnership for ND; Henry Cooper's 200 against Otago at Alexandra; Brett Randell being the joint top wicket-taker in the Plunket Shield with 31 wickets.

The undoubted highlight for the season was the Dream11 Super Smash campaign that culminated with the Northern Brave winning a home final over the Canterbury Kings at Seddon Park in their inaugural season. This was the team's first title since the 2017-18 season. It was particularly satisfying as T20 has been a format that we haven't quite nailed in recent years so to see a dominant campaign with the team finishing as top qualifier during the round robin and then go on to win the final in such emphatic fashion was fantastic.

The team was superbly led by Jeet Raval in his first campaign as captain and perhaps reflective of his calm and inclusive leadership, was the fact that so many players made key contributions throughout the campaign.

Overall, it was exciting to see the continued growth of the team into a consistently performing unit. There has undoubtedly been some great individual progress within that, but this true team focus has been a feature. Huge credit must be given to Graeme, Sri and the support staff on the performance environment they have created and continue to develop.

Congratulations must also go to our Daniel Vettori Medallist Joe Walker who had a stellar season across all formats.

At the end of the season we saw Ish Sodhi make the decision to transfer to Canterbury in the off-season. This was purely a family decision for Ish who has been based in Christchurch in recent times and whilst we are sad to be losing a top player and incredible person who has contributed so much to ND in the last 10 years, he goes with our support and thanks.

Northern Districts had ten players enter the summer with New Zealand Cricket contracts. These were BLACKCAPS Trent Boult, Mitchell Santner, Ish Sodhi, Tim Southee, Kane Williamson, Neil Wagner, and Colin De Grandhomme; a WHITE FERNS contract for Brooke Halliday; and NZC Development Contracts Kate Anderson and Nensi Patel.

A further two players represented NZ during the summer with Tim Seifert and Scott Kuggeleijn playing for the BLACKCAPS.

In the talent space, we are also proud of the continued development of our young players that saw many achieve higher honours. This included NZ Development XI players Jacob Parker, Payton Spencer, David Hancock, Ollie White and Ben Pomare; NZ Women's U19/Development players Mikayla Templeton, Kayley Knight and Carol Agafili; and Tim Pringle go on to represent the NZ XI vs Netherlands in March (and later international cricket for the Netherlands).

Whilst celebrating the achievements of our players, we also recognise that behind their success is a dedicated group of staff that are with them through thick and thin. A key part of the performance strategy at Northern Districts continues to be the development of our staff to work towards their own ambitions and enjoy challenging experiences that can benefit their development, and consequently, our environments. It was fantastic to see many of our staff receive some form of recognition, reward or opportunity for their continued outstanding work.

In personally reflecting on the 2021-22 season, I am proud of what we have collectively achieved and continue to develop across our Performance and Talent programmes. Performance sport is a fast-changing landscape, and our challenge is to stay ahead of the curve and consistently create the best environments and opportunities for our people to showcase their skills and reach their potential.

# COMMUNITY REPORT

After much excitement and anticipation for a summer restored to full opportunities of play, a series of lockdowns and uncertainty impacted nearly every part of the region as the country adjusted to life with COVID-19 throughout the community.

Evident throughout every challenge, was the fortitude and resilience shown by all involved with a clear passion for the game to happen as much as possible, where possible. It is this community spirit and determination for which the season will be remembered and looked back upon as a time in which the game saw some of the greatest unity behind a shared goal to play cricket. ND would like to say a big thank you to all the volunteers, schools, clubs and participants for the ongoing support and passion to play cricket despite any challenges.

## Connecting People, Creating Memories

As part of Sport NZ 'Strengthen and Adapt' and a follow on from New Zealand Cricket 'One Cricket', ND's partnership with District Associations continued to grow with Bay of Plenty and Poverty Bay joining the 'Operational Delivery Model' (ODM) MOU, alongside existing partners Hamilton and Waikato Valley.


Shared Services Partnership Agreements have also been established across Hamilton, Waikato Valley and Bay of Plenty (finance, funding and competition administration) with a goal to optimise efficiency and effectiveness in support of the ODM. The purpose of these partnerships is to create a streamlined approach to deliver and grow the community game through aligned ND leadership and increase "Boots on the Ground". For Northland and Counties Manukau, ND continued with ongoing support and leadership via the Cricket Network Partnership Investment (CNPI) Agreement.

In a challenging year, both regional 'experience' and 'participation' census figures have dropped, with some geographic areas absorbing greater impact than others. The main objective of the year was to establish opportunities of experience and participation across all communities with a vision to 'Connect People, Create Memories'.

## A Game For All

It was an exciting year for regional programmes with the introduction of a specific regional resource dedicated to aligning programme products and supporting coordination processes.

42,300 children (+32%) received a cricket experience through one of three SuperSmash programmes; Awareness, Skills and/or Festivals. This meant a school saturation rate of 30% (+7%) and a student saturation rate of 19% (+11%). A significant challenge was the inability to enter schools across the majority of the region in Term 3 and Term 4, with some continued impact across Term 1. Delivery was continuously adjusted to ensure both staff and students were safe with all programmes delivered in alignment with Ministry of Education Covid Protection Framework (CPF) requirements.

The huge success of the year was the delivery of SuperSmash Hubs. Overall, there was a total of 1,698 (+42%) SuperSmash Hub registrations across Term 4 and Term 1, inclusive of an increase of 70 females (+23%). A total of 41 hubs were run in each term, with an annual total of 82. In a heavily disrupted year of school delivery, achieving an additional 500 overall registrations highlights the great experiences that were able to happen where and when possible, supported by improved programme structure and support.

For a second consecutive season, most of the region adapted to deliver a slightly shorter season as a result of lockdowns and CPF levels. These had particular impact at the start of the season primarily across Counties Manukau and Waikato, while Northland was also affected. Bay of Plenty and Poverty Bay competitions remained largely unaffected and so full seasons were able to be delivered within these competition centres.

With 90 clubs spread across the region and further schools and colleges, a total of 12,020 participants (+13%) across 910 teams participated throughout the season, 69% of these playing modified formats. There was a loss of 110 junior teams, 44 youth teams and 11 senior teams compared to the previous year (the majority of junior teams being school based teams in Waikato). Female participants represented 4% of the total annual player number, a loss of approximately 250 players from the previous year but a highlight was the growth in senior

men's traditional numbers rising 3%. The impact of Covid was felt far and wide this season, but pleasingly Bay of Plenty competitions remained largely unimpacted and enjoyed an increase of 7% participants. The impact of the ICC Women's World Cup has been very positive with an increased number of clubs eager to offer female playing opportunities and establish teams for competitions moving forward.

A couple of highlights throughout the season was the introduction of the SundaySmash in Bay of Plenty which saw eleven a side teams scheduled across four fixtures, as well as the continued success of the Backyard Smash at Seddon Park in partnership with Sport Waikato 'This is Me'.

Coach development and support remains a priority focus and a total of 524 (+24%) junior and youth coaches were registered and police vetted which was the equivalent of one coach per junior/youth team.

Another high priority focus area which is going from strength to strength are the ND Officials Panels which saw 14 umpires announced across the three regional panels with further officials appointed in scorer and match manager opportunities. In total there are 65 umpires which officiated across regional and local competitions and tournaments.

Across the pathway stream there were a number of changes implemented with the restructure of competitions and tournaments. The male and female streams now mirror each other with offerings for both Rangatahi and Tuakana. The secondary school tournaments have been restructured as Youth Rangatahi and Emerging Rangatahi (both male and female) to align with Sport NZ Balance is Better principles.

Meanwhile, the senior men saw the retirement of the Basil McBurney trophy and with it the DA 2nd XI competition but replaced with the reintroduction of the One Day limited overs competition for DA 1st XI teams in addition to the Fergus Hickey and T20 competitions. Unfortunately, Covid-19 had a significant impact on the ability to travel across and throughout the region which resulted in the cancellation of all pathway tournaments except the Fergus Hickey which Counties Manukau completed the season unbeaten to finish victorious. Some isolated fixtures were possible towards the end of the season which was a welcome opportunity to play other regions across the Youth and Emerging Rangatahi levels, as well as the Northern Premier League (NPL) however it was agreed that no points table or winner would be awarded.

Overall, there were many positives amongst a very challenging year and most importantly cricket was played and delivered at every possible opportunity. The collaboration and connection of various community members and communities are the driving force behind everything that Northern Districts is and does, and this was evident throughout the summer. A huge thanks must go to all the club and school volunteers and/or staff as well as officials, players and parents for general understanding and adaptability as the season was delivered through careful adherence of COVID-19 compliance requirements.

A special mention to the staff throughout the region which preserved through all challenges and held strong a goal to ensure the community was ready to play as soon as play could happen and ensured that every CPF requirement was met. It is the many people throughout Northern Districts that are truly the leading example of how the national and regional vision to be 'a game for all' is comes to the fore as very much the shared and collaborative focus.

### **Robert Douglas [Doug] Carswell** (ND Cap No.21)

19/03/1936 – 22/05/2022

Doug Carswell was selected for Northern Districts as a middle order batsman in 1957/58 and made his debut against Canterbury at Lancaster Park.

After rain showers had livened the pitch mid innings, he was hit in the head by a rearing delivery from NZ pace bowler Dick Motz. Carswell retired hurt and was taken to hospital for x-rays. He returned to bat next day but was dismissed for only 8 runs. He did not bat in ND's second innings. In the pre-helmet era, the head injury affected his confidence against pace bowling, and this was to be his only appearance for ND.

He continued to play representative cricket for Poverty Bay, his home Association, until the 1968/69 season, playing mainly as an off spinning all-rounder.

### **Maurice Charles Langdon**

12/10/1934 – 27/03/2022

Maurie Langdon is best remembered for a sensational bowling performance against Auckland on Eden Park in the 1963/64 season. He took 8/21 from 19.3 overs to help dismiss Auckland for a meagre 69 runs. This still stands as the second-best bowling figures ever for Northern Districts, bettered only by Alex Tait's 9/48 against Auckland in 1996/97.

Langdon played 25 first class games for ND between 1957/58 and 1964/65. A genuine all-rounder, he scored 836 runs at an average of 19.90 including five half centuries, with a highest score of 77 against Canterbury in 1963/64. His right arm medium pacers captured 60 wickets at an average of 24.43, including three 5 wicket bags.

Langdon played his early District Association rep cricket for Bay of Plenty, out of the Te Puke sub-association. Later he represented Waikato.

### **Noel William [Joe] Stoupe**

21/03/1933 – 09/04/2022

Joe Stoupe played senior club cricket for the Glenbrook and Waiuku clubs. At the end of his playing days, he took up umpiring and went on to umpire at first class level. He stood in 22 first class matches and 15 List A matches between 1980 and 1989.

Joe played a major role in the administration of umpiring in both Counties Manukau and Northern Districts. For many years he was responsible for the appointment and grading of umpires for District Association representative fixtures. He served for several years as the President of the ND Umpires and Scorers Association.

In 2014 he was recognised for his contribution to cricket with the Services to Cricket Award at the annual ND awards.

**Bruce Pairaudeau** (ND Cap No.25)

14/04/1931 – 09/10/2022

Bruce Pairaudeau died in Hamilton, aged 91. He was born in British Guiana and, remarkably, made his first-class debut aged 15 and scored his maiden first-class century at age 16. Selected for the West Indies test team in 1953, he scored a century against India on debut. He went on to play 13 tests and toured New Zealand in 1955-56.

In 1958 he emigrated to New Zealand, settling in Hamilton. He was immediately selected for Northern Districts and played 36 first-class games for ND over the next seven seasons, scoring 1,970 runs at an average of 30. His only century was 102 v Otago in 1961-62, but he also scored 16 half centuries. In 1959 the NZ Cricket Almanac named him its Player of the Year.

He captained ND from 1961-62 to 1964-65. In 1962-63 he led ND to their first ever Plunket Shield title. It was a match winning fourth wicket partnership between Pairaudeau (68\*) and Bert Sutcliffe (77\*) on the final day of the season that provided the decisive moment in ND's triumph.

A regular supporter of ND matches at Seddon Park over many years, at the time of his death he was the oldest living ND player.

**James [Jim] Linton Wright** (ND Cap No.27)

02/06/1936 – 13/11/2021

Queensland born, Jim Wright was a right arm medium pace bowler who played three Plunket Shield games for Northern Districts in the 1958/59 season.

Wright played Brabin Cup [NZ U20 tournament] for Auckland and played for North Island U20s against the South Island U20s in 1955. He then went on to represent Northland at District Association level in the late 1950s.

In his three first class games for Northern Districts Wright took 8 wickets at an average of 36. His best figures were 4/52 against Canterbury at Seddon Park.

## **Kate Anderson**

After representing the Northern Districts women's team since 2014-15, Kate has signaled a move to Canterbury in 2022-23. Kate represented ND in 67 List A and 60 T20 games. In List A games she scored 1,615 runs at an average of 31, including 2 centuries and 7 fifties, and took 52 wickets at 29, including a best of 5/30. Her 160\* v Canterbury in 2018-19 is the ND record score. She was less successful in her T20 appearances, averaging only 14 with the bat and taking 21 wickets.

Two other long serving ND women's players also called time on their ND careers.

## **Alisha Rout**

Alisha played 42 List A and 29 T20 games between 2012-13 and 2021-22. She suffered from never having a settled place or role in the batting order, batting every position from 1 to 11 in her career, with a best score of 57. She also took 22 wickets across both formats.

## **Charlotte Sarsfield**


Charlotte played 33 List A and 30 T20 games between 2014-15 and 2021-22. She took 21 List A and 16 T20 wickets with her off spinners.

## **Ish Sodhi**

Ish came to ND from Auckland as a 19-year-old in 2012. ND was keen to add a leg spinner to its bowling lineup and was able to provide opportunities to develop his career. Ish went on to play 59 first class, 39 List A and 72 T20 games for ND. He is one of only nine bowlers to take over 200 first class wickets for ND (210). This included 14 five wicket bags, with a best of 7/30. He took a further 125 wickets in white ball cricket for ND. Ish has gone on to a distinguished BLACKCAPS career, playing 17 tests, 37 ODIs and 81 T20s to date. Fittingly, he captained ND in his final match, leading from the front with a 5-wicket bag for our COVID-19 depleted team. Family reasons have led to his departure to Canterbury.

## **Brett Randell**

Brett was another Aucklander who saw more opportunities in ND. Moving here in 2016 he went on to play 18 first class matches, taking 52 wickets at an average of 24. He enjoyed a standout season in 2021-22 taking 31 wickets, including a personal best 6/45 v CD, and earning the ND Plunket Shield Player of the Year award. He also played 26 List A and 17 T20 games for ND, taking a further 66 wickets in these white ball games. Brett is continuing his career in Central Districts.

# MCCAW LEWIS NORTHERN MĀORI

There were four scheduled fixtures for McCaw Lewis Northern Māori in the 2021-22 season, with only two completed due to bad weather and COVID-19 disruptions. However, they finished the campaign unbeaten, including a dramatic win in their final fixture at Seddon Park.

The first game of the season saw McCaw Lewis Northern Māori taking on a Kaipaki Invitational XI. Northern Māori won the toss and elected to bat, Leighton Parsons led from the front with 84, he and opening partner Josh Hill put on 150 runs for the first wicket with Hill scoring 80. Small contributions from the rest of the side got Northern Māori to 247/6 off their 40 overs. Northern Māori backed up their batting effort with a solid bowling display with regular wickets. Opening bowler Tom Te Whare (3/20) made early breakthroughs with the leg spin of Paul Wylie (2/12) reducing Kaipaki to 76/6. The bowlers continued to apply pressure with Kaipaki ending up on 186/6 off their 40 overs ensuring a 61-run win for Northern Māori.

The second fixture against Hawkes Bay Development had to be cancelled due to weather and COVID-19 issues for both teams.

The third fixture against Waipuna Valley also had to be cancelled due to COVID-19 causing issues with availabilities of both teams, this was the second attempt in playing the fixture, with the original December date postponed due to bad weather.

The fourth and final fixture against University of Waikato Vice Chancellors XI was played in early April at Seddon Park, this is always a great fixture between the two sides and this year it didn't disappoint.

The Vice Chancellors XI won the toss and elected to bat. Jackson Cate blasted his way to 72 off 60 balls against the young Māori attack. His dismissal with the score at 139 led to a collapse of the batting innings with spinners Luke Istead (4/19) and Dylan Jefferies (3/29) doing the bulk of the damage in dismissing the University side for 183. Northern Māori got off to a solid start in pursuit of 184 with Keith Vincent (32) and Fraser Farrell (22) making early inroads. Batting at six Luke Istead saw many partners come and go, and with score 120/9 there was not much hope for a victory, however number 11 Jamie Hare and Istead started to knock off the required runs with calculated risks and picking up of singles. The Vice Chancellors XI bought back their seamers in an effort to capture the last wicket. The last over saw the Māori side needing one run for victory, and Luke Istead saw the side home as Northern Māori secured the win with a dramatic 64 run last wicket partnership.

It has been an exciting year for Northern Māori, with a lot of growth and young talent coming through the ranks. We look to continue to build on this in the coming season.

## **Southee savours his first Sir Richard Hadlee Medal** Source: nzc.nz

BLACKCAPS pace bowler Tim Southee has crowned a stellar season by winning the Sir Richard Hadlee Medal at the ANZ New Zealand Cricket Awards.

Southee, who has not previously been awarded NZC's supreme award, the Sir Richard Hadlee Medal, was named the winner on the basis of his sheer consistency throughout the summer; at home and abroad, in red and white ball cricket.

Already named as the winner of this year's Winsor Cup for first-class bowling, he captured 36 Test wickets at 23.88, including best figures of six for 43 against England at Lord's and five crucial wickets against India in the victorious ICC World Test Championship Final at Southampton.

Southee has now taken 338 Test wickets - 23 fewer than Daniel Vettori and 93 short of the record-holder the award is named after, Sir Richard Hadlee.

## **ICC Women's Cricket World Cup at Seddon Park**

### **England v Australia**

**Saturday, 5 March 2022**

Nat Sciver's unbeaten century went in vain as Australia managed to defend a total of 311 against arch-rivals England in their opening match at the ICC Women's Cricket World Cup 2022. Australia managed to hold their nerve with England needing 16 off the last over. Jess Jonassen gave away just three runs as the Aussies put their first points on board in the World Cup standings.

### **New Zealand v India**

**Thursday, 10 March 2022**

New Zealand sealed back-to-back victories in the tournament after a disciplined bowling performance helped them bowl India out for 198, after setting them a target of 261 to chase. The WHITE FERNS kept India in check for the majority of the innings to beat India by 62 runs.

### **West Indies v India, Saturday**

**12 March 2022**

Superb centuries from Smriti Mandhana and Harmanpreet Kaur have helped India to a massive win by 155 runs against the West Indies. After posting a huge total of 317/8 on the back of the pair of centuries, the Indian bowlers came to the party to bundle West Indies out for 162.

### **Pakistan v Bangladesh**

**Monday, 14 March 2022**

Bangladesh made history at the World Cup picking up their first victory in the tournament's history with a thrilling nine-run triumph over Pakistan. It was a performance full of passion and

class as the quickly developing Bangladesh side successfully defended their score of 234/7 with a brilliant display of tight spin bowling.

#### **New Zealand v South Africa Thursday, 17 March 2021**

Marizanne Kapp produced another all-round performance to take South Africa to a two-wicket victory over the WHITE FERNS. Kapp came to South Africa's rescue with the bat again as she remained unbeaten on 34 in the crunch chase against hosts New Zealand and contributed 2/44 with the ball earlier in the day.

#### **West Indies v Pakistan Monday, 21 March 2022**

A brilliant performance by the Pakistan spinners helped restrict West Indies to 89/7 before the batters kept their calm to seal an eight-wicket victory on a wet Hamilton night. It was Pakistan's first victory of the 2022 World Cup, beating West Indies by eight wickets in a shortened match, registering their first points on the board.

#### **India v Bangladesh, Tuesday, 22 March 2022**

Yastika Bhatia's fifty and the all-around heroics of Sneha Rana helped India secure a convincing 110-run win over Bangladesh in the last match at Hamilton in the 2022 ICC Women's Cricket World Cup. The win put India in the third spot in the ICC Women's Cricket World Cup 2022 standings with six points and kept them in the race for a place in the semi-finals.

## **International Cricket at Seddon Park**

### **BLACKCAPS vs Netherlands ODI, Saturday, 2 April 2022**

Tom Latham rescued his side from a perilous position in the second ODI against the Netherlands, posting his highest one-day score to set up a 118-run victory at Seddon Park.

After the BLACKCAPS top order had pitched in to give their captain the present of a 32-5 hole, Latham cracked an unbeaten 140 from 123 deliveries, helping the hosts post 264-9 and continuing a golden run of form.

Latham then oversaw a straightforward second innings from behind the stumps as the BLACKCAPS dismissed the Dutch for 146.

### **BLACKCAPS vs Netherlands ODI, Monday, 4 April 2022**

Centuries from Martin Guptill and Will Young helped the BLACKCAPS complete a series sweep against the Netherlands and send the Ross Taylor out a winner.

While the retiring great was dismissed for 14 in his final innings for New Zealand, it was fitting for that pair in particular to lead the way with the bat and set up a 115-run triumph at Seddon Park tonight.

Guptill compiled 106 for his 17th ODI ton, breaking a tie with Nathan Astle and moving second on this country's all-time standings.

The total was out of the tourists' reach, despite a fine opening knock from Stephan Myburgh, who followed Taylor into ODI retirement by smashing 64 from 43 balls.

His dismissal by Colin de Grandhomme saw the chase falter before Matt Henry took four wickets to close out the victory, fittingly completed by a Taylor catch.

## Plunket Shield Review

Auckland won a COVID-19 disrupted Plunket Shield competition, with Northern Districts (ND) finishing third. Given the circumstances of the season it was a respectable showing. Because of lockdowns our season start was delayed, we had to make up fixtures amongst other formats, had one game completely washed out, and played our final game with seven debutants due to COVID-19.

We won three games, drew one, had one abandoned, and lost three. Two of the losses were nail biters, and the other the final match heavily impacted by COVID-19.

In mid-November we went into our opening match against Canterbury at Bay Oval. Canterbury had already played three games, while we had limited preparation due to the lockdown of our Waikato based players for the preceding weeks. However, we came out of the blocks full of running, establishing a 105 run first innings lead, thanks to 74\* from Joe Carter and outstanding medium pace bowling from Brett Randell (4/32), Zak Gibson (3/14) and Colin de Grandhomme (2/8). However, our second innings saw us capitulate for only 123 runs. Even this looked likely to be enough, as Canterbury went to stumps eight wickets down and still needing 72 runs to win. Next morning we failed to break the Fletcher / Williams partnership and lost the game by two wickets.

Round 2 saw ND bounce back with a resounding win over Otago at Molyneux Park, Alexandra, by an innings and 74 runs. Such a win seemed unlikely at first, as Otago recovered from 8/203 to reach 342 in their first innings (helped by ex-ND player Jake Gibson's 50 batting at number 10). Brett Randell was outstanding again taking 5/56. In reply, the ND top order established their dominance with a lead of 211 runs, led by a double century from Henry Cooper (200), with supporting knocks from Jeet Raval (89), Bharat Popli (86) and Brett Randell (50). Otago then collapsed in their second innings, all out for only 137 runs with Joe Walker (4/47) and Zak Gibson (3/30) the main wicket takers.

Over two months later in early February, Round 3 was against Auckland at Eden Park Outer Oval. This proved to be another low scoring game that could have gone either way. ND batted first and scored 230. Mitchell Santner (59) top scored, and Brett Randell pushed his claim to all-rounder status with another half century (51). A great spell from Tim Southee (5/35) saw Auckland dismissed for 208. However, ND could only manage 173 in their second innings. Auckland had its struggles too but battled on to a four wicket win.

Another month elapsed before the rest of our games in March and early April. In Round 4 we hosted Wellington at Cobham Oval and posted a substantial 213 run win. After some early struggles, ND posted 243 in its first innings, thanks mostly to some heroics from Kristian Clarke who scored 63\* on debut. Wellington struggled even more and were all out for only 119. Brett Randell again shone with 3/36. Clarke made it an even more memorable debut when he took a wicket with his first ball in first class cricket. An opening stand of 89 between Jeet Raval and Henry Cooper set our second innings under way and Joe Carter (76) and Mitchell Santner (74) helped ND to be in a position to declare at 314/8. Our spinners then came to the party – Joe Walker (4/50) and Ish Sodhi (3/39) proved too much for Wellington, all out for 225.

Round 5 saw ND fight back from a first innings deficit to win by 141 runs over CD at McLean Park, Napier. CD passed our first innings of 172 to lead by 77 runs with Kristian Clarke (3/47) leading with the ball. Enter Colin de Grandhomme! His 164\* proved to be the match winner.

ND posted 300 in its second innings and then demolished CD for only 82. Brett Randell continued his stellar season with 6/45 and de Grandhomme chipped in with 3/13.

Round 6, scheduled versus Auckland at Cobham Oval, was abandoned without a ball being bowled.

In contrast to the previous game against CD, the Round 7 game, at Cobham Oval was a high scoring one. Jeet Raval and Bharat Popli batted the entire first day. When they were finally separated their opening partnership of 334 was a new record for any partnership for ND. Raval finished with 209 and Popli 150. ND declared at 496/6. CD also prospered, a Tom Bruce double century helping them to 408/7 declared. ND had just started their second innings at the end of Day 3. Day 4 was abandoned due to COVID-19 protocols, with a significant number of players testing positive.

And so we arrived at the final game of the season, against Wellington at Cobham Oval. Our entire team from the previous round was in quarantine and another seven Blackcaps were unavailable. We could have asked for the game to be abandoned, but instead took it as an opportunity to develop our next group of ND players. Ish Sodhi was tasked with leading an inexperienced team, with seven players new to first class cricket. Given the circumstances, the team competed admirably, despite a losing margin of nine wickets. We scored 188 in our first innings. Chris Swanson top scored with 45 on debut. Scott Johnson and Matt Fisher added 57 valuable runs for the last wicket. Ish Sodhi then led from the front, taking 5/65 as Wellington were dismissed for 296. Peter Drysdale, another on debut, then top scored with 62 in ND's second innings. Wellington then achieved the 50 odd runs for victory with the loss of one wicket.

Highest run scorers for the season were Jeet Raval with 491 runs, averaging 44 and Henry Cooper 314 averaging 34, both totals were dominated by their double centuries. With fewer innings, Colin de Grandhomme, Mitchell Santner, and Bharat Popli all averaged in the 40s.

Brett Randell deservedly won the award for our Plunket Shield player of the season. He was equal top wicket taker in the competition with 31 wickets at an average of only 14 runs per wicket. This included two five wicket bags. Joe Walker continued his progress across all three formats with 18 wickets, also at a miserly average of 19.

Finally, special mention of Peter Drysdale. No one has worked harder to reach first class status than Peter. He was selected to play two seasons prior but missed out when COVID-19 caused the cancellation of the last two games of that season. Top scoring on his debut, and taking a wicket, were among the season's highlights.

With Otago needing 10 of the last over to win with three wickets in hand, one had every reason to believe we could pull this one off, however, it was not to be as Otago won with two balls to spare.

Had one told me this would be our last loss in this tournament, I would have not taken them too seriously, but what followed this loss at Dunedin was nine consecutive wins that took us all the way to being crowned the Dream11 Super Smash men’s champions.

While we may have won nine out of 11 games and lost only one game – we had our share of heart stopping moments too. Trent Boult hitting a six of the last ball to win the game for us against Canterbury at the Bay Oval being a highlight that would be very hard to forget. Playing in Whangarei for the first time in many years and having to grind our way to victory, thanks to a very out of character innings from Colin De Grandhomme, on what was a rather difficult surface, comes to mind as yet another game where results could have easily been different.

The journey saw new heroes emerge with the bat, such as Katene Clarke with his explosiveness at the top, Jeet Raval and Joe Carter with their ability to anchor the innings and switch gears through the middle to Henry Cooper with his ability to finish the innings or the game with composure. Alongside them, we had our experienced batters in Tim Seifert, Mitchell Santner and Colin De Grandhomme who all ended up winning games of cricket single handedly with the bat too. Santner’s innings in the grand final being a special performance that one would remember for long.

We as cricketers and support staff often end up doing the enjoyable bit – to play in front of our fans and enjoy a sport that we all dearly love. However, the work that goes behind the scenes for us to be able to do our bit is often unnoticed. To take the game to Whangarei just when the region had gone into a lockdown, to plan a full house home grand final – only for that to be ruined about a few days prior with the announcement of changed traffic light systems – the NDCA family had to endure challenges right through.

Any win is memorable, as this game has shown that you lose more often than you win, but to be able to win the Super Smash this season makes it all the more special, as its not only for our fans, but it is truly for the NDCA family who do their work day-in-day-out so we can go out and do our jobs.

The icing on the cake – men’s champions in our very first year as NORTHERN BRAVE!

Performance wise, we didn't generate enough momentum to threaten the top half of the table. There were glimpses of the form that took us to the final last season, but consistency evaded us when it was really needed to put us into a strong position within the competition.

Despite the frustrating weather throughout the campaign, we still fell short in playing the brand of 50 over cricket that we know we can play.

However, highlights of the campaign included:

- Ford Trophy player of the season Joe Carter scoring 105\* to get us home over Auckland
- Colin de Grandhomme playing a typical 'CDG' innings of 126 against Auckland
- Chris Swanson scoring 41 on debut against Otago
- Matt Fisher equalling his personal best of 4/34 against Otago

Whilst it was disappointing not to follow up the previous season's performance, it is a timely reminder about what we need to do to achieve the consistency that matches the skills we have within the playing group. Essentially, ensuring 'good' form is continued for as long as possible, and still being able to compete when things don't feel 'good' are normally keys to individual and team success.

The margins in every domestic competition can be very fine, so we remain confident in our ability in this format looking ahead to next season.

The Northern District's women's programme commenced in June 2021 with players focusing on building their strength and conditioning with Nathan Smith. The fielding remedial program started in July with Mark Crawford focusing on the basics.

### Hawke Cup

Bay of Plenty won the toss and elected to bat. They did not get off to a good start losing early and regular wickets to be 46/4. Oliver White and Peter Drysdale built a solid partnership of 69 together for the sixth wicket to bring the game back to an even position at 155/5 before rain intervened and bought the first days play to a close.

The wet weather would be a familiar theme over the next two days as it rained heavily with the game unable to start again. This meant that Hawkes' Bay retained the Hawke Cup with the game being abandoned at the start of day three.

Waikato Valley are currently in leading the 2022 calendar year points table as they look to secure the challenge in the 2022/23 season.

It was another covid affected season of cricket in the Waikato Valley (WV) region. We started the season with part of our region in lockdown and other parts free to play but no-one to play against, so very frustrating. One thing we did notice is how much our cricketing community missed playing the game, which shows there's still a great passion for cricket throughout WV.

WV has huge geographical challenges when it comes to delivering cricket, reflecting the nature of our region with dispersed provincial centres and small rural clubs. We have been working closely with ND, under the shared services agreement, to make sure nowhere or no one gets missed in our attempt to promote the game throughout our region. Alongside ND we have a strong focus on delivering cricket formats and competitions that suit the needs of our players. Some key highlights for the year are:

- Nearly 8,000 children participated in a school delivered, introductory cricket programme
- 460 children registered in SuperSmash hubs held across 13 Waikato centres
- Successful delivery of Yeah! Girls programmes in Cambridge and South Waikato – off the back of which planning began for Girls Only grade in 2022-2023.
- 59 Junior & 26 Youth teams participated in Term 1 2022 cricket
- 11 Clubs fielded teams in the Senior Men's competitions

While participation in formal competition is down from previous years, this clearly reflects the impact of Covid. The WV Board was pleased to see the number of schools and clubs that made the effort to field a team in the second half of the season, despite the uncertainty of the times we live in.

Another highlight for 2021-2022 was the success of our representative teams, with the Senior Men's side, coached by Clint Price, stand out performers this year. Our Senior Men's team lead the Hawke Cup challenge points with two rounds to be played. We know the players and coaching staff are very excited to see them continue their fine form and hopefully secure what would be WV's first ever Hawke Cup challenge.

Sadly our Rangatahi teams were significantly impacted by lockdowns and Covid and had little opportunity to travel outside the region for competitions.

On a brighter note, we've seen a significant improvement in our Umpire capability this season. The growth in the number and skill of our Umpires was a particular focus for WV this year, with first Luan Kloppers and then Brendon Davis ably leading in this space. Having had no umpires in 2020-2021, we are pleased to report 4 umpires were available this season for the WV, and hopefully a further growth in umpire numbers for next season. Wonderful recognition of Brendon Davis' work came as he received both the Community Official award at the NDCA awards and the Official of the Year at the NZC awards.

While the Spark Premier Mens Competition was unfortunately unable to include Counties Manukau this season, the six Waikato Valley clubs acquitted themselves well against their Hamilton counterparts with a string of strong team and individual performances. This combined competition provides our clubs and players with a very good standard of cricket to challenge themselves in, and we are now seeing that in our WV senior men's performances.

The 2021-22 season was a busy one for the Northland Cricket Association (NCA). Cobham Oval was again, well and truly bursting at the seams again, hosting Ford Trophy, four Plunket Shield matches and a Dream11 Super Smash double header, as well as Northland premier and reserve grade matches, Cobham Club, and junior club/representative fixtures.

Cobham Oval was well managed by NCA staff and by head groundsman, Ravi Dissanayake. With it being Ravi's first season at Cobham Oval he did a great job managing a very busy back half of the season, especially given COVID-19 limiting the amount of ground staff he had available.

Although we had a vast amount of domestic, representative and club cricket played at Cobham Oval, we obviously still had various junior, youth and senior competitions running throughout the season. Our junior, youth and senior competitions were well facilitated. It was pleasing that with consistent strong messaging, great cricket community buy-in and a bit of luck our COVID-19 protocols meant that we lost very few games outside of lockdowns.

It was again great to see cricket being played at grounds all over Northland, from Warkworth to Kerikeri. The addition of a new club in Whangarei this season was fantastic, and it is very exciting to hear that we will see a team enter one or two of our reserve grade competitions from Kaitaia next season. It is the NCA's job to continue to find new ways to support junior, youth and senior club cricket and to build on what we have. A major priority is and always will be, our junior grades. These players are NCA's future so we need to do what we can to encourage and nurture these young cricketers of all abilities.

It is vital to acknowledge our volunteer coaches, managers, scorers, administrators, and supporters in junior, youth and senior club cricket. It's a tough and at times thankless task for volunteers to coach, manage, score, and administer teams and clubs. There were also several school coordinators that assisted in establishing school coaching programmes and entered teams in various competitions. Their efforts were greatly appreciated. It's difficult to show the NCA's true appreciation of all those volunteers involved in cricket, but we most certainly do.

We had a COVID-19 limited representative programme this season. All pre-Christmas rep cricket was either postponed or cancelled. Our senior men's team managed only to have 4 matches out of a scheduled 13. Our Rangatahi youth and emerging women's and men's teams had limited opportunities as all junior tournaments were cancelled. This lack of rep cricket seems to have created a hunger from a lot of these young cricketers for our Winter Pathways Programme. This will be led by Jason Onslow, who has joined us from East Coast Bays CC as our Pathways and Talent Coach.

We would like to acknowledge and thank the NCA umpires who do a fantastic job. Geoff Ogle, as umpire's manager, has a group of dedicated umpires who are there week in week out giving their time to help make cricket better for our players.

It was fantastic to see the hard work and perseverance of Northland representatives Henry Cooper and Brett Randell continue to pay off. Henry making his highest first-class score of 200 against Otago and Brett being the joint highest wicket taker in the Plunket Shield with 31 wickets at an average of 14.83.

NCA have some very supportive and loyal sponsors, brilliant funders, and fantastic volunteers. Without this support our organisation could not function the way it does. We have a hard working, enthusiastic and very dedicated staff who will continue to strive to make cricket in Northland the best it can be.

### Governance

There was significant and forced change at Poverty Bay Cricket Association (PBCA) this season due to the sudden resignation of Chair Isaac Hughes, with immediate effect. Previous Chair Chris Slater stepped back into the role to cover the remainder of the season.

We currently have six Board members, covering a range of skills including education, business and investment acumen, coaching and skill development, commercial and sponsorship. We have representation from one female but are seeking to grow our female engagement at board level and grassroots.

Our long-standing administrator of 35 years Kim Shaw is retiring. Kim has overseen significant success in our financials and has set up PBCA ready to build assets and develop our cricket programme with financial backing. A replacement is being sought for this role.

Dave Castle has been employed as a Development Coach and has provided the Board with several initiatives for the upcoming season including winter coaching programmes, rep programmes, age group coaching sessions, junior and intermediate coaching in season, as well as developing assets through his approved covers proposal and PBCA asset management documents.

### Representative Cricket

Age group tournaments were cancelled due to COVID-19, however we had sides selected for these. We have a view to returning senior male and female teams to representative cricket and have put programmes in place, to develop and support these groups beyond age group cricket.

### Senior Cricket

We continued to have a four-team premier competition with new winners across the 40 and 50 over competitions in HSOB, and GBHS winning the T20 competition. All competitions were successful and saw good competitive cricket and tight results in some games.

Our second-tier competition, the Hope Cup, was again a six-team competition that was a great success. School sides were competitive and registered wins against the men's club sides, and the spirit of cricket was always at the fore, making for a well-supported development grade for our school teams, and a competitive second grade.

### Junior Cricket

With a large range of small roll schools in the PBCA catchment zone, the board discussed and researched a change from primary school cricket to clubs. After consultation with clubs and the lack of individual club infrastructure it is PBCA decision to stay with schools, however our combined schools sides will engage with a club where possible.

Intermediate cricket continues to follow the very successful model of our colts competition – where players are joining club linked sides, but in a PBCA managed format, where we create and place players into the club teams – HSOB, OBR, Ngatapa and Horouta.

## Women's Cricket

We had nine secondary school aged girls and 12 junior girls playing in PBCA competitions. Unfortunately, there was no women's cricket for PBCA as all tournaments were cancelled. However, on an individual level Grace Levy made ND U19 and Kayley Knight played for the Northern Brave, ND U19, and NZ U19 and was named Northern Districts young female player of the year.

## External Relationships

We had a strong relationship with Recreation Services but it was a challenging season due to resourcing and experience. Because of this PBCA took more responsibility for pitch preparation and rotation. We have approved a new replacement covers for all wickets at HBR.

PBCA has developed a sponsorship document with varying levels, to allow us to engage in our unique community and drive some income for initiatives, as well as engage our community.

Finally, PBCA is committed to strengthening the relationship with Northern Districts Cricket.

### Overview

We were very fortunate that we manage to get a full season of premier cricket as the COVID-19 lockdown ended just in time for the start of the season. We acknowledge that this wasn't the case for every District and we hope that all areas are able to complete a full season this year. Due to a lack of representative cricket before Christmas, we reintroduced the Attrill Cup – a local semi-representative tournament between BOP Coastal, Central, U20s and Lakelands. We have very positive feedback and will look to run this tournament in some form for the upcoming season.

The past financial year (ending 31 May 2022) was our first full year using ND shared services and operational delivery model. We have been very pleased with how this has been operating, with additional resources available, high level of success in our KPIs and all administration tasks completed on time. Funding requests have been actioned in time and we were slightly more successful this financial year than we were pre-COVID-19. We continue to work with ND to refine reporting and improve systems and they have been very open to suggestions. We would like to thank the ND team for the work put in over the year.

### Development

Despite some challenges and impacts from COVID-19, the game continues to grow across the BOP region. Team entry numbers were slightly lower in the primary softball grades; however, we saw growth across all other grades, with entry numbers increasing from last season in primary and intermediate hardball, youth, senior and social cricket grades. There was a total of 310 teams in the 2020/21 season, compared with 296 last season.

Further growth was seen in our SuperSmash Hub participation numbers, with a total of 509 hub participants taking part in 10 hubs across the BOP region. This season saw ND lead the registration and delivery of the hubs with support from the local clubs. This model has worked well, with participation numbers increasing from 298 to 509. The other pleasing aspect to our hub delivery, was a very high satisfaction rating from participants, which shows that our staff are doing a great job delivering great cricket experiences.

Our school delivery programmes were impacted by COVID-19, which led to numerous bookings being cancelled, or rescheduled. Some areas were apprehensive about booking in external providers, which meant, at times we were over resourced in certain regions. Overall, we still managed to engage with 71 schools and 12,600 students across our Awareness, Skills, and Festival Day programmes.

Coach Development opportunities continued to be offered to BOP coaches, with coach workshops, qualification courses and club nights delivered throughout the season. 167 community coaches registered, with 92% of those coaches being police vetted.

We introduced some new initiatives to continue to develop the game in BOP, with the introduction of the Women's Sunday Smash competition, the Female Coaching Academy, in-school Festival Days, and the further growth of the development grade for our NZC school competitions.

## **Pathway/Representative Review**

This year we managed to introduce a 2-day fixture for our Under 19s Coastlands and Lakelands teams which was a great contest. Other highlights for the year were five girls and four boys represented ND Under 19s, the Coastlands youth boys team went through undefeated in four DA fixtures and the continued improvement of the Lakelands youth boys team. A number of Bay youth girls participated in away fixtures in Hamilton and Counties.

The Senior Men's team earned the challenge for the Hawke Cup with a great win over Northland. Unfortunately, the challenge against Hawkes Bay was washed out after only a few hours of play. On an individual front Peter Drysdale, Fergus Lellman and Ben Pomare all made their first class debuts for Northern Districts.

Lastly, we are very proud of Nensi Patel obtaining her first WHITE FERNS contract. Nensi has worked extremely hard, and the contract is just reward. We look forward to seeing her continue to grow and develop – Well done Nensi.

2021-22 was another season disrupted by lockdowns and restrictions on sport which reduced the number of days cricket could be played. Although the season started positively on the first day of cricket with the start of the T20 competition (albeit a wet one) on 1 Oct, we went into Level 3 lockdown two days later with cricket not resuming until the 20th November. This impacted junior and youth cricket far more than senior cricket due to additional restrictions and burdens on schools. Regardless of such the equivalent figures from last year are;

- 2,115 (-20%) registered participants (3% female).
- Five SuperSmash hubs with 146 registrations
- 28% of schools and 5,206 students received a cricket experience through the SuperSmash programme offerings.
- An increase to 115 junior and youth coaches registered
- 87% of junior and youth coaches qualified and vetted.
- Pathway programmes and opportunities of play were delivered for players and coaches between Year 7-13.

Unfortunately within the youth and junior programs, all representative fixtures did not go ahead due to Covid restrictions which was disappointing for the administrators as well as the expected participants. This impact can also be seen in the school student numbers, particularly in term 4 of 2021 as cricket could only be played in the normal competition form for the final few weeks and many schools decided to opt out due to the short window of play and the restrictions on schools to host visiting teams due to the additional Education Department restrictions on schools.

At a representative level, only the A men's team was able to play, and was restricted to the Fergus Hickey competition only due to the limited number of days of cricket. The Hamilton team finished middle of the table with a first innings win over Northland, a narrow 12 run loss to Counties Manukau, a first innings win over Bay of Plenty and a incomplete first innings game against Waikato Valley. Counties Manukau won the Fergus Hickey Rosebowl of the season.

At a Senior level, Marist Suburbs and made the final of all premier competitions and won them all, playing Hamilton Old Boys in each game. The Spark Limited Overs competition was restricted this year to Hamilton and Waikato Valley teams. Due to the border restrictions around Auckland it was not feasible for Counties Manukau to enter. Two pools were again used due to the limited days available for the competition. Marist beat Hamilton Old Boys in the final to claim the Spark trophy. Marist Suburbs were also the winner of the Hec Holland Plate, the Eddy Marr Bowl and the Howden Cup showing a remarkable consistency throughout the season. A total of 72 teams competed in the Business House league, a decrease of four teams, but solid numbers given the late start to the season and cements the popularity of this form of cricket.

The 2021-22 start of season lockdown created a planning headache for scheduling competitions until we moved into the traffic light system where cricket could then be played almost free from restrictions. The season proceeded normally from there and all competitions barring the T20 format were completed successfully. The HCA Board would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge and thank everyone involved in cricket for their patience during such a disruptive season and look forward to a normal season next year.

## Notes to the Financial Statements

### Northern Districts Cricket Association Incorporated For the year ended 31 July 2022

#### 1. Statement of Accounting Policies

##### Reporting Entity

Northern Districts Cricket Association Incorporated ("Northern Districts Cricket") is incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908.

Northern Districts Cricket is a public entity for the purposes of financial reporting in accordance with the Financial Reporting Act 2013.

##### Statement of Compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with New Zealand Generally Accepted Accounting Practice ("NZ GAAP"). They comply with Public Benefit Entity Standards Reduced Disclosure Regime ("PBE Standards RDR") and Public Benefit Entity International Public Sector Accounting Standards ("PBE IPSAS") that have been authorised for use by the External Reporting Board for Not-for-Profit entities.

Northern Districts Cricket is a public benefit not for profit entity and is eligible to apply Tier 2 PBE standards on the basis that it does not have public accountability and is not defined as large.

##### Measurement Basis

Unless otherwise stated, the measurement base is that of historical cost. Reliance is placed on the fact that Northern Districts Cricket is a going concern.

##### Functional and presentation currency

The financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars (\$) which is the entity's functional currency, rounded to the nearest dollar.

There has been no change in the functional currency.

##### Use of judgements and estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the Board and management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

##### (a) Judgements

Judgements made in applying accounting policies that have had the most significant effects on the amounts recognised in the financial statements is revenue recognition- non-exchange revenue (conditions vs. restrictions).

(b) Assumptions and estimation uncertainties

Assumptions and estimation uncertainties that have a significant risk of resulting in a material adjustment in the year ending 31 July 2022 is the useful life, recoverable amount and depreciation method and rate of property, plant and equipment.

(c) Assumptions on depreciation rate and useful life

Standard industry rates are used for depreciation rates and the useful life of property, plant and equipment which are reassessed annually for any impairment.

(d) Changes in accounting estimates

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements and have been applied consistently by Northern Districts Cricket.

## 2. Specific Accounting Policies

The following specific accounting policies have been used in preparing these financial statements.

### Revenue

Revenue is recognised when the amount of revenue can be measured reliably and it is probable that economic benefits will flow to Northern Districts Cricket and is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

The following specific recognition criteria in relation to Northern Districts Cricket's revenue streams must also be met before revenue is recognised.

#### Revenue from non-exchange transactions

Non-exchange transactions are those where Northern Districts Cricket receives an inflow of resources but provides no (or nominal) direct consideration in return. With the exception of services-in-kind, inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions are only recognised as assets where both:

- it is probable that the associated future economic benefit or service potential will flow to Northern Districts Cricket, and
- fair value is reliably measurable.

Inflow of resources from non-exchange transactions that are recognised as assets are recognised as non-exchange revenue, to the extent that a liability is not recognised in respect to the same inflow.

Liabilities are recognised in relation to inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions when there is a resulting present obligation as a result of the non-exchange transactions, where both:

- it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying future economic benefit or service potential will be required to settle the obligation, and
- the amount of the obligation can be reliably estimated.

The following specific recognition criteria in relation to Northern Districts Cricket's non-exchange transaction revenue streams must also be met before revenue is recognised.

#### Grants from New Zealand Cricket - General Funding and other non-exchange revenue

New Zealand Cricket (NZC) - General Funding and other non-exchange revenue is recognised when the conditions attached to the grant have been complied with. Where there are unfulfilled conditions attached to the grant, the amount relating to the unfulfilled condition is recognised as a liability and released to revenue as the conditions are fulfilled. Stipulations that are 'conditions' specifically require Northern Districts Cricket to return the inflow of resources received if they are not utilised in the way stipulated, resulting in the recognition of a non-exchange liability that is subsequently recognised as non-exchange revenue as and when the 'conditions' are satisfied.

Stipulations that are 'restrictions' that do not specifically require Northern Districts Cricket to return the inflow of resources received if they are not utilised in the way stipulated, do not result in the recognition of a non-exchange liability, resulting in the immediate recognition of non-exchange revenue.

### **Revenue from exchange transactions**

#### Gate Receipts

Entrance fees for functions and events are recorded as revenue when the function or event takes place and are measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

#### Commercial Activities

Hosting and hospitality income is recorded as revenue when the function or event takes place and is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

#### Coaching & facilities

Revenue is recognised immediately where members, groups or individuals purchase specific services relating to coaching and development courses. At year end any revenues for which the conditions of receipt have not been met are then transferred to deferred revenue. Once the conditions have been met, the revenue is recognised in that financial year.

#### Sponsorship Revenue

Northern Districts Cricket receives cash and non-cash sponsorship in the form of goods and services. The fair value of the cash, goods and services received is recognised as Sponsorship revenue when it is probable that the associated future economic benefit or service potential will flow to the entity, and the fair value is reliably measurable.

#### Grant Revenue from NZ Cricket, Funding Organisations and Other Grants

Grant revenue, with the exception of NZC General Funding as discussed above, is recognised when the conditions attached to the grant have been complied with. Where there are unfulfilled conditions attaching to the grant, the amount relating to the unfulfilled condition is recognised as a liability and released to revenue as the conditions are fulfilled.

### **Employee Benefits**

Liabilities for wages and salaries, annual leave and accumulating sick leave are recognised in surplus or deficit during the period in which the employee provided the related services. Liabilities for the associated benefits are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

### **Financial instruments**

Northern Districts Cricket initially recognises financial instruments when Northern Districts Cricket becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

#### Derecognition

Northern Districts Cricket derecognises a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or it transfers the rights to receive the contractual cash flows in a transaction in which substantially all the risks and rewards of

ownership of the financial asset are transferred. Any interest in transferred financial assets that is created or retained by Northern Districts Cricket is recognised as a separate asset or liability.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount presented in the statement of financial position when, and only when, Northern Districts Cricket has a legal right to offset the amounts and intends either to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

#### Initial Recognition and Measurement

Northern Districts Cricket classifies financial assets into the following categories: fair value through surplus or deficit, held-to-maturity, loans and receivables, and available-for-sale.

Northern Districts Cricket's financial assets include: cash and cash equivalents, receivable from exchange transactions, quoted and unquoted investments. Subsequent measurement is dependent on the classification of the financial instrument, and is specifically detailed in the accounting policies below.

The fair value of financial instruments that are traded in active markets at each reporting date is determined by reference to quoted market prices, without any deduction for transaction costs.

#### Financial assets at fair value through surplus or deficit

Financial assets at fair value through surplus or deficit include financial assets held for trading and financial assets designated upon initial recognition at fair value through surplus or deficit. Financial assets are classified as held for trading if they are acquired for the purpose of selling or repurchasing in the near term.

Northern District Cricket has not designated any financial assets at fair value through surplus or deficit.

#### **Held-to-maturity**

Non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments and fixed maturities are classified as held-to-maturity when Northern Districts Cricket has the positive intention and ability to hold them to maturity.

Held-to-maturity financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment losses. Northern Districts Cricket did not have any held-to-maturity investments during the years ended 2021 and 2020.

#### **Loans and receivables**

Loans and receivables are financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Loans and receivables are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment losses.

Loans and receivables comprise cash and cash equivalents and receivables from exchange transactions. Cash and cash equivalents represent highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into a known amount of cash with an insignificant risk of changes in value, with maturities of 3 months or less.

#### **Available-for-sale financial assets**

Available-for-sale financial assets are non-derivative financial assets that are designated as available-for-sale or are not classified in any of the above categories of financial assets. Available-for-sale financial assets are subsequently measured at fair value with unrealised gains or losses recognised in other comprehensive revenue and expense and presented in the Available-for-sale fair value reserve within net assets/equity, less impairment. Upon derecognition, the accumulated gain or loss within net assets/equity is recognised in surplus or deficit. When investment is determined to be impaired, the cumulative loss is reclassified from the reserve to the statement of financial performance. Available-for-sale financial assets comprise equity investments and debt security.

## Amortised cost financial liabilities

Financial liabilities classified as amortised cost are non-derivative financial liabilities that are not classified as fair value through surplus or deficit financial liabilities. Financial liabilities classified as amortised cost are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Financial liabilities classified as amortised cost comprise trade and other payables.

### Derecognition

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled, or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in surplus or deficit.

## Impairment of financial assets

A financial asset is assessed at each reporting date to determine whether there is objective evidence that it is impaired. A financial asset is impaired if there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the asset, and that the loss event had an impact on the estimated future cash flows of that asset that can be estimated reliably.

Objective evidence that financial assets are impaired includes default or delinquency by a counterparty, indications that a counterparty or issuer will enter bankruptcy, economic conditions that correlate with defaults or the disappearance of an active market for a security. In addition, for an equity security classified as an available-for-sale financial asset, a significant or prolonged decline in its fair value below its cost is objective evidence of impairment.

## Financial assets carried at amortised cost (loans and receivables)

Northern Districts Cricket considers evidence of impairment for financial assets measured at amortised cost (loans and receivables and held-to-maturity) at both a specific asset and collective level. All individually significant assets are assessed for specific impairment. Those found not to be specifically impaired are then collectively assessed for any impairment that has been incurred but not yet identified. Assets that are not individually significant are collectively assessed for impairment by Northern Districts Cricket together with assets with similar risk characteristics. In assessing collective impairment Northern Districts Cricket uses historical trends of the probability of default adjusted for management's judgement as to whether current economic and credit conditions are such that the actual losses are likely to be greater or less than suggested by historical trends. An impairment loss in respect of a financial asset measured at amortised cost is calculated as the difference between its carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate.

Losses are recognised in surplus or deficit and reflected in an allowance account against loans and receivables or held-to-maturity financial assets. Interest on the impaired asset continues to be recognised. When an event occurring after the impairment was recognised causes the amount of impairment loss to decrease, the decrease in impairment loss is reversed through surplus or deficit. Individual trade receivables that are known to be uncollectible are written off when identified, along with associated allowances.

## Financial assets classified as available for sale

For Available-for-sale ("AFS") financial assets, Northern District Cricket assesses at each reporting date whether there is objective evidence that an investment or a group of investments is impaired.

In the case of equity investments classified as AFS, objective evidence would include a significant or prolonged decline in the fair value of the investment below its cost. 'Significant' evaluated against the original cost of the investment and 'prolonged' against the period in which the fair value has been below its original cost.

When there is evidence of impairment, the cumulative loss – measured as the difference between the acquisition cost and the current fair value, less any impairment loss on that investment previously recognised in surplus or deficit – is removed from net assets/equity and recognised in surplus or deficit.

Impairment losses on equity investments are not reversed through surplus or deficit; increases in their fair value after impairment are recognised in other comprehensive revenue and expense.

In the case of debt instruments classified as AFS, the impairment is assessed based on the same criteria as financial assets carried at amortised cost. However, the amount recorded for impairment is the cumulative loss measured as the difference between the amortised cost and the current fair value, less any impairment loss on that investment previously recognised in surplus or deficit.

Impairment losses on available-for-sale financial assets are recognised by reclassifying the losses accumulated in the fair value reserve in net assets/equity to surplus or deficit. In the case of equity investments classified as available-for-sale, objective evidence would include a significant or prolonged decline in the fair value of the investment below its cost. 'Significant' is evaluated against the original cost of the investment and 'prolonged' against the period in which the fair value has been below its original cost.

The cumulative loss that is reclassified from the fair value reserve in net assets/equity to surplus or deficit is the difference between the acquisition cost, net of any principal repayment and amortisation, and the current fair value, less any impairment loss recognised previously in surplus or deficit.

## Property, plant and equipment

Items of property plant and equipment are initially measured at cost, except those acquired through non-exchange transactions which are instead measured at fair value as their deemed cost at initial recognition.

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured under the Cost Model which shows initial cost including any expenditure directly attributable to the acquisition, delivery or installation (or fair value for items acquired through non-exchange transactions) less accumulated depreciation and impairment. Northern Districts Cricket's items are subsequently measured in accordance with the Cost Model.

Any gain or loss on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment (calculated as the difference between the net proceeds from disposal and the carrying amount of the item) is recognised in surplus or deficit.

Depreciation is recognised in surplus or deficit on a straight-line or diminishing value basis over the estimated useful lives of each component of an item of property, plant and equipment. Assets under construction are not subject to depreciation.

Depreciation methods, useful lives, and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted if appropriate.

## Impairment of non-financial assets

The carrying amounts of Northern Districts Cricket's non-financial assets, other than inventories, are reviewed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, then the asset's recoverable amount is estimated.

## Leases

Leases in terms of which Northern Districts Cricket assumes substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership are classified as finance leases.

### Operating leases

Leases that are not finance leases are classified as operating leases. Operating leases are not recognised in Northern Districts Cricket's statement of financial position. Payments made under operating leases are recognised in surplus or deficit on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease. Lease incentives received are recognised as an integral part of the total lease expense, over the term of the lease.

### **Income Tax**

Northern Districts Cricket is exempt from Income Tax under section CW46 of the Income Tax Act 2007.

### **Goods and services tax (GST)**

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the Inland Revenue Department is included as part of receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are included in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities, which is recoverable from, or payable to, the Inland Revenue Department is classified as part of operating cash flows.

### **Equity**

Equity is measured as the difference between total assets and total liabilities and is made up of the following components:

#### *Accumulated comprehensive revenue and expense*

Accumulated comprehensive revenue and expense is Northern Districts Cricket's accumulated surplus or deficit since its formation, adjusted for transfers to/from specific reserves.

#### *Available-for-Sale Fair Value Reserve*

As the available-for-sale investments is accounted for at fair value, the difference between the fair value in prior year and current year are recognised in the available-for-sale reserve.

### **Cash and cash equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents are short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

### **Inventories**

Inventories held for consumption in the provision of services that are not sold on a commercial basis are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. For inventory that was acquired through non-exchange transactions, the cost of the inventory is its fair value at the date of acquisition. For inventory held for the distribution or consumption in providing goods and services to be distributed at no charge or for nominal charge, these are measured at cost adjusted for any loss of service potential.

### **Prepaid Lease Assets**

Prepaid Lease Assets are recognised in the Statement of Financial Position and are amortised over the life of the remaining lease.
