CHAIR & CEO REPORT

MICHELLE HOLLANDS & BEN MACCORMACK

Change is all around us and we need to embrace the new world we live in. As an organisation we continue to seek efficiencies and improvements across the breadth of cricket in our region. The annual report itself is a product of yesteryear that we have started to shape in a different way and as part of that, this year will combine the CEO and chair report, including the thoughts of incoming Chair, Michelle Hollands, and the CEO.





After the significant structural change undertaken across ND in the 2018 winter, the pathway and community cricket roles were a major focus for the organisation. We have also welcomed new faces within our performance, coaching, finance and administration functions. The work done over the last 12 months has set a great platform for ND to continue leading the way in cricket within New Zealand.

The SkyCity Hamilton Northern Spirit welcomed its first ever full-time head coach, who returned to ND from a Scottish "summer" holiday with limited preparation. The gains made by the team were obvious with some huge wins during the Super Smash and if not for a slow start in the Lincoln section of the tournament, the team may have played finals.

The ladies also finished the 50-over season strong with a record-breaking performance at St. Paul's resulting in twin centuries to Kate Anderson and Felicity Leydon-Davis. It was pleasing to see the increased work paying off and we couldn't have been happier with having another WHITE FERN debut in Katie Gurrey. Her ball striking during the Super Smash couldn't be ignored and we hope she gets many more chances to show that at international level. Looking ahead, the focus will continue to be on growing the women's gameby building pathways and performance systems that encourage quality training and support systems.

Bernadine Bezuidenhout remains our only currently contracted WHITE FERN, however there are many pushing for selection and being included in future planning.

The Knights once again performed sensationally over the Super Smash, taking some huge scalps along the way. We qualified top to host the Grand Final, but it was Central Districts' turn to rip through our line-up on the big day. The boys played with their typical no fear approach and unfortunately this was the game it didn't come off. They can be very proud of back-to-back campaigns where they have been the dominant team and entertained the country with some exceptional cricket. There seem to be more titles in the squad yet.

ND continued to lead the way regarding contracted BLACKCAPS, led by the national captain Kane Williamson, Corey Anderson, Trent Boult, Mitchell Santner, Ish Sodhi, Tim Southee, BJ Watling, Neil Wagner and Colin de Grandhomme. We had three more represent the BLACKCAPS in Tim Seifert, Scott Kuggeleijn and debutant Daryl Mitchell. Having seen how hard all three of these guys work, it is no surprise and great reward for them to be getting noticed.

The three major venues in ND (Cobham Oval, Bay Oval and Seddon Park) all once again performed at a high level. We are the envy of the Major Associations to have three worldclass grounds. The grounds staff, councils, trust and their employees should all be congratulated for how they presented outwardly to the world that watched on. We are blessed to have three international venues along with first-class facilities at St. Paul's, Owen Delany Park, Weymouth Oval and Harry Barker Reserve across our Association and we thank them all for their tireless efforts. We would like to also acknowledge the \$5m investment Hamilton City Council has made in new LED lights for Seddon that all will enjoy from the 2019/20 summer onwards.

We also recognise the need for a true first-class home for ND, where our teams can prepare on grass, and are working hard on finding a solution. Over the next six months we will complete a feasibility assessment to ascertain our need and options.

Off the field, ND recorded its sixth consecutive profit. With uncertain funding times ahead of us and ambitions to build a new home for ND the equity built over this period continues to hold us in good stead.

We are still being financially prudent in budgeting close to a breakeven year whilst always looking for opportunities to increase revenue. Our existing and newly joined partners have a major role in this, and we thank them immensely. Foster Construction and partners, Splice Construction, SkyCity Hamilton, Carpet Mill, Mediaworks, Pan Media, Good George, Adfence, Les Mills, Novotel, New World, NZ Sign Company, Printhouse, Riverside Property Management, The Instillery, Cricket Express, Rothbury Insurance Brokers, Kookaburra, McCaw Lewis Lawyers, Pernod Ricard, X-site Group, ISC and BNZ have all been with us for multiple years.

Cricket is one of many sports that is incredibly well supported by the community funding system in place in New Zealand. In no specific order, ND Cricket thanks the following organisations for their support of cricket in our region: Sport Waikato, Trust Waikato, The Lion Foundation, Grassroots Trust, New Zealand Community Trust, Trillian Trust, Pub Charity, Infinity Foundation, The Southern Trust, One Foundation and New Zealand Racing Board.

In forming a relatively new team, we would both like to say thank you to all our stakeholders and community for supporting us in continually making cricket a great game for all New Zealanders. Having both worked across sporting organisations for many years, we know we have something special in ND and want to keep leading the way into the future.

The board of Northern Districts have supported management in guiding the strategic outcomes of the organisation over the last year. Our focus has been on ensuring a year-end profit to support facility development and growing our support for the community game. During the year we received the resignation of Peter McGlashan, who we wish to thank for his contribution to the board over many years. Peter's knowledge of high performance sport, media and cricket at all levels provided a much valued perspective at our board table.

Lastly, to the vast number of people out there who support cricket; we thank you. Many people make-up a cricket community including members, supporters, parents, coaches, managers, scorers, umpires and school teachers and, without you, we don't have a game.

PERFORMANCE AND PEOPLE REPORT

DANIEL ARCHER

An injection of new and returning faces into key roles across the performance department were welcomed to Northern Districts in preparation for the 2018/19 domestic season.

John Bracewell began his tenure as Knights head coach in the Plunket Shield and Ford Trophy, whilst Kari Carswell was welcomed back from Scotland and appointed as Spirit head coach and female pathways manager. This role was the first o

its kind; setting the standard and leads change across the country in the appointment of full-time staff into the female domestic game. Tash Narasy has more recently joined the team from Sport Waikato in the role of performance and pathways coordinator; a key support and administrative role across all programmes.

The final major staff change was the splitting of the previously defined director of cricket role, held by Peter Zanzottera, into the two strategic general manager positions in pathways and performance. This presented the exciting opportunity for me personally at Northern Districts Cricket in the newly created general manager of performance and people role. This role has allowed for the internal development of a Northern Districts high performance strategy in line with the New Zealand Cricket High Performance Agreement. This agreement has established a set of key performance indicators around Major Association planning, reflecting and reporting, attached directly to funding. The development of the NDCA high performance strategy, as outlined on the next page, has allowed us to ensure we continue to position ourselves as leaders in the delivery of cricket in New Zealand.

A key aspect of the outlined strategy is the alignment and collaboration of the performance staff that drive and

set the environment for our players to thrive. The importance of functioning as a team is no different to our expectation from those men and women that take the field during the course of a summer to represent Northern Districts. It was fantastic to see many of the quality people in positions across our performance programme receive some form of recognition or reward for their continued professionalism in their chosen fields. 

From an on-field perspective it was an extremely busy and eventful summer on both the domestic and international level. The BLACKCAPS hosted matches against India, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh across all three formats whilst the WHITE FERNS hosted India in three one-day and three T20 internationals. The three T20 internationals were hosted as double-headers for the BLACKCAPS and WHITE FERNS, with one of those matches held at Seddon Park.

We had 10 players enter the summer with New Zealand Cricket contracts, nine as BLACKCAPS (Corey Anderson, Trent Boult, Mitchell Santner, Ish Sodhi, Tim Southee, BJ Watling, Kane Williamson, Neil Wagner and Colin de Grandhomme) and one as a WHITE FERN (Bernadine Bezuidenhout). A further four players represented the country during the course of the summer, with Daryl Mitchell, Tim Seifert and Scott Kuggeleijn playing for the BLACKCAPS and Katie Gurrey the WHITE FERNS. Kate Anderson was also selected to play for an Emerging WHITE FERNS team against an Australian XI, whilst Nick Kelly, Sandeep Patel and Katene Clarke all represented a NZ XI vs Bangladesh in a warmup fixture.

On the domestic front the schedule provided a demanding season split across formats from October through until March. In the Plunket Shield, a fourth-place finish was aided by claiming the most bowling points of any side, yet impacted by being on the wrong side of two very close last wicket results, and the limited ability to claim batting points throughout the



season.

The Hallyburton Johnstone Shield competition created a tough and challenging platform for the Spirit, but importantly allowed for great individual and team growth across the ten matches held on five weekends. Although only coming away with the one victory, an amazing one in that with a record run chase against Canterbury, the lessons learnt are an important foundation for the future of the Spirit.

The Burger King Super Smash took on a new-look structure this season, with the women playing five matches in a centralised round at Lincoln in late October; prior to the formal start of the competition in December. During the December and January window, the opportunity of doubleheaders for the Knights and Spirit appeared in the calendar for the first time, with ND having two double-headers at Seddon Park and one at Bay Oval. These double-header matches provided a great internal opportunity at Northern Districts, aligned to our high performance strategy of creating a 'One Association' environment across multiple teams; in particular our two elite domestic teams in the Knights and Spirit. With regard to the results, our Spirit started with a bang against Wellington in Lincoln and then grew with the competition to finish the five-game back-end of the season with a further three wins. Finishing with a four-win/five-loss record and one match abandoned, the Spirit displayed at this format they are ready to become extremely competitive with the greater development of consistency.

The Knights again had a very successful Burger King Super Smash competition, which produced another home final at Seddon Park. This year, however, the ending was less fortunate, with our poorest performance of the campaign handing Central Districts the title. Again, the quality and reputation of our programme assisted in attracting top-end international talent, with Chris Jordan returning for two matches and South African paceman Kyle Abbott joining the Knights for five matches and the final. Across all formats and competitions this year there were numerous outstanding achievements from both team and individual. A small selection of these are listed below;

- Daryl Mitchell scored the third-highest total runs in the Super Smash (323) including hitting the most sixes in the competition (19)
- Scott Kuggeleijn was fourth-equal in the Super Smash for total wickets taken (13)
- The Spirit had two solid contributions with the bat across the Super Smash competition, with Katie Gurrey (298) scoring the second-most runs and Bernadine Bezuidenhout (228) fourth-most runs
- Ish Sodhi finished the Plunket Shield as the competition's leading wicket-taker, with 36 wickets from his seven games
- Kate Anderson and Felicity Leydon-Davis both scored their maiden List A centuries in a record-breaking partnership of 308 against Canterbury in the HBJ Shield

Upon reflection, there is a great deal for all of us to be proud of across the course of the 2018/19 season. There are, however, many things that present as an opportunity for us to continue our growth and development within the performance programmes. Cricket continues to evolve and change across the world and so we must look to ways of staying ahead of the curve and leading the way in this country. This requires an open mind and a contribution from all involved. Exciting times lay ahead.

COMMUNITY CRICKET REPORT

EIMEAR RICHARDSON

The 2018/19 season was one which saw many progressive changes for the communities throughout Northern Districts. Strongly led by New Zealand Cricket, the junior game saw the introduction of Age & Stage formats, which had a primary focus to enhance cricket participation through various rules, such as shorter wickets, smaller boundaries and reduced team numbers. Across over 30 competitions throughout NDCA, the region achieved 100% successful implementation throughout

all junior school, club and District formats.

To further enhance the participant experience, New Zealand Cricket launched a nationwide coaching framework which aimed to qualify all junior and youth coaches as, ultimately, this predominantly volunteer group are the key to ensuring a safe, fun and progressive environment for all participants. Across NDCA, 432 coaches are now registered, qualified and police vetted to best ensure alignment with the NZC purpose of ensuring safe, fun and progressive environments for all participants.

Through CricHQ, a new focus on player registration has also provided each DA and NDCA with clear understanding of participant numbers across the variety of competitions, programmes and cricket experiences. Across NDCA, 31,622 children experienced a cricket awareness session, which reached 26% of primary/ intermediate schools. Further to this, 9,534 students participated in a school programme (minimum four sessions) across 15% of primary/ intermediate schools. NDCA and all District Associations have a keen focus to effect the NZC vision; "A Game for all New Zealanders, A Game for Life."

With a strong focus to improve umpires, NDCA has appointed 'Area Training Officers' to four DA's while

continuing to support the additional two. An umpire pathway document has been produced and there is an ever-growing focus on the development of game officials.

In regular seasonal cricket, in addition to the 962 participants (years 0-2) who participate in the SuperStar Academy Programmes throughout NDCA, 40% of all junior cricketers play soft-ball cricket, while nearly 250 teams play hard-ball cricket. BOPCA, HCA and WVCA offered opportunities for girls to compete in all female junior competitions, which was really well received by the wider communities. BOPCA continues to offer GoGirls cricket for years 4-6, which finished with 33 teams from 20 different schools playing in a festival day on Bay Oval in bright sunshine. Counties Manukau offered the NZC pilot programme Yeah!Girls, which focused on growing participation for girls aged 10-14. The collective and shared learnings from these programmes will be a great resource across NDCA as each District prepares for the impact of the ICC Women's World Cup 2021, which is hosted in New Zealand.

At school level, nearly 100 teams competed to represent NDCA at the various national school championships, which are open to both boys and girls at intermediate and college level. In total, 72 boys teams and 22 girls teams participated. College cricket remains a strong focus point as across NDCA formats and opportunities are reviewed. Northland showed great success in growing the youth game through new club-led opportunities for this age-group.

At senior level, 6,700 players participated across NDCA with BOPCA representing 29% of this figure. Five Districts offered premier men's cricket, with Greerton CC from BOPCA earning a place in the 2019 National Club Championships. Twilight cricket continues to grow in popularity across NDCA with varying formats available for play. In collaboration with Sport Waikato, Hamilton Cricket Association offered a one-off female twilight event at Seddon Park called "Backyard Smash at Seddon", which drew in twelve all female teams for a oneoff event – a fantastic highlight for the region as the game strives to open opportunities for participation and play.

All in all 2018/19 has been a season of change and growth in many facets across the region. A new staffing structure increased focus on the community, while NZC led initiatives to improve experiences for both males and females exposed to and participating in the game. NDCA has established baseline knowledge across a number of key areas, from which the majority of 2019/20 goals can be created, with a continued focus on ensuring that cricket is "A Game for all New Zealanders, A Game for Life."



NORTHERN DISTRICTS CRICKET UMPIRES AND SCORERS ASSOCIATION (NDCUSA)

We need to acknowledge this enthusiastic group, without whom the game could not be played.

It was a successful season with regards to ND umpires being appointed to significant NZC fixtures, with many of our umpires standing in big matches. Ash Mehrotra, ND umpire of the year, officiated in several international fixtures and consistently received good reports from the first-class captains, while Damian Morrow was rewarded for consistent umpiring over th last couple of seasons with elevation to the national panel.

The future looks bright, with Thomas Nabbs winning the ND Emerging Umpire of the Year award and the continuation of our scholarship scheme for secondary school students to pursude umpiring. We gained two new student umpires through the scheme; both from Northland, and who went on to umpire at the ND Junior Secondary tournament in Rotorua. One of last season's scholarship umpires also continued in the scheme and, looking ahead, we already have two more interested in entering the scheme.

Doug Cowie was contracted to take a role in coaching and developing our umpires which included conducting courses, mentoring our ATO's and setting exams. We are very fortunate to have someone of Doug's international standing, who we share with Auckland in a dual-role capacity.

Andy Conners again was our appointments manager; a testing position as there are only so many games that he can make appointments for, and there is a large pool of ever-improving umpires to choose from.

Rob Kinsey filled the role of umpire assessor, and we thank him for his diligent work and excellent reporting, which all umpires would have benefitted from.





MASTERS CRICKET REPORT

12 teams entered the 2018/19 Masters competition, with each team having a playing schedule of between eight and 13 fixtures; six of these counting towards the points table.

Five of the teams were diligent in returning their results to ND in order to keep the points table current; the reward for the top-two teams being a final at Seddon Park.

Morrinsville Creamers finished unbeaten to go top, while Hamilton Planks (Players Long Ago Now Knackered) were runners-up, meaning these two contested the final in early-April.

The match, to be expected, was a close contest. Hamilton batted first and scored 206/6, with four batsmen reaching the mandatory retirement score of 30. The chase was under control at 124/3 in the 24th over, however they lost two quick wickets to allow the Planks back into the game; Morrinsville eventually falling 21 runs short.

A thoroughly enjoyable day was had by all, with the hope that the competition will continue on next season.

INTERNATIONALS

Northern Districts Cricket venues Seddon Park and Bay Oval hosted 10 international cricket matches throughout the 2018/19 season. This involved Sri Lanka and Bangladesh's tours against the BLACKCAPS, along with T20 and ODI double-headers against the Indian men's and women's teams.

Less matches were played at Northern Districts venues than last season, largely due to overseas fixtures in preparation for the ICC ODI World Cup in 2019. However, India A also toured against New Zealand A, playing right across the ND region – including Cobham Oval, which proved yet again to be a great boutique venue for international cricket – and comprised of three Test matches and three 50-over matches. This corresponds to NZ Cricket's further investment in the A programme.

NZ cricket fans were treated to some memorable results across the Northern Districts region. Two wins were claimed by the BLACKCAPS at Bay Oval against Sri Lanka and Seddon Park had flawless results, with the BLACKCAPS and WHITE FERNS beating India twice each.

OBITUARIES

Monica Leggat (1932-2019)

Monica Leggat, one of the true jewels in New Zealand Netball's crown, passed away on March 5 2019, aged 86.

Monica was the wife of ND Life Member Ian Leggat, and was a valued supporter of ND Cricket.

In a lifetime dedicated to netball, Leggat was renowned for her commitment and passion across a wealth of roles – among them Netball New Zealand (NNZ) president and manager of the world champion Silver Ferns and New Zealand Under 21 team.

For decades, she was the life force behind netball in the Waikato and across nearly 70 years, all of her contributions to the game and community were voluntary.

The woman known fondly as 'Mons' was famous for her organisational skills, as well as her quiet and unassuming way of going about her roles.

Even after receiving numerous honours recognising her dedication to netball – including a Life Member of NNZ – Leggat was still devoted to helping the grassroots level of the game grow.

Originally from Nelson, a province she represented on court, Leggat moved to Waikato where she immersed herself in education as a trained teacher and in netball.

She started on the committee at Netball Waikato in 1973, but her expertise soon saw her elected as president, a role she held from 1975 to 1997.

When the Waikato Bay of Plenty Magic franchise was formed, Leggat was the inaugural chairperson.

Her hard-working approach and meticulous planning made her an ideal manager for the New Zealand Under 21 team and the Silver Ferns, from 1985 to 1991.

During that era, Leggat helped guide the New Zealand team to win the World Games in 1985 and 1988, and the 1987 Netball World Cup in Glasgow.

She was also well-known as manager of Waikato representative teams.

She was a leader in netball administration at a national level, too. She joined the Netball New Zealand board in 1989 and served on the finance and planning committee, the tours sub-committee and the New Zealand tournament committee.

She was also elected president of NNZ in 2001.

Leggat's dedication was first recognised in 1988 when she received the NNZ Service Award and she became a life member in 2002.

There were many recognitions beyond netball, too. In 1999, Leggat was made a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit

(MNZM) for services to netball and the community.

In 2003, she received the Halberg Trust 'Service to Sport' award. In 2011, she was awarded the New Zealand Sport and Recreation 'Lifetime Achievement' award.

Samuel Beaton Baird (1932-2019)

An icon in Hamilton Cricket who played for the Old Technicals/ Fraser Technicals during the 1940s and 1950s, 'Sam' was then a major contributor to junior cricket and development team selections. He was also heavily involved in the senior side of the game and was President of the Association for 34 years (1961-1995). In 1996, Sam was deservedly awarded Life Membership.

Sam was a foundation member of the ND Junior Advisory Board in 1975 and served on that board throughout the 1970s and 1980s. He was also a member of the ND Senior Management Committee (now Board) from 1979-1983. Sam will be remembered by a host of age-group cricketers as he was organiser/manager of numerous ND primary and junior secondary school teams. In 1986 NZ Cricket awarded Sam the Sir Jack Newman Trophy for Services to Junior Cricket.

Sam was also renowned for his work as liaison officer for international teams playing at Seddon Park during the 1980s and 1990s. His obliging and good-humoured manner made him perfect for the role and he was highly-praised by the visiting teams.

Colin Stevens (1943-2019)

Hamilton Cricket stalwart, Colin Stevens, passed away on August 25, aged 75.

A right-hand batsman, Colin played his representative cricket in Canterbury. He represented Canterbury at Brabin Cup (U20) and Rothmans (U23) tournaments in the early 1960s. In 1966/67 and 1967/68 he made three first-class appearances for the Canterbury Plunket Shield team and was a consistent scorer in Christchurch club cricket.

Colin's teaching career (he went on to serve 28 years as deputy principal of Peachgrove Intermediate) brought him to Hamilton in the 1980s and he became involved in junior coaching and administration. Joining the Hamilton Cricket Association Board, he served as their coaching coordinator and in 1992/93, he became a Hamilton Senior Men's representative team selector; continuing in that role until the 2009/10 season. In 2000, he was rewarded with Life Membership of the Hamilton CA and in 2001 was appointed chairman, holding the post until 2010.

Colin was appointed to the Northern Districts Senior Men's team selection panel in the 2003/04 season and remained on that panel for eight seasons until 2010/11. His key role was to observe and provide feedback on prospective ND players playing at District Association representative level.

Plunket Shield Review

From a team perspective, the Plunket Shield was a season which on a report card from the teacher would probably say; "The Northern Districts team worked hard for its above-average

mark but, if we are honest, could have done better."

Three wins, three draws and two losses on paper looks okay, and one could argue that with the three draws, we either dominated or pushed the opposition captain to help advance a result, and thereby we were prepared to risk losing a match in order to win.

The win against Otago with most of the BLACKCAPS available, inside two days, on a very sporting wicket, was not ideal as two days' learning was lost.

This was followed by wins over Wellington on a very good Seddon Park pitch and CD, on an excellent surface once again, with both games getting maximum return from the time available.

The two losses against Auckland and CD were both away fixtures, with the CD match at Napier, probably the best nip-and-tuck match of the year, going right to the wire.

The three draws all played out differently, with ND needing a final wicket to secure victory, and Neil Wagner and Ish Sodhi doing everything possible to obtain it, against Canterbury away.

Wellington in Wellington looks odd on the scorecard as both captains entered into the spirit of obtaining a result, knowing that the last day was going to be a wash out.

And finally, a different attitude on display with Auckland taking a draw after showing little interest in manipulating a pretty flat surface in Whangarei to chase a result.

Four-day cricket is an investment in developing BLACKCAPS and with only eight rounds (instead of ten), it is important that we capture every learning opportunity that is available.

32 days need to be used fully and therefore playing on the best surfaces is paramount in producing good cricketers.

With more and more short-form cricket being introduced at

levels below first-class, anumber of younger (but no less talented) players are playing one-day cricket with very little, if any, multi-day cricket behind them.

With the Test Championship on the horizon too, it is imperative that these talented, but very inexperienced, firstclass cricketers get every day in we can.

The batsmen need to learn to bat a day and the bowlers need to be able to bowl multiple spells. Captains need to be able to manipulate a game in their favour and not sit back and let the pitches do it for them.

If we play our cricket on good surfaces we will need to develop better skills in thinking, bowling then batting, as initially batting will dominate.

A drawn match isn't a bad thing if both captains and teams have exhausted and challenged every possible opportunity to get a result, and you have just run out of time.





Hampton and Bocock both stepped up from their limited previous opportunities and showed their

versatility with the bat throughout the competition. With the ball, Brett Randell showed his potential and led the seam attack in Kuggeleijn's absence.

Like every competition we go in it to win, so narrowly missing out on the play-offs was very disappointing for the team. Despite this, we were able to add more depth and build on players experiences to hopefully benefit Northern Districts in the near future in this format of the game.

Season Review

My appointment came in August with only six weeks to get the team together and functioning before the first round of fixtures. The squad welcomed Lily Mulivai and Eimear Richardson to the fold, with Natalie Dodd moving to Central



Districts. Victoria Lind was appointed assistant coach and her experience and knowledge was welcomed and appreciated by all.

As in previous years the squad on paper looked to have real depth, with numerous options with the bat and ball. Samantha Curtis was appointed captain and although the results on the park didn't always go to plan, Sam did an outstanding job of keeping the team focused.

The pre-season camp proved a useful exercise in getting players on the same page and getting some form of role clarity and understanding in how we wanted to play the game.

The 2018/19 season started in earnest with the Super Smash central round in Lincoln during October. The first game against Central Districts was rained off so the Spirit waited patiently to get their season underway against Wellington. Tight bowling and excellent catching restricted Wellington to 109, and a well-timed innings from Eimear Richardson (43 off 45 balls), saw the Spirit win by four wickets.

After the Wellington performance, it's fair to say that the standards dropped significantly as the Spirit lost the next three games. Inconsistency with the bat cost the Spirit against Otago and Canterbury, but to the players' credit, they put that right with a score of 158 against Auckland. Some excellent batting and loose bowling allowed

Auckland to reach the score with 10 balls remaining The centralised T20 round showed that we were more than capable; a little more composure and games-sense would certainly see the players turn it around by the time the double-header matches arrived in December and January. The team found some excellent momentum and won three out of the five games in the second-half of the Super Smash, with excellent wins against Central Districts, Otago and Canterbury.

There were several highlights from the Super Smash campaign;

- Katie Gurrey scored 298 runs at an average of 42.57 and a strike rate of 121.13
- Bernadine Bezuidenhout scored 228 runs at an average of 32.57 and a strike rate of 106.04
- Alisha Rout put in a player-of-the-match performance against Otago, taking 3-15
- Eimear Richardson finished highest-wicket-taker with seven
- Chased down 167 against Canterbury at Hagley Oval to win

The 50-over campaign started with a reality check of where we were at. At 6/47 the Spirit looked like they would be bundled out for less than 100, but good application from Lily Mulivai and Briana Perry saw the team score 187. This was to be a theme for the Hallyburton Johnstone (HBJ) campaign; getting ourselves in trouble and on occasions, a couple of players digging deep and turning it around. Without doubt the HBJ was a disappointing campaign, but there remained some positives;

- Kate Anderson scored 160 not out v Catnerbury; her maiden first-class century
- Felicity Leydon-Davis scored 131* v Canterbury; her maiden first-class century
- Kate and Felicity shared an unbroken stand of 308 for the third-wicket against Canterbury
- Carolyn Esterhuizen taking 4-38 against Otago

Further positives were Bernadine Bezuidenhout and Katie Gurrey representing the WHITE FERNS and Kate Anderson playing in the NZC Development team against Australia in March. Congratulations to all three players from everyone associated with Northern Districts.

We certainly didn't lack will and determination throughout the season and, on other occasions with a little more luck, some of the results may have been different. The winter pre-season has given the players and staff a good opportunity to reflect and plan for the 2019/2020 season.

Thank you to all the players for your commitment and effort through out the season. Thanks to Vic Lind, Peter Zanzottera, Samantha Curtis and Maliah Tato for all your efforts behindthe-scenes; it certainly made the season run smooth.

There's no doubt that there are many challenges that lie ahead, but this group of players are determined to continue to progress and make further strides on the park next season; and inspire future generations to play cricket.

NORTHERN DISTRICTS A

The ND A programme has always been a key part of ND's development structures. This has taken on even greater significance in recent seasons, with the depth of promising players beyond age-group programmes, but not yet in the Knights set up full-time, being at such healthy levels.

- We needed to grow our schedule to allow our best prospects significant game time at a higher level
- We needed to include more internal fixtures to allow more players exposure
- The programme needed to align with the timings of the Senior Men's team programme to allow players opportunities to put their name forward
- We needed to expose players to all three formats
- We needed a good variety of opponents
- We needed to provide the players with high quality coaches to assist with their learnings

A few factors to think of when scheduling!

In the end, the programme consisted of 18 games across all formats, spanned 24 days and included games against Auckland, Wellington, Central Districts and an Indian touring side from the Karnataka Premier League; as well as a number of internal fixtures.

From a playing point of view, it was pleasing to see so many players grab their opportunities and perform their way into the selection frame for our senior team. There were many individual highlights throughout the season which led to numerous strong performances as a group. Whilst team results are not the focus at this level, it was pleasing to note that over the season the team was undefeated in both three-day and one-day cricket, with a four-win/four-loss record in the two T20 competitions.

The coaching team was generally led by one of the Knights assistants (Graeme Aldridge or Matt Horne), with support coming at various times from identified developing coaches in our region. This staff structure worked well, with players having high quality staff to learn off, and aspiring coaches also being given the chance to develop their own leadership skills, with experienced guides close at hand.

We are lucky in Northern Districts to have so many supportive partners when it comes to facilities. The games in 2018/19 were shared between St. Paul's Collegiate in Hamilton, Owen Delany Park in Taupo and Mountfort Park in Manurewa. All season we were treated to high quality wickets to play our cricket on which is crucial in the ongoing development of our cricketers. Special thanks needs to go to Ian Boyle and Mark Bailey at St. Paul's Collegiate, as well as Ben Sheriff and his team in Taupo for the countless hours they put in to prepare such excellent facilities, and for being such accommodating hosts.

As we look forward, we see that this programme continues to assume significant importance as a breeding ground for our future Knights and BLACKCAPS, and as such are committed to developing and improving what we have in place - roll on 2019/20.

Greerton again batted first, posting 198 all-out with Tom Renouf top-scoring with 61, while Nic Hendrie also notched a half-century.

Kamo's chase began solidly as they made their way past 50 for the loss of only one wicket, but an inspired spell of bowling from Greerton's Josh Bates tore through Kamo's middle-order and they never really recovered, eventually being dismissed for 135. Bates ended with 3/17 as Greerton won by 63 runs, and also won the right to represent Northern Districts at the National Club Championships in Auckland in April.

The Counties Manukau game also saw Tim Pringle return sensational figures of 7-25 off his 10 overs; the sole five-wicket haul in the Basil McBurney.

Hawke Cup

Hamilton ended the 2018/19 season with the Hawke Cup locked safely away after defeating Hawke's Bay in the last challenge of a season in which the Cup changed hands on three occasions.

The Cup started the season in the hands of Southland, who retained it against fellow zone four side Mid-Canterbury in the first defence of the season.

The Cup then passed to zone three challenger Nelson, who drew with Southland but outscored them in the first innings to win the Cup for the first time in 22 years.

The third of the four challenges saw the Cup on the move again, as zone two's Hawke's Bay beat their Central Districts counterparts by 10 wickets; the first outright victory in the Cup this season.

Hamilton qualified for the last challenge of the year after winning the most points in the Fergus Hickey Championship in 2018, which represents zone one.

Nelson Park in Napier was the scene for their match with Hawke's Bay, and the home side won the first challenge for the day; choosing to bowl after winning the toss.

After losing the top three relatively cheaply, Hamilton's middleorder all chipped in with runs, including half-centuries from Anish Desai and Freddie Walker, as Hamilton posted 287.

They may have been hoping to add a few more runs, but it was still a competitive total.

Hamilton then produced a fantastic bowling performance which set-up their victory, removing Hawke's Bay for 131 to give them that crucial first innings lead of 156.

The chief destroyer was Anurag Verma, who ripped through Hawke's Bay's top-order as he finished the innings with sensational figures of 6-30.

Verma would also play the lead role in the next innings, as he was promoted from nine to four in the batting line-up to topscore with 37 as Hamilton were bowled out for 178; Hamilton would need to ensure Hawke's Bay did not overhaul the target of 334 to win the Hawke Cup.

In a nervy final innings of the match, Hawke's Bay made a good attempt at chasing down the total, with three of their middleorder posting half-centuries to take them past 200 runs for the loss of only three wickets.

Four wickets then fell in five overs thanks to the combined efforts of Joe Walker, Freddie Walker and Verma to leave Hawke's Bay reeling at 236/8.

The last two wickets provided some resistance, but it wasn't long until the Walkers accounted for both of these to hand Hamilton a memorable Hawke Cup victory.

This tournament has been in place for a number of years and continues to grow in stature and quality, as evidenced by the fact the entire ND Under 15 team of 2018/19 was involved in the Kaipara Flats weekend.

From 2019/20 on, this tournament will become a part of the official age-group tournament programme that ND offers its young cricketers. Special thanks to Karl and Northland Cricket for all their hard work in making this tournament such a fun experience for all involved.

Junior Secondary Boys

The ND Junior Secondary School Boys tournament wrapped up in Rotorua in sunshine on Friday (7 December 2018), after the first four days were dogged by rain. There were a number of highlights during the three days where play was possible, with Bay of Plenty Coastlands winning the T20 title; following the championship silverware they won in Whangarei two years ago.

Leading the T20 run scoring stakes was Northland's Nathan Condon with 126 runs and a highest score of 95 not out. Logan Tindall from Waikato Valley finished in second-place with 103 runs to his name. Lochland Bolstad bowled extremely efficiently for his Waikato Valley side to finish with eight wickets in the T20 competition and a best of 4/11. Bay of Plenty Coastlands' Isaac White finished in second-place with six wickets. With the T20 title decider slotted into day four, the final day's play was a one-off round of 50 overs per side.

The match between Northland and Counties Manukau produced two sensational performances in the first innings. Northland batsman Nick Byles took control of his team's fortunes to blast 114 in an innings that contained fourteen fours as Northland were removed for 193. While the Northland opener dominated from one end, Counties Connor Hooper weaved magic with the ball to take 6/40. Led by a half-century from Louis Anderson, Counties got home with three wickets to spare.

Bay of Plenty Coastlands kept their tournament unbeaten record intact when they defeated the ND Invitation XI by four wickets. Hamilton beat Waikato Valley by 14 runs, with Bay of Plenty Lakelands posting 206/7 and then bowling Poverty Bay out for 120.

Senior Secondary Girls

Congratulations must be given to organisers, players and officials at the ND Secondary School Girls cricket tournament, who battled the elements in Tauranga over the three days to arrive at a successful tournament conclusion. With the first two days washed-out, a revised programme of three 10 overs per-side encounters were completed on day three. Both defending title-holders Hamilton and Poverty Bay went through the three quick-fire rounds of play unbeaten, however Hamilton grabbed a three-peat of ND titles courtesy of superior run-rate, taking home the Louise Milliken Cup for the third successive year.

The early morning match saw Hamilton defeat Northland in a game where both sides lost just a solitary wicket. Counties Manukau lost three wickets as they beat hosts Bay of Plenty, with Ella Farrell posting an unbeaten half-century, while Poverty Bay got past Waikato Valley. Hamilton's Emma Baker smashed 74 runs off just 30 balls before she was retired by her captain, with Hamilton then restricting Bay of Plenty to 46/3. Poverty Bay claimed a comfortable win over Counties Manukau with Rubi Perano in grand touch, posting an unbeaten 55 runs.

Tournament honours went to Hamilton's Emma Baker with 108 runs and Kayley Knight from Poverty Bay, who finished the tournament with five wickets to take out the bowling award.

The Gillette Cup T20 qualifier finals tournament was held in Manurewa, with four teams, who had qualified from their Districts, competing. Kamo High School beat Morrinsville College and St. John's College edged past Bethlehem College; these results setting up a final and 3rd/4th play-off.

The final was a closely contested game, with Kamo batting first and setting a total of 129/6 off their 20 overs. The stand-out performer of the innings was without doubt Nathan Parkes, whose 70 off 63 balls formed the backbone of Kamo's score. Harry Pedersen, Jackson Neale and Jack Kane all produced solid bowling performances, taking two wickets each.

DISTRICT ASSOCIATION SUMMARY



The 2018/19 season saw solid strategic plans in place by way of a thorough strategic planning process that was undertaken during the winter months. Clubs, groups, organisations and individuals all had the opportunity to contribute to the strategic direction that NCA was to take, for 2018/19 and beyond. New Zealand Cricket and Northern Districts Cricket were also instrumental in our strategic

planning process, and it was vital that our plans aligned with theirs to ensure we have continuity.

Based on the collective feedback and information we identified, NCA's vision is now; "A game for all New Zealanders, a game for life." Our values are; inclusivity, respect, tenacity, optimism, sportsmanship, integrity and fun. Our five key areas that we were to focus on for 2018-19 and beyond, are; 1. The best coaches, players, officials and support in cricket; 2. An aligned and effective cricket family; 3. New Zealand's summer game; 4. Fans for life; 5. Financial success. Each area has priorities and outcomes that are constantly discussed and measured – and they continually evolve.

The new strategic direction, along with the targets set by New Zealand Cricket, meant NCA and Northern Districts Cricket needed to investigate the possibility of structural changes, or adjustments to what we currently had, to ensure we could achieve the targets that had been set. We again worked closely together to find ways to reach and exceed our targets. Paul Hope was, in-turn, employed in a new role of cricket development manager (CDM) and Karl Treiber's role was adjusted as he became the pathway manager (PM). Both Paul and Karl are now jointly managed by NCA and Northern Districts Cricket and, although much of their individual roles are specific to the Northland region, they also have some standardised components of their job descriptions that enable them to work with other CDM's and PM's in ND. Although in the early stages, this model seems to be working effectively.

Northern Districts Cricket and CEO, Ben MacCormack, were extremely supportive of our Association, as were; John Bracewell/Graeme Aldridge/Gareth Hopkins/Matt Horne (Knights coaches), Pete Zanzottera and Daniel Archer (high performance), Eimear Richardson (community cricket) Cliff Dickeson (development officer) and Alayne Duthie (administrator). New Zealand Cricket's Martin Snedden, Andrew Tara and Kent Stead were fantastic supporters of the growth and development of cricket in Northland. They, along with the NZC high performance team, led by Bob Carter and Bryan Stronach, provided great guidance and support to NCA. Each of the aforementioned people were all committed to, and enthusiastic in, developing cricket in Northland and ND. Their efforts were thoroughly appreciated by NCA.

We have a great volunteer base; we are extremely fortunate to have such an obliging and cooperative group of people who support cricket in Northland. It is vital to acknowledge our coaches, managers and supporters in junior club cricket. It's a hard task, at times, for parents to coach and manage teams, and NCA appreciates and respects this.



After the magic carpet ride that went on in 2017/18, last year was relatively quite in terms of on-field feats.

We would have liked to have backed it up with another Hawke Cup campaign, but we only took the field in three of the eight days of Hawke Cup qualifying; the

weather quite literally being a dampener, and if you can't get on the track, you can't bank the points.

We made changes in the front office; Barry Rhodes who had been our RDO for four seasons moved on in May.

His role was split into two; Serena Somlyai took up the role of cricket development manager and Spencer Cramer became our first pathway manager.

Three women were elected onto the CMCA Board at the AGM-Dr Primla Khar, Melanie Kemp and Danisha Lang Siu.

It may or may not be related but we were pleased with the progress we made in female cricket during the season. The assistance we had from NZC and NDCA with Yeah!Girls was a huge fillip.

The icing on the cake was Katie Gurrey's selection for NZ. She is a born-and-raised South Aucklander and still lives here. After her personal success during the year it was gracious of her to attend our annual prizegiving.

The work we do in schools is still the heart of our business and the demand for it is very real. We worked with 10,000 primary school kids over the summer and we started a mid-week secondary school competition.

We bedded in Age & Stage in 2017/18; it's established and all that was needed to be done last season was some minor tweaking to make the cricket experience that much more enjoyable.

Our umpires continue to be front and centre, including Ash Mehrotra accepting the ND Umpires Award. The award has become CMCA property over the last decade with Ash, John Dempsey and Tony Hill keeping a firm hold on it. Back on the farm the local umpires, led by Phil Norvill, did excellent work.

Yes, it was a quieter year on the pitch, but with both the ND male and female players of the year coming from the District (Katie and Ish Sodhi) there's a feeling of fulfilment.

The CMCA Board keeps us on track, and we acknowledge Braedon Makgill, who stepped down as board chair during the season after nine years at the wheel.

DISTRICT ASSOCIATION SUMMARY



2018/19 was a very successful season for Hamilton in many respects.

Some local body projects came to fruition with the development of one of two grass blocks at Clyde Park, and the same again at Rototuna Park; both ready for use this season and the others, next

season. Galloway Park is being completely irrigated with a promise it will be ready for use after Christmas.

The outcome will be twelve grass blocks available in the city.

Our umpire numbers continue to grow and this is having a very positive impact on our game at the senior level.

The Association continues to work closely with our local body to progress the development of our Jansen Park pavilion; designed to meet the needs of our senior representative teams and provide a home for Hamilton Cricket.

Our junior numbers were down on previous seasons; not significantly, but still a concern.

The Age & Stage process was seamless for the Association as many of the alterations to conditions of play were already in place and being successfully played out.

The senior competitions were very well competed for with Hamilton and Waikato Valley (12 teams) challenging for the Spark Limited Overs Trophy; the final being held between Star University and Old Boys at Seddon Park.

We look forward to the inclusion of the four Counties teams in this coming season.

Seddon Park also hosted our most prestigious final (The Howden Cup) with Old Boys beating Marist in the three-day match.

However, our most outstanding achievements were winning the Fergus Hickey Rosebowl (after many years) and competing against Hawke's Bay in the final challenge for the Hawke Cup; a competitive match with Hamilton running out the successful challengers. The team is very excited and looking forward to the 2019/20 challenges.

Numbers at club level continue to be strong providing for variety and competitive competitions.

Six premier teams; 10 senior A teams; eight senior B teams and 14 senior C teams competed at club level last season, with sixty-eight twilight teams playing across Tuesday and Wednesday evenings.

Our challenge: to go one better in 2019/20 season.



The 2018/19 season was another positive year for the Waikato Valley Cricket Association.

All teams in our representative grades performed very well. Our Senior Men's side continues to put good performances together, finishing third in the Fergus

Hickey, with individuals starting to be recognised with ND A opportunities. WVCA are starting to get some traction in girls representative cricket and with the help of some fantastic volunteers, we have a number of girls involved with ND representative sides

We have seen changes in our office with Keith Vincent taking the role of cricket development manager and Janice Fraser the pathway manager between WV and HCA. This season, WVCA appointed a development officer, Ramesh Subasinghe, for the Thames, Hauraki and Coromandel area. This has seen the interest in cricket explode in the area and increased numbers to what they were in the early-2000's.

The board continue to work hard and look out for the best interests of the Association. We saw a couple of changes at board level with two females joining the table. We believe this is the first step in generating more discussion and getting more females involved with cricket and in line with NZ Cricket's vision of "A game for all New Zealanders, a game for life."

As always, cricket runs with an army of volunteers providing good experiences for our cricketers. These coaches, committee members, umpires, scorers, supporters are the backbone of our sport and we thank them for their support.

DISTRICT ASSOCIATION SUMMARY



Off the field, 2018/19 was a year of massive change for Bay of Plenty.

We have significantly restructured staff and roles in line with the strategic direction established by New Zealand Cricket and Northern Districts. The delayed finalisation of the Partnership Agreement meant that our key staff appointments

were not able to be finalised until mid-way through the season; our new team was only fully in place in January 2019.

Despite the extent and timing of the changes, our staff responded amazingly by achieving all agreed KPIs.

PATHWAYS

Barry Leabourn provides great service to BOP Cricket with media reporting and analysis of the results of all our representative teams, as well as local competitions. A series of Barry's annual season reviews was published on our website earlier in the year and can be viewed at bopcicket. co.nz. These are a wonderful summary of what has been another extremely successful season for Bay of Plenty Cricket at many levels. In particular, the successes of our senior men's teams, both premier and development, is notable due to the young age of the teams. This is a credit to the players, but also to the hard work put in by a large group of people within the pathways structure, led by Tai Bridgman-Raison.

DEVELOPMENT

Most of the areas of focus in the Partnership Agreement between NZC, ND and BOPCA are in community cricket. It is a testament to Scott Steward that, after starting his role as development manager in January, BOPCA achieved the highest KPI of any DA in the country for qualified coaches. Scott has coordinated a team of people engaged by BOPCA and our sub-Associations to deliver huge numbers of cricket awareness activity, as well as coach development programmes.

GIRLS CRICKET

Led by Rebecca Yee, BOP Cricket continues to be a forerunner in promoting girls' cricket. NZC and ND are currently developing new strategies for female participation and we look forward to increased support in this area in future.

FINANCIAL

The result is a significant improvement on the prior year and is a credit to the staff who have worked hard to control costs while grant funding continues to be constrained. We also acknowledge the support of our sub-Associations, who provided grants to alleviate financial pressure at the end of the year.

Although we have significantly reduced administrative costs, obtaining grant funding, particularly following the restructure of key roles, continues to be challenging.

Barb Thompson has proved to be an outstanding addition to the staff and has provided a new quality of financial oversight

and reporting.

The board will remain vigilant in monitoring against budget and will continue to seek opportunities to earn other revenue.

GOVERNANCE

During the year, several existing independent (i.e. not sub-Association representatives) board members stepped down due to travel, business or personal commitments. We took the opportunity to advertise for new board members and were delighted with the calibre of applicants. With other board members reaching the end of their current terms, five new independent board members will be appointed at the 2019 AGM.



Our season got off to an early start with PBCA hosting an ND training squad for four days for a squad warm-up match in September. The weather held and there was some very attractive cricket played on grass wickets. From a profile perspective it was a real positive for our community, particularly our juniors,

to have the opportunity to see some Knights players in our region.

It was a season of change and innovation with the creation of our Junior Colts League and evolution of our senior men's T20 competition. The Junior Colts League was launched with five teams playing nine-a-side over two formats; 15 overs on Wednesday and 30 overs on Saturday.

Our premier senior men's T20 competition, the Walker Shield, evolved to be a T15 competition along a franchise model being played with a pink ball. This brought a different dynamic to the competition as players were mixed; removing the club allegiances and allowing players who were so often rivals to play together.

This set-up our PBCA Senior Men's team up for the Brian Dunning tournament, with the team registering its first win over Northland at this level, and pushing Hamilton in a very competitive game.

We had 276 registered cricketers in our region for the season, which is a great launching pad for the coming season with preliminary numbers up across the board. From a financial perspective, we carried a small surplus for the season and are again budgeting for a surplus this coming season.

Statement of Accounting Policies

Northern Districts Cricket Association Incorporated For the year ended 31 July 2019

1. Statement of Accounting Policies

Reporting Entity

Northern Districts Cricket Association Incorporated ("Northern Districts Cricket") is incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908.

Northern Districts Cricket is a public entity for the purposes of financial reporting in accordance with the Financial Reporting Act 2013.

Statement of Compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with New Zealand Generally Accepted Accounting Practice ("NZ GAAP"). They comply with Public Benefit Entity Standards Reduced Disclosure Regime ("PBE Standards RDR") and Public Benefit Entity International Public Sector Accounting Standards ("PBE IPSAS") that have been authorised for use by the External Reporting Board for Not-for-Profit entities.

Northern Districts Cricket is a public benefit not for profit and is eligible to apply Tier 2 PBE standards on the basis that it does not have public accountability and is not defined as large.

Measurement Basis

Unless otherwise stated, the measurement base is that of historical cost. Reliance is placed on the fact that Northern Districts Cricket is a going concern.

Functional and presentation currency

The financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars (\$) which is the entity's functional currency, rounded to the nearest dollar.

There has been no change in the functional currency.

Use of judgements and estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the Board and management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

(a) Judgements

Judgements made in applying accounting policies that have had the most significant effects on the amounts recognised in the financial statements is revenue recognition- non-exchange revenue (conditions vs. restrictions).

(b) Assumptions and estimation uncertainties

Assumptions and estimation uncertainties that have a significant risk of resulting in a material adjustment in the year ending 31 July 2019 is the useful life, recoverable amount and depreciation method and rate of property, plant and equipment.

(c) Changes in accounting estimates

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements and have been applied consistently by Northern Districts Cricket.

2. Specific Accounting Policies

The following specific accounting policies have been used in preparing these financial statements.

Revenue

Revenue is recognised when the amount of revenue can be measured reliably and it is probable that economic benefits will flow to Northern Districts Cricket and is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

The following specific recognition criteria in relation to Northern Districts Cricket's revenue streams must also be met before revenue is recognised.

Revenue from non-exchange transactions

Non-exchange transactions are those where Northern Districts Cricket receives an inflow of resources but provides no (or nominal) direct consideration in return. With the exception of services-in-kind, inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions are only recognised as assets where both:

it is probable that the associated future economic benefit or service potential will flow to Northern Districts Cricket, and
 fair value is reliably measurable.

Inflow of resources from non-exchange transactions that are recognised as assets are recognised as non-exchange revenue, to the extent that a liability is not recognised in respect to the same inflow.

Liabilities are recognised in relation to inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions when there is a resulting present obligation as a result of the non-exchange transactions, where both:

- it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying future economic benefit or service potential will be required to settle the obligation, and
- the amount of the obligation can be reliably estimated.

The following specific recognition criteria in relation to Northern Districts Cricket's non-exchange transaction revenue streams must also be met before revenue is recognised.

Grants from New Zealand Cricket - General Funding and other non-exchange revenue

New Zealand Cricket (NZC) - General Funding and other non-exchange revenue is recognised when the conditions attached to the grant have been complied with. Where there are unfulfilled conditions attached to the grant, the amount relating to the unfulfilled condition is recognised as a liability and released to revenue as the conditions are fulfilled. Stipulations that are 'conditions' specifically require Northern Districts Cricket to return the inflow of resources received if they are not utilised in the way stipulated, resulting in the recognition of a non-exchange liability that is subsequently recognised as non-exchange revenue as and when the 'conditions' are satisfied.

Stipulations that are 'restrictions' that do not specifically require Northern Districts Cricket to return the inflow of resources received if they are not utilised in the way stipulated, do not result in the recognition of a non-exchange liability, resulting in the immediate recognition of non-exchange revenue.

Revenue from exchange transactions

Gate Receipts

Entrance fees for functions and events are recorded as revenue when the function or event takes place and are measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

Commercial Activities

Hosting and hospitality income is recorded as revenue when the function or event takes place and is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

Coaching & facilities

Revenue is recognised immediately where members, groups or individuals purchase specific services relating to coaching and development courses. At year end any revenues for which the conditions of receipt have not been met are then transferred to deferred revenue. Once the conditions have been met, the revenue is recognised in that financial year.

Sponsorship Revenue

Northern Districts Cricket receives cash and non-cash sponsorship in the form of goods and services. The fair value of the cash, goods and services received is recognised as Sponsorship revenue when it is probable that the associated future economic benefit or service potential will flow to the entity, and the fair value is reliably measurable.

Grant Revenue from NZ Cricket, Funding Organisations and Other Grants

Grant revenue, with the exception of NZC General Funding as discussed above, is recognised when the conditions attached to the grant have been complied with. Where there are unfulfilled conditions attaching to the grant, the amount relating to the unfulfilled condition is recognised as a liability and released to revenue as the conditions are fulfilled.

Employee Benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, annual leave and accumulating sick leave are recognised in surplus or deficit during the period in which the employee provided the related services. Liabilities for the associated benefits are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Financial instruments

Northern Districts Cricket initially recognises financial instruments when Northern Districts Cricket becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Derecognition

Northern Districts Cricket derecognises a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or it transfers the rights to receive the contractual cash flows in a transaction in which substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset are transferred. Any interest in transferred financial assets that is created or retained by Northern Districts Cricket is recognised as a separate asset or liability.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount presented in the statement of financial position when, and only when, Northern Districts Cricket has a legal right to offset the amounts and intends either to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Initial Recognition and Measurement

Northern Districts Cricket classifies financial assets into the following categories: fair value through surplus or deficit, held-to-maturity, loans and receivables, and available-for-sale.

Northern Districts Cricket's financial assets include: cash and cash equivalents, receivable from exchange transactions, quoted and unquoted investments. Subsequent measurement is dependent on the classification of the financial instrument, and is specifically detailed in the accounting policies below.

The fair value of financial instruments that are traded in active markets at each reporting date is determined by reference to quoted market prices, without any deduction for transaction costs.

Financial assets at fair value through surplus ordeficit

Financial assets at fair value through surplus or deficit include financial assets held for trading and financial assets designated upon initial recognition at fair value through surplus or deficit. Financial assets are classified as held for trading if they are acquired for the purpose of selling or repurchasing in the near term.

Northern District Cricket has not designated any financial assets at fair value through surplus or deficit.

Held-to-maturity

Non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments and fixed maturities are classified as held-to-maturity when Northern Districts Cricket has the positive intention and ability to hold them to maturity.

Held-to-maturity financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment losses. Northern Districts Cricket did not have any held-to-maturity investments during the years ended 2019 and 2018.

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Loans and receivables are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment losses.

Loans and receivables comprise cash and cash equivalents and receivables from exchange transactions. Cash and cash equivalents represent highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into a known amount of cash with an insignificant risk of changes in value, with maturities of 3 months or less.

Available-for-sale financial assets

Available-for-sale financial assets are non-derivative financial assets that are designated as available-for-sale or are not classified in any of the above categories of financial assets. Available-for-sale financial assets are subsequently measured at fair value with unrealised gains or losses recognised in other comprehensive revenue and expense and presented in the AFS fair value reserve within net assets/equity, less impairment. Upon derecognition, the accumulated gain or loss within net assets/equity is recognised in surplus or deficit. When investment is determined to be impaired, the cumulative loss is reclassified from the reserve to the statement of financial performance. Available-for-sale financial assets comprise equity investments and debt security.

Amortised cost financial liabilities

Financial liabilities classified as amortised cost are non-derivative financial liabilities that are not classified as fair value through surplus or deficit financial liabilities. Financial liabilities classified as amortised cost are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Financial liabilities classified as amortised cost comprise trade and other payables.

Derecognition

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled, or expires. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the derecognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognised in surplus or deficit.

Impairment of financial assets

A financial asset is assessed at each reporting date to determine whether there is objective evidence that it is impaired. A financial asset is impaired if there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the asset, and that the loss event had an impact on the estimated future cash flows of that asset that can be estimated reliably.

Objective evidence that financial assets are impaired includes default or delinquency by a counterparty, indications that a counterparty or issuer will enter bankruptcy, economic conditions that correlate with defaults or the disappearance of an active market for a security. In addition, for an equity security classified as an available-for-sale financial asset, a significant or prolonged decline in its fair value below its cost is objective evidence of impairment.

Financial assets carried at amortised cost (loans and receivables

Northern Districts Cricket considers evidence of impairment for financial assets measured at amortised cost (loans and receivables) at both a specific asset and collective level. All individually significant assets are assessed for specific impairment. Those found not to be specifically impaired are then collectively assessed for any impairment that has been incurred but not yet identified. Assets that are not individually significant are collectively assessed for impairment by Northern Districts Cricket together with assets with similar risk characteristics. In assessing collective impairment Northern Districts Cricket uses historical trends of the probability of default adjusted for management's judgement as to whether current economic and credit conditions are such that the actual losses are likely to be greater or less than suggested

by historical trends. An impairment loss in respect of a financial asset measured at amortised cost is calculated as the difference between its carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate.

Losses are recognised in surplus or deficit and reflected in an allowance account against loans and receivables or held-to-maturity financial assets. Interest on the impaired asset continues to be recognised. When an event occurring after the impairment was recognised causes the amount of impairment loss to decrease, the decrease in impairment loss is reversed through surplus or deficit. Individual trade receivables that are known to be uncollectible are written off when identified, along with associated allowances.

Financial assets classified as available for sale

For Available-for-sale ("AFS") financial assets, Northern District Cricket assesses at each reporting date whether there is objective evidence that an investment or a group of investments is impaired.

In the case of equity investments classified as AFS, objective evidence would include a significant or prolonged decline in the fair value of the investment below its cost. 'Significant' evaluated against the original cost of the investment and 'prolonged' against the period in which the fair value has been below its original cost.

When there is evidence of impairment, the cumulative loss – measured as the difference between the acquisition cost and the current fair value, less any impairment loss on that investment previously recognised in surplus or deficit – is removed from net assets/equity and recognised in surplus or deficit.

Impairment losses on equity investments are not reversed through surplus or deficit; increases in their fair value after impairment are recognised in other comprehensive revenue and expense.

In the case of debt instruments classified as AFS, the impairment is assessed based on the same criteria as financial assets carried at amortised cost. However, the amount recorded for impairment is the cumulative loss measured as the difference between the amortised cost and the current fair value, less any impairment loss on that investment previously recognised in surplus or deficit.

Impairment losses on available-for-sale financial assets are recognised by reclassifying the losses accumulated in the fair value reserve in net assets/equity to surplus or deficit. In the case of equity investments classified as available-for-sale, objective evidence would include a significant or prolonged decline in the fair value of the investment below its cost. 'Significant' is evaluated against the original cost of the investment and 'prolonged' against the period in which the fair value has been below its original cost.

The cumulative loss that is reclassified from the fair value reserve in net assets/equity to surplus or deficit is the difference between the acquisition cost, net of any principal repayment and amortisation, and the current fair value, less any impairment loss recognised previously in surplus or deficit.

Property, plant and equipment

Items of property plant and equipment are initially measured at cost, except those acquired through non-exchange transactions which are instead measured at fair value as their deemed cost at initial recognition.

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured under the Cost Model which shows initial cost including any expenditure directly attributable to the acquisition, delivery or installation (or fair value for items acquired through non-exchange transactions) less accumulated depreciation and impairment. Northern Districts Cricket's items are subsequently measured in accordance with the Cost Model.

Any gain or loss on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment (calculated as the difference between the net proceeds from disposal and the carrying amount of the item) is recognised in surplus or deficit.

Depreciation is recognised in surplus or deficit on a straight-line or diminishing value basis over the estimated useful lives of each component of an item of property, plant and equipment. Assets under construction are not subject to depreciation.

Depreciation methods, useful lives, and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted if appropriate.

Impairment of non-financial assets

The carrying amounts of Northern Districts Cricket's non-financial assets, other than inventories, are reviewed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, then the asset's recoverable amount is estimated.

Leases

Leases in terms of which Northern Districts Cricket assumes substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases

Upon initial recognition the leased asset is measured at an amount equal to the lower of its fair value and the present value of the minimum lease payments. Subsequent to initial recognition, the asset is accounted for in accordance with the accounting policy applicable to that asset.

Operating leases

Leases that are not finance leases are classified as operating leases. Operating leases are not recognised in Northern Districts. Cricket's statement of financial position. Payments made under operating leases are recognised in surplus or deficit on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease. Lease incentives received are recognised as an integral part of the total lease expense, over the term of the lease.

Income Tax

Northern Districts Cricket is exempt from Income Tax under section CW46 of the Income Tax Act 2007.

Goods and services tax (GST)

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the Inland Revenue Department is included as part of receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are included in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities, which is recoverable from, or payable to, the Inland Revenue Department is classified as part of operating cash flows.

Equity

Equity is measured as the difference between total assets and total liabilities and is made up of the following components:

Accumulated comprehensive revenue and expense

Accumulated comprehensive revenue and expense is Northern Districts Cricket's accumulated surplus or deficit since its formation, adjusted for transfers to/from specific reserves.

Available-for-Sale Reserve

As the available-for-sale investments is accounted for at fair value, the difference between the fair value in prior year and current year are recognised in the available-for-sale reserve.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Inventories

Inventories held for consumption in the provision of services that are not sold on a commercial basis are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. For inventory that was acquired through non-exchange transactions, the cost of the inventory is its fair value at the date of acquisition. For inventory held for the distribution or consumption in providing goods and services to be distributed at no charge or for nominal charge, these are measured at cost adjusted for any loss of service potential.

Prepaid Lease Assets

Prepaid Lease Assets are recognised on the Statement of Financial Position and are amortised over the life of the remaining lease.
