CHAIR SUMMARY

As we reflect on a memorable and successful season for Northern Districts Cricket, it's a pleasure to highlight the milestones that have defined a year of progress, achievement, and community connection across our region.

On the field, we celebrated a major triumph with the Plunket Shield title returning to the North, a testament to the dedication and resilience of our men's side throughout the first-class campaign. We also had the privilege of hosting a momentous occasion at Seddon Park, as BLACKCAPS legend Tim Southee played his final Test on home soil against England in December — a fitting farewell in front of a proud home crowd.

In the Dream11 Super Smash, both our men's and women's sides reached the elimination rounds, reflecting a strong and competitive showing from both squads. Our development pathways also flourished, with Northern Māori teams participating across all Rangatahi boys' ND age-group tournaments, and a commendable 90% of our Rangatahi girls' DA teams coached by women — a significant step forward for representation in the game.

At the individual level, Brett Hampton's outstanding performances were recognised nationally, as he was named New Zealand Domestic Player of the Year by NZC. In community cricket, Hamilton Marist Suburbs Cricket Club was honoured as New Zealand Club of the Year at the NZC Community Cricket Awards — a reflection of their vibrant spirit and commitment to grassroots growth.

Officiating excellence was also on display, with umpire Greg Pennell making his international debut in the WHITE FERNS ν Sri Lanka ODI on March 7 — a proud moment for our umpiring fraternity.

Investment in infrastructure remained a core focus, as our Regional Facility Fund enabled the development of seven brand new facilities and supported upgrades to 12 existing venues, enhancing playing conditions and community access across the district.

We also proudly hosted the 9th Annual National Over 60s Cricket Championship in Kirikiriroa-Hamilton, further reinforcing our region's standing as a hub for cricket at all levels and all ages.

District Association cricket continues to provide high-level playing opportunities for talented players. Bay of Plenty Cricket Association had a standout season, winning the Fergus Hickey Rosebowl two-day, and Brian Dunning Cup one-day men's competitions. They were denied a clean sweep, coming a very close second to Waikato Valley in the Northern Brave T20 Smash tournament. Strides forward have been made in the women's District Association space, with three fixtures played during the 2024/25 season and a larger programme being planned for subsequent summers.

I would like to thank all District Associations for their countless hours growing cricket throughout our community. NDCA staff and board members are excited to continue nurturing our relationships throughout the region to ensure that the game can thrive at all levels, and in all places.

Women's Programme

The ND Women had a season of mixed fortunes. They once again had an excellent Super Smash campaign, reaching the Elimination Final for the second straight season, where they were narrowly beaten by eventual winners, Wellington Blaze. This demonstrates the continued growth and consistency from the group in this format. There were also strong campaigns from Jess Watkin, overseas player Chamari Athapaththu, and Katie Gurrey, whilst all players contributed across the campaign which is why the team are becoming a formidable unit in this format.

© Owen Thompson www.photosport.nz In contrast, our HBJ campaign was disappointing, finishing 6th. After a promising first half of the season, the group struggled in the final two HBJ weekends and they simply couldn't put together the performances they were capable of.

The team did show flashes of brilliance — especially with the bat — highlighted by impressive totals and match-winning chases. Caitlin Gurrey's form was a major bright spot. Scoring 523 runs at an average of 52.30, including two centuries, placing her near the top of the competition's run-scorers

Overall, the team continues to improve as a unit. The team culture and environment is outstanding, and the skill level and execution is getting better every season. With a core of exciting young players the women's squad is well placed to achieve something special in the coming seasons.

Men's Programme

The ND Men's season was headlined by the fantastic Plunket Shield win. After missing out of the title last season due to rain, it was hugely satisfying for the team to finally lay hands on the Plunket Shield for the first time since 2011-12. To win the premier domestic competition takes a huge amount of skill, hard work and resilience, and it was great reward for captain Jeet Raval, coaches BJ Watling and Daniel Flynn, and all the players and support staff.

The Plunket Shield campaign was littered with outstanding individual contributions throughout, too many to mention. What does stick out though is the crucial nature of many of these performances. They often came at times when the team needed it most, again reflecting the never-say-die attitude and the mentality of the group as a whole.

In contrast the Ford Trophy campaign never really got going for the team and we finished 6th in this competition. We particularly struggled to bounce back in the 2nd half of the campaign post the Super Smash. I know the group will reflect well on a disappointing campaign and identify the key improvements to take into next season.

Finally, this season's Super Smash campaign was on the whole successful, but disappointing to come up short at the final hurdle. After a chastening campaign last season, where we finished 6th looking to defend our title, it was great to see the team get back to closer to their best short form cricket.

A massive highlight of the campaign was the form of Katene Clarke who scored 282 runs in the competition, including an excellent 90 against Auckland which he then followed up with an outstanding 106 against Otago in Dunedin.

Ultimately, the team were undone in the Elimination Final by a rampant Canterbury attack lead by Black Cap Matt Henry on a very bowler friendly Basin Reserve surface. It was an anticlimactic way to finish what was a strong campaign, but I know that will motivate the group to go one better next season.

Overall, the men's team had a strong 2024-25 season. It is a mature group with proven match winners and as we continue to blood our exciting talent coming through, there is no reason why this group can't go on to win further domestic competitions.

Representative Honours and Farewells

The season was also highlighted by a number of players achieving higher honours and also some significant retirements.

Mitchell Santner, Tim Southee, Kane Williamson and Tim Seifert all represented the Black Caps in the past season. Congratulations to Mitchell Santner who also became Black Caps captain for the white ball team, and lead the Black Caps Test team for the Zimbabwe series during the 2025 winter.

Congratulations to Matthew Fisher who became our latest Black Caps, playing in the 2nd Test against Zimbabwe. We hope Matt is the first of a rising group of young stars that we believe can have successful international careers.

Joe Carter, Kristian Clarke and Matthew Fisher represented NZA Men against Bangladesh and South Africa during the 2025 winter, along with Jess Watkin and Nensi Patel playing leading roles for NZA Women on their UK tour in June 2025.

Congratulations to Tash Wakelin (captain) and Eve Wolland for representing NZ u19 Women at the ICC u19 World Cup in Malaysia in January.

We also said goodbye to some legends of ND and NZ cricket at the end of the 2024-25 season. Tim Southee retired from International cricket and NZ Domestic Cricket after a stellar career that sees him go down as one of NZ greats.

Neil Wagner also bowed out of domestic cricket, finishing on an amazing high with ND, winning the Plunket Shield down in Dunedin, where it all started for him.

Congratulations to both men and thank you for all you have given ND and NZ cricket.

Northern Districts umpires had another very successful 2024/25 season. Umpires were appointed to all Senior District and Rangatahi tournaments. Umpire numbers have passed the 100 mark and well-represented in all District Associations. The umpire group had twelve off-season training sessions and has extended training to the regions. Umpires also participated in exchanges with Auckland and Central Districts.

We are very proud to report that all eight ND Regional Panel Umpires had officiated in NZC games this past season – a first for our umpire programme. All our observer panel members were also involved in NZC fixtures and tournaments.

ND's Regional Panel umpires officiated in more than 100 fixtures across Ford Trophy, Domestic A games, Super Smash and Hallyburton Johnstone Shield games. Greg Pennell, ND's Regional Official of the Year in both 2022-23 and 2023-24, has been appointed to the National Umpire Panel for the first time, while Damian Morrow and Stu Martin had televised games. Stu made his Ford Trophy and Super Smash debuts.

The Northern Māori programme had an exciting evolution of the opportunities provided across all levels this season. This year, for the first time, we saw four Northern Māori teams competing throughout the summer. The addition of the Northern Māori Emerging Rangatahi competing rounded out the set of four teams to be included in a tournament structure.

Throughout the summer Northern Māori
Tane and Northern Māori Wāhine competed
on the national stage whilst the Northern
MāoriYouth Rangatahi and Northern Māori
Emerging Rangatahi competed at the
Northern Districts Male Tournaments in
Gisborne and Whangārei. This programme
continues to be the beginning of a journey for
many to reconnect to their people, whenua
and culture through cricket.

The Northern Māori Tāne continue to strengthen the relationship with their traditional fixtures with Waikato University Chancellors XI, Northern Districts XI, Waipuna Valley Cricket Club and Seddon Cricket Club being the calendared fixtures for the season.

The Northern Māori Tāne and Wāhine competed side by side at the national competition in Tāmaki Makaurau. Despite a challenging week on the field for both teams, this represented an opportunity for Northern Māori to express their talent on a national stage and connect with other talented players from across Aotearoa. With both teams being young it bodes well for Māori cricket in the future for Northern Districts. Following on from the inaugural nationals in previous years a highlight continues to be the cultural experience, but also the competitive nature of the tournament which saw many young Māori competing against those with international or domestic playing experience.

The Northern Māori Rangatahi programme continued for its third season of competition and this year saw the introduction of the Northern Māori Emerging Rangatahi team which competed at the Northern Districts Emerging tournament in Gisborne in

December. The Northern Districts Youth Rangatahi tournament which was held in Whangārei included the Northern Māori Youth Rangatahi team for the third consecutive year. This season saw Ethan Price (Northern Māori Tane), Marama Downes (Northern Māori Wāhine and Northern Districts), Sebastian Heath (Northern Māori Emerging Rangatahi) and Cooper Goodhew (Northern Māori Youth Rangatahi) as the influential captains.

2024/25 was a proud year for Northern Māori across the programme and it continues to give the coaches, managers and players a chance to represent their whakapapa with pride. Johnathan Gray, Marama Downes and Sebastian Heath were named as the Rangatahi, Wāhine and Tāne players of the year respectively. Tim Southee signed off a historic Test career in style on home turf at Seddon Park as the BLACKCAPS secured an emphatic 4-day win over England, equalling their record victory

Kane Williamson's 156, the 33rd Test century of his sparkling career, was the backbone of New Zealand's second innings as England were set an improbable 658 runs to win.

England were bowled out cheaply again for 234 which proceeded Tim Southee walking off to a standing ovation, fittingly picking up two wickets in the match from the 'Tim Southee End' and falling agonisingly short of hitting 100 career sixes in Test Cricket, holing out in the second innings to finish won 98.

The Test match wrapped up an excellent series against England, with bumper sell-out crowds throughout, an intriguing clash as styles with Brendon McCullum & Ben Stokes continuing to play an aggressive brand, and the retirement of a New Zealand legend, who finishes his Test career 391 wickets, second only to Daniel Vettori.

BLACKCAPS v Pakistan 2 April 2025, 2nd ODI

New Zealand clinched the second ODI and the series with an 84-run win over Pakistan in Hamilton.

Batting first, the BLACKCAPS posted 292/8, thanks to a brilliant unbeaten 99 from Mitchell Hay. His explosive knock, including 22 runs in the final over, lifted New Zealand from 132/5 to a strong total. Muhammad Abbas (41) and Nick Kelly (31) provided key support, while Sufiyan Muqeem stood out for Pakistan with 2/33.

Pakistan's chase faltered early, collapsing to 32/5. Despite fighting half-centuries from Faheem Ashraf (73) and Naseem Shah (51), they were bowled out for 208. Ben Sears claimed 5/59, with Jacob Duffy taking 3/35.

BLACKCAPS take victory in eight-run thriller

BLACKCAPS vs Sri Lanka 28 December 2025, 1st T20i

New Zealand secured a thrilling 8-run victory over Sri Lanka in the first T20I at Mount Maunganui, taking a 1–0 lead in the three-match series.

After being reduced to 65/5, the BLACKCAPS were rescued by a 105-run partnership between Daryl Mitchell (62) and Michael Bracewell (59), setting a total of 172/8.

Sri Lanka appeared poised for victory with an opening stand of 121 between Pathum Nissanka (90) and Kusal Mendis (46). However, Jacob Duffy's pivotal 14th over, claiming three wickets, initiated a collapse. Sri Lanka ultimately fell short, finishing at 164/8.

Further delight at Bay Oval for BLACKCAPS

BLACKCAPS vs Sri Lanka 30 December 2024, 2nd T20i

New Zealand secured a 45-run victory over Sri Lanka in the second T20i at Bay Oval, Mount Maunganui, clinching the series 2–0.

Batting first, the BLACKCAPS posted 186/5, with significant contributions from Mark Chapman (42 off 29), Tim Robinson (41 off 34), and Mitchell Hay (41* off 19). Hay's explosive finish, featuring four fours and two sixes, propelled the team to a formidable total.

In response, Sri Lanka managed 141 in 19.1 overs. Kusal Perera top-scored with 48 off 35, while Pathum Nissanka added 37. However, Jacob Duffy's impressive 4/15 dismantled the middle and lower order, ensuring a comfortable win for the hosts.

International double-header a mixed bag for New Zealand sides

BLACKCAPS vs Pakistan 23 March, 2025, 4th T20i

New Zealand delivered a commanding performance at Bay Oval, defeating Pakistan by 115 runs to clinch the five-match T20I series 3–1 with one game remaining.

Batting first, the BLACKCAPS amassed 220/6, propelled by Finn Allen's explosive 50 off 20 balls, including six fours and three sixes. Tim Seifert contributed a rapid 44 off 22 deliveries, while captain Michael Bracewell added an unbeaten 46 from 26 balls to solidify the innings. Haris Rauf was the standout bowler for Pakistan, claiming 3 wickets for 27 runs.

In response, Pakistan's batting lineup crumbled under pressure, managing only 105 runs in 16.2 overs. Jacob Duffy spearheaded New Zealand's bowling attack with figures of 4/20, and Zak Foulkes supported with 3/25. Abdul Samad was the sole resistance for Pakistan, scoring 44 off 30 balls.

New Zealand completed a 3–0 series sweep over Pakistan with a 43-run victory in the third ODI at Bay Oval, Mount Maunganui. The match, reduced to 42 overs per side due to a wet outfield, saw the BLACKCAPS post 264/8 before dismissing Pakistan for 221.

Batting first, New Zealand was anchored by Rhys Mariu, who scored a composed 58 off 61 balls in just his second ODI. Captain Michael Bracewell added a rapid 59 off 40 deliveries, including six sixes, to propel the hosts to a competitive total. For Pakistan, Akif Javed was the standout bowler with figures of 4/62, while Naseem Shah contributed with 2/54.

In response, Pakistan's innings faltered despite a 50 from Babar Azam and 33 from Abdullah Shafique. Ben Sears led New Zealand's bowling attack with a second consecutive five-wicket haul, taking 5/34. Jacob Duffy supported with 2/40, ensuring Pakistan were bowled out in 40 overs.

Plunket Shield Review

Coming off the back of a season where we came agonisingly close to winning, we knew this campaign would require subtle adjustments and continuing to put ourselves into winning positions as often as possible. But the questions lingered, were we able to let the disappointment of last season go and build on the positives? The Plunket Shield comprises eight games spread across the season, with four games played in November and four games in March. The competition requires remaining present and not looking too far ahead. The classic 'each ball at a time', 'each session at a time', 'each match at a time' mentality.

The journey began at Hagley Oval - a ground where we have notoriously struggled to get a result in our favour. Canterbury is a well-rounded team and have been for a long time, so we knew we would have to hit the ground running. Canterbury made a strong start in the 1st innings scoring 361/9. Kristian Clarke was the pick of our bowlers with four wickets. In our 1st innings we were able to get 350 and collect the maximum batting points. There were contributions throughout the innings, but at 241/7 at one stage, things looked precarious. Ben Pomare scored a patient, crucial 36 along with Clarke (31), Wagner (30) and Fisher (12*) to guide us to parity. We understood this game needed us to change it and day 3 was about putting their batting side under pressure. The wicket was flat and would take a big effort to give ourselves a chance. Our bowling unit were aggressive throughout, led by Matthew Fisher (3/30), Neil Wagner (2/60) and Brett Hampton (2/30). We bowled them out for 193 in 58 overs. Needing 203 runs to win, Jeet Raval (93) and Bharat Popli (74) put on a calm, but big partnership to get us comfortably over the line, before any afternoon rain was able to play a part. It was a great way to kick off the campaign.

We moved on quickly to Seddon Park for back-to-back games there. A ground where we have had success and love playing at. Our first game would be against our neighbours, Auckland. We had a couple of changes to the line-up with Kane Williamson and Tim Southee returning in preparation for their upcoming test series. They were pretty good replacements to have join us - two of New Zealand's best and great leaders of our game for a long period of time. We were put into bat on day one and managed to get 263, with Kane Williamson scoring 63 on a surface that offered enough for the bowlers and was hard work for our batters. We knew there was enough in it still if we were able to bowl well. Scott Kuggeleijn led us with the ball and picked up a five-wicket bag, along with Brett Hampton (4/46). Auckland was bowled out for 150. Ahead of the game now, we were able to declare at 252 in the second innings (58 overs), with a century from Jeet Raval and a half century from Henry Cooper doing the bulk of the damage. Auckland was set 371 to win and our bowling unit were able to get the job done in 58 overs, with Kuggeleijn again leading the charge, picking up four wickets and completing the match with nine overall.

Our second fixture at Seddon Park was against Otago, where we won the toss and sent them in. We knew rain would be playing a part in this one and the match could potentially be reduced at some point. Otago played well to score 301/9 in their 1st innings on a tricky surface for batting. In our 1st innings we were put under lots of pressure and at 4/26 and 5/69 we looked a long way from being in the game. Night watchmen Kristian Clarke and Brett Hampton proceeded to rebuild in their own fashion. Hampton scored a fantastic 121 off 86 balls, while Clarke contributed 59 off 169 balls. Contrasting innings from the pair, but a partnership that was able to break the back of Otago and get us back into the game.

With rain forecast we needed to make a play with the ball and give ourselves a chance. Again, we were able to do that and managed to bowl Otago out for 231, with Matthew Fisher picking up four wickets alongside Brett Hampton's three and Neil Wagner's two. We were set a target of 168 with plenty of remaining overs but forecast rain, and some not so forecast rain, was in play. We were hoping for at least 50 overs to get the job done, but unfortunately this wasn't to be. Our top order pushed ahead and got us within 23 runs of winning in the space of 24 overs, with Robbie O Donnell clobbering 33 off 11 balls, when rain and darkness descended. The groundsmen worked tirelessly to get us back out but it wasn't to be, and we left with a draw.

We moved on from Seddon Park to Bay Oval at the Mount. Our opponents were Central Districts (CD) - always tough to beat especially at the Oval. After a toss loss we were put into bat in tough batting conditions with seam and swing on offer to the bowlers. We managed to put 204 on the board, with fighting scores from Bharat Popli (61) and Sandeep Patel (45) helping our cause. With ball in hand, we didn't make the impact we would have liked as a bowling unit, despite Matthew Fisher being at his best and bowling accurately and with skill to pick up four wickets for 46 off 21 overs. We were unable to put them under enough pressure and CD put on 391. With such a big lead and a flattening wicket, it would take a huge effort to remain in the game. The team proceeded to bunker down and not relinquish any more points. Jeet Raval scoring 107 off 397 balls - with contributions throughout the batting order. Those contributions being more time spent in the middle rather than runs, with seven of our batters facing 70 balls or more. It was a team effort to hang on for a fighting draw.

Heading into the back half of the season placed near the top of the table with the chance of winning a campaign is always a nice place to be and we knew what was in store for us. First up was Canterbury at Seddon Park, where we lost the toss and were put into bat. Canterbury got things moving quickly and we found ourselves 7/115 and under all sorts of pressure. A fantastic century by Joe Carter, on his return in this format, helped guide us, along with Kristian Clarke (48), to a respectable total of 278. We managed to stay ahead with the ball, dismissing Canterbury for 222, with Josh Brown doing most of the damage (4/51). Our second innings with bat was led by Bharat Popli (125) and Tim Seifert scoring an aggressive, but calm 83 (from 63), helping us to a lead of 437. This always seems like a lot of runs, but we have learnt from past experiences that we still need to bowl well and create opportunities. Canterbury was able to build partnerships and keep things moving throughout the chase and at 5/330 it was certainly game on. You are always only one wicket away in first class cricket and we were able to make break throughs from then on, dismissing Canterbury for 382. Kristian Clarke was the standout performer with 5/69.

On to Eden Park. This year Eden Park has been a bit of a bowler's graveyard, so we knew we had a big task ahead with ball in hand. We bowled first and fought hard to dismiss them for 329 in 110 overs. Jeet Raval chipped in with 3/12, Brett Hampton with three and Rohit Gulati picked up two on debut. Our batting innings was led by half centuries by Jeet Raval and Bharat Popli and a big hundred for Henry Cooper (148). In the end we manged to gain a lead of 126. On day three we were able to make inroads into their line up and had them 6/140, however we knew the next day would still hold some toil – and it did! A fantastic fight back from Auckland blunted our efforts and we were unable to get the job done in time to make a chase of it. Jeet Raval managed to collect a five-wicket bag and our bowlers threw everything at it for 146 overs, but it was not to be.

The competition was really tightening up as we headed to the Basin Reserve, facing a final of sorts, and a game we needed to win or at least draw to stay in the hunt. A fairly green surface was presented, and we lost the toss and were put into bat. Tough conditions saw us bowled out for 119 - a rough start to the fixture. With work to be done we managed to stay in the hunt bowling Wellinton out for 189, with all our bowlers doing their job as a collective. 60 runs behind and needing to put some sort of total on as the wicket flattened out, Robbie O'Donnell produced his first century in ND colours. His 150 runs under pressure, alongside Brett Hampton's 72, gave us a sniff, albeit with a modest target of 266. Into day three and we were able to keep chipping away at the Firebirds batting order, with Josh Brown picking up the key wickets of Blundell and Smith in the same over giving us hope. At 6/156, they still needed 110 runs to win. We managed to pick up two more wickets that day and had them seven down needing 39 runs - game on as bad light forced us into the final day. A wet final morning prolonged things and it wasn't until 2pm that we were able to have a crack at the task in hand. Scott Kuggeleijn's bowling, combined with some brilliant catching from Robbie O'Donnell, sealed the win. It's a game I'm the sure the guys will remember for a long time, that ebbed and flowed throughout. The pressure was high and every ball mattered. From a coach's perspective, it was pleasing to see our ability to execute under those circumstances the guys didn't shy away at all.

It was all still to still play for heading into the final round and the group understood we had to win this game of cricket, with Wellington and Canterbury still very much in the hunt and playing each other. The odds were on one of them walking away with a decent chunk of

Dunedin is generally gloomy, with dew and bad light often playing a role so we knew we wouldn't likely get four days of cricket in. Put into bat again, we managed to put a strong total on the board with Joe Carter's second first innings century of the season a standout. There were contributions throughout the innings and half centuries from Scott Kuggeleijn and Jeet Raval took us to 7/411. In arguably our best first innings bowling performance, we bowled them out for 148 in just 56 overs - Jeet Raval again proving very valuable with the ball picking up 4/20 and Neil Wagner taking 3/33 in his last first-class game on New Zealand soil. Understanding that conditions were likely to shorten the game, we needed to boost our total and get back out there to take 10 wickets. Scott Kuggeleijn blasted New Zealand's quickest half century off 19 balls and finished with 74 (from 26) - a knock that gave us the opportunity and time to win the match. The scene was set, with 407 runs to play with, and plenty of overs remaining, day three ended with Otago 3/103. Our wicket tally boosted late in the day with Raval bowling into the rough and producing some absolute beauties to their left handers. We went into the final day with seven wickets to win . As predicted, the final day saw dew and bad light feature and we were unsure how many overs we would get it. With this in mind, the team was in full attack mode and Neil Wagner was leading the charge, using the short ball to good effect. He was supported by Josh Brown and bother were relentless against the Otago batters, with Wagner picking up five wickets and Brown nabbing a crucial two. Henry Cooper sealed the deal with his off spin, taking the wicket and capped off an extremely polished performance and season for our group. After 12/13 long years and the agony of coming so close last year, the guys fought hard, battled ups and downs, but more importantly turned up day in and day out to take home the title.

It was a season with contributions from a lot of players, including some standout performances under pressure. Jeet Raval and Brett Hampton were among those to consistently put performances on the board. Both having outstanding seasons. As a group though we were extremely proud of everyone efforts at different stages.

Ford Trophy Review

One win and eight losses tell the story of our Ford Trophy campaign. We finished a long last in the competition. Canterbury defeated Auckland in the final. With our triumph in the Plunket Shield and our reaching the finals in the Super Smash, this was the low point of the season. It was to our credit that we were then able to bounce back in spectacular fashion to win the Plunket Shield. All credit to our coaches and team leadership for staying positive and restoring a winning mentality.

When we could do so well in the other formats, how did we end up so far off the pace in the Ford Trophy? Statistical analysis points to some underlying reasons.

- Our batsmen underperformed. With a couple of exceptions, our averages and strike rates were below those of all other teams.
- Our bowlers conceded too many runs. The economy rates of our front-line bowlers were on average the highest in the competition. To be fair, our below par batting totals often placed more pressure on our bowlers than on the opposition attacks.

Despite the poor results, there were still some shining lights in individual performances:

- Brett Hampton had another outstanding all-round season and was both our highest run scorer and most prolific wicket taker. He scored 389 runs at an average of 48 with an SR of 114, including five half centuries. He hit 25 sixes and 27 fours. He took 14 wickets at an average of 24 with an ER of 5.3. Brett was deservedly our Ford Trophy Player of the Season.
- Tim Seifert scored two centuries in a season shortened by his overseas contracts.
 His 102 [off 87 balls] v CD at Pukekura Park was a major factor in our only win of the season. Later in the season he added 109no [off 71 balls] v Canterbury at Seddon Park.
- · Henry Cooper had scores of 92 [off 61 balls] v CD and 86 [off 108 balls] v Auckland.
- Scott Kuggeleijn [another with an abbreviated campaign because of overseas commitments] managed the only 4-wicket bag 4/50 v Otago.
- Relative newcomers Fergus Lellman, Ben Pomare, Scott Johnston, Josh Brown, and Rohit Gulati all showed potential to develop into the type of white-ball players that we will need if we are to be more competitive in next season's Ford Trophy. Add in some promising young players from our A team programme and hopes are high for a much-improved campaign in 2025/26.

The following game in Nelson V CD did not go our way as we lost by 64 runs. We did however unearth a talented left arm spinner in Rohit Gulati who made his debut and looked at home with ball in had taking 3/20 off 4 overs.

We returned home to Seddon Park to take on Auckland in our next game where they put up a competitive 187/5 with Neil Wagner proving hard to get away with figures of 4 overs 2/20. In reply Katene Clarke and Robbie O'Donnell put together a special partnership of 138 in 12 overs which broke the back of the chase and saw us coast home with nearly an over to spare.

To Dunedin for the next game where again Katene Clarke along with Joe Carter took the game away from Otago with their huge partnership of 194 in 18.1 overs. Katene registering his maiden T20 century and Carter his 2nd half century of the campaign. With a total of 212 on the board the bowlers did well to restrict Otago to 204 on what was an excellent batting surface. Fred Walker, Matthew Fisher and Wagner contributed 2 wickets each.

We then returned home to Seddon Park to take on a strong Canterbury side where we suffered our 2nd loss of the campaign by 23 runs.

Next up was CD at Seddon Park where we had another wash out before heading over the hill to the Bay Oval for a rematch against Otago. Bowling first we restricted Otago to 143/7 before chasing it down in the 18th over with 4 wickets in hand. Robbie O'Donnell and Katene Clarke again combining for a 69-run partnership that formed the back bone of the chase.

Having performed well in the early parts of the tournament meant that even a loss to Canterbury (Round 9) and a washout against Wellington (Round 10) could not force us out of second place in the round robin which reflected the consistency shown by the group throughout the majority of the campaign.

Katene Clarke was named the Northern Brave Super Smash Player of the Year for his 282 runs placing him 4th on the tournament run scoring charts. His combination with Joe Carter at the top of the order along with key contributions from Robbie O'Donnell bode well for the season ahead. Matthew Fisher and Kristian Clarke again showed progress in developing their white ball skills which surrounded by other more experienced players form the nucleus of a strong bowling unit heading into 25/26 campaign.

NORTHERN DISTRICTS WOMEN'S TEAM

Hallyburton Johnstone Shield

The 2024/25 Hallyburton Johnstone Shield was a mixed campaign for Northern Districts Women. There were some excellent individual performances and a few memorable wins, but also some missed opportunities that ultimately left us short of where we wanted to be on the table. For a developing group, it was another season of progress, but one that highlighted areas for improvement.

We opened the season at Bay Oval against Auckland and went down by 7 wickets, but there were positives. Tash Wakelin batted superbly for 55 at the top of the order against a White Ferns bowling attack, showing real determination under pressure. A stand-out was a 47-run last-wicket partnership between Marama Downes and Jesse Prasad, which added respectability to our total, 247.

In the second match, the bowlers were on point, restricting Auckland to 194. The chase wasn't straightforward—we lost regular wickets and were 9 down with plenty to do. But an unbeaten 29-run stand between Eve Wolland and Shriya Naidu saw us home by one wicket. Eve's 48* was a highlight of the season, an innings of great composure for such a young player.

Next stop, Rangiora. Chasing 240, we delivered one of our most complete batting performances. Top-order contributions from Yaz Kareem and Katie Gurrey (both making 70s) set the tone, while Nensi Patel was outstanding with an all-round effort of 2-25 and 30* to close the game. It was a convincing 6-wicket win. Unfortunately, the second game at Rangiora was a missed opportunity—we were well placed at 161-4 before collapsing to 209 all out and losing by 6 wickets.

Two disappointing matches in Otago followed, where we were comprehensively beaten both times. It was a difficult weekend, and the lack of competitiveness in those games was frustrating given the progress we had shown earlier.

After the Super Smash break, we returned to HBJ action against Central Districts in New Plymouth. In the first match, Jesse Prasad produced a superb spell of 5-40, but CD still posted 272. Our reply had promise, thanks to a 107-run partnership between Prasad and Wolland, but we fell 65 short. Eve again impressed with 72, underlining her growing confidence in the middle order.

The Sunday match was one of the best games of the season for spectators, if not for us. Batting first, Katie Gurrey scored a brilliant 112 to power us to 292. Despite that effort, CD chased the target in the final over. It was a great contest, but losing from that position was a tough blow.

Our final two games at Seddon Park against Wellington saw another mix of highs and lows. Saturday was a dominant performance, led by Katie Gurrey's outstanding 152, supported by a composed 62* from Nensi Patel in a 157-run partnership. That win by 50 runs was well-deserved. On Sunday, contributions from Jess Watkin, Katie Gurrey and Nensi Patel helped us post 246, but a century from Jess Kerr and some missed chances in the field meant we couldn't defend the total.

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Looking back, the season had strong individual contributions—Katie Gurrey's runs at the top, Nensi's all-round value, Jesse's five-for, and Eve's maturity under pressure. However, we struggled to maintain consistency and let winning positions slip too often. Those are areas we need to address. The development of younger players was encouraging, but turning performances into results will be key moving forward.

We finished lower than we hoped, but the experience gained will be valuable. There's plenty of work ahead, but also a platform to build on for next year. I love working with this group.

Dream11 Super Smash Review (Women)

The 2024/25 Super Smash was another strong campaign for the Northern Brave Women, as we reached the elimination final for the second year in a row. Along the way, there were some superb individual performances, world-class talent on display, and thrilling matches that showcased the quality of the women's game.

Our season began in anti-climactic fashion at Seddon Park with a rainy day against Canterbury. We were struggling at 67-7 when the weather intervened, and the match was abandoned. In truth, we were grateful to escape with a point.

The second game was one of the matches of the tournament. Wellington brought Amelia Kerr and Elyse Perry to Seddon, while Chamari Athapaththu returned to the Brave lineup. Three of the best players in the world on one field—awesome! After Marama Downes bowled Perry with an absolute beauty, the Kerr sisters combined for a century partnership to lift Wellington to 150. Our reply started brilliantly as Jess Watkin and Chamari smashed 59 in the powerplay (Watty's bombing Perry out of the ground). However, a middle-order collapse left us needing something special. Enter Carol Agafili. Her unbeaten 40 off 28 balls gave us hope right until the last over. We needed 10 off the final six balls, but fell four runs short. Despite the result, it was a cracking contest and a great advertisement for the competition.

From there, we hit our stride. In Nelson against Central Districts, Chamari was unplayable, taking 4-16 as CD were bowled out for 112. Jess Watkin's unbeaten 51 ensured a nine-wicket win with six overs to spare. Back home at Seddon Park, Chamari smashed 71 to help us post 152-7 against Auckland, and all the bowlers chipped in as we secured a 13-run win. Our third straight victory came in Dunedin, where disciplined bowling restricted Otago to 110-9. Jess finished 41 not out as we cruised home by seven wickets in 14 overs.

That streak ended when Canterbury edged us in a tight finish at Seddon Park. After losing our openers early, Katie Gurrey (39) and Nensi Patel (38*) lifted us to 138, but Canterbury chased it down in the final over. A rained-off match against Central Districts followed before a heavy defeat to Otago at Bay Oval brought us back to earth.

We responded well in Christchurch, where new overseas signing Sarah Glenn made an immediate impact. Along with Marama Downes, she bowled superbly to restrict Canterbury to 117-7. Chamari's 37 set up the chase before Nensi finished the job with 32* as we won by six wickets. Our final group match against Wellington was washed out after we had restricted them to 119 with another strong bowling effort.

We finished third in the table, securing a second consecutive elimination final, once again against Wellington. It was a big occasion and our bowlers kept us in the contest, limiting Wellington to 133. The highlight was Kayley Knight's comeback—her first game of the season—and she made it count by dismissing both Kerr sisters, finishing with 2-16 in three overs. Jess Watkin gave us a positive start to the chase, but we couldn't capitalise. Under pressure, the middle order faltered and we were bowled out for 110.

Despite the disappointment of falling short in the knockout, there were plenty of positives. Chamari's brilliance with bat and ball, Jess's consistency, and Nensi's composure stood out, while younger players like Carol Agafili and the returning Kayley Knight delivered important moments. It was another campaign full of drama. It was loads of fun.

The ND A programme plays a vital role in developing players and preparing them for the transition to the top team. It provides playing experiences in all three formats against opponents that are a step up from DA representative level. Where possible these games immediately precede or mirror the Northern Districts and Northern Brave scheduled formats.

The 2023-24 programme included the following:

- Three-day games v Auckland [2], Canterbury, and CD [a scheduled game v Wellington was washed out].
- One-day games v CD [2], NZ Development team [2], and Auckland.
- T20 games v Otago [2], Wellington, and Canterbury.

Of the 13 games, the ND A team won 8, drew 2, and lost 3.

OBITUARIES

William Roberts [Bill] Holt

b. May, 1935, Whangārei d. April, 2024, Brisbane, Australia

Bill Holt was a right arm medium pace bowler from Northland who played two first class games for ND in the 1964/65 season, against Pakistan and Canterbury. He took 2 wickets in each match. Batting at No.10, he scored 32 v Canterbury.

Bill was a regular in the Northland team during the 1960s and later emigrated to Australia, where he died aged 89.

E.R.C. [Ted] Hipkiss

b. 6th February 1947, Wallesey, Cheshire, England d. 3rd April 2025, Whakatāne

Ted Hipkiss was an attacking pace bowler who grew up in the Bay of Plenty and was first selected for the BOP representative team as an 18-year-old. He was one of a very exclusive group of ND players who gained selection for the Auckland Brabin Cup team in the years preceding ND's admittance to National Age Group tournaments. [The Brabin Cup was the NZ U20 tournament, now superseded by the NZ U19 tournament.]

Ted's performances for BOP resulted in his selection for the Northern Districts Plunket Shield team as a 20-year-old in the 1966-67 season. Ted took 10 wickets in six games that season, at an average of 29.10, with best figures of $4/39 \, \text{v}$ Otago. A career highlight came in ND's game versus the touring Australians, when he took the wickets of Australian greats Les Favell and Norman O'Neill.

That was to be Ted's final first-class appearance as back injuries became an issue. However, he did continue to make occasional appearances for BOP up to the 1973-74 season.

Ted was the husband of Andrea, father to Ingrid and Paul, and a grandfather of five.

Gerald Bailey

b. 24th December 1940, Lower Hutt d. 5th June, 2025, Hamilton

Gerald Bailey made a massive contribution to Northern Districts Cricket. A highly respected Hamilton lawyer with a passion for cricket, his service to ND extended over 30 years. In his time he saw ND transition from a volunteer-run organisation in the amateur era to a professional sporting body.


Gerald started his administrative involvement with ND as Secretary in 1975. He served in that role until 1981, when he stepped up to become Chairman of the Board. He acted as Chairman from 1982 until 1989. He continued to serve as a Board member and in 1986 was elected President, remaining in that role until stepping down in 2005. Gerald also served as ND's representative on the NZ Cricket Board from 1986 until 1990. He was awarded Life Membership of ND in 2004.

Gerald's legal acumen was a great asset for ND in his 30 years of service, especially in negotiating sponsorships and dealing with the Hamilton Council and NZ Cricket in the process of establishing Seddon Park as an international venue.

Until the appointment of John Turkington as CEO in 1984 ND was completely run by volunteers. Volunteers would continue to play a vital role until the early 21st century. Gerald, together with Dave Hoskin and Ian Leggatt, put in countless hours at Seddon Park helping prepare the park for first-class cricket.

After his retirement from the ND Board, Gerald continued his involvement by acting as Code of Conduct Commissioner for ND, dealing with players who had been cited by umpires or match managers for misdemeanours during first class or District Association representative games. Gerald's incisive mind and legal background meant players were thoroughly and fairly dealt with.

Gerald also served a period as Chancellor of the University of Waikato and was awarded an honorary doctorate by the University. For his contribution to the wider community, he was made a Companion of the Queen's Service Order [QSO] in 2002.

Robert [Jumbo] Anderson

b. 20th October 1948 d. 1st June 2025, Whangārei

Robert Anderson passed away peacefully in Whangārei after a short battle with cancer, aged 76.

Robert had a long first-class career, from his debut for Canterbury in 1967/68 till his final game for CD in 1981/82. In all he played 111 first-class games. His career in the insurance industry saw him move around NZ, representing Canterbury, ND, Otago, and CD. In the 1969/70 season he was based in Whangārei and represented Northland and ND.

Robert appeared in six first-class games for ND in that 1969/70 season, scoring 223 runs at an average of 24, with a highest score of 37. He was much more successful for CD later in his career, averaging 37 and scoring four centuries. This form saw him selected for NZ for nine tests and two ODIs between 1976 and 1978. His highest test score was 92, scored on debut v Pakistan in Lahore.

Robert returned to live in Whangārei in 1986, and he subsequently made a major contribution to Northland Cricket, serving as a selector, senior team manager, and board member. He also coached and mentored players at City Cricket Club and Whangārei BHS. Both his sons, Ben and Tim, represented ND at age group level, and Tim went on to play at first-class level for CD.

Many will remember "Jumbo" for his forthright views on cricket and players. He was never backward in expressing his opinions! His presence will be missed on future ND visits to the North.

Leslie David [Dave] Andersen

b. 11th December 1939, Melbourne d. 22nd October 2024, Whakatāne

Dave Andersen was a left arm medium pace bowler who represented Northern Districts in two Plunket Shield games in the 1967/68 season.

Dave had previously played his cricket in Auckland. He represented Auckland at Brabin Cup [U20] level and played for the NZ Colts team in their 1959/60 tour of Australia [other members of that team included future NZ players Bruce Murray and Brian Hastings and Peter McGregor, another to represent both Auckland and ND].

Dave represented Auckland in three first-class games in the 1960/61 season before moving to live in the Bay of Plenty region. He represented BOP from 1967/68 until 1972/73.

Dave took 10 wickets in his five-match first-class career. Never short of stamina, he bowled 34 overs in an innings for Auckland v CD and had several other 20 over plus workloads.

Neil Wagner

In February 2024, Neil Wagner called time on his illustrious 64-Test career for the BLACKCAPS.

Wagner ended his international career fifth on the list of New Zealand's top Test wicket-takers with 260 wickets, at an average of 27. His strike rate of 52 is only bettered by the great Sir Richard Hadlee (50) of New Zealanders to have taken more than 100 Test wickets.

Wagner won 32 of his 64 Tests and claimed 143 wickets at an average of 22 in those victories.

Born in South Africa, he moved to Dunedin to play domestic cricket for Otago in 2008, before moving north to his current home in Papamoa in 2018 to play for Northern Districts.

The left-armer debuted for the BLACKCAPS in 2012 and was a key member of the side during their ascent to the number one ICC Test world ranking and victory in the inaugural ICC World Test Championship in 2021.

"It's not easy to step away from something you've given so much to and got so much out of, but it's now time for others to step up and take this team forward. "I've enjoyed every single moment of playing Test cricket for the BLACKCAPS and am proud of everything we've been able to achieve as a team. "The friendships and bonds built over my career are what I'll cherish the most and I want to thank everyone who's played a part in where I am today.

"My teammates have always meant the world to me and all I've ever wanted to do was what was best for the team - I hope that's the legacy I will leave.

Alongside lifting the World Test Championship Mace in Southampton in 2021, Wagner cited blocking out for a draw and a Test series win against England at Hagley Oval in 2018, and the one-run victory over the same opposition at the Cello Basin Reserve in 2023, among the top highlights of his sparkling career in the Black Cap.

Wagner was suitably acknowledged at the Cello Basin Reserve during the first Test against Australia – his last in the BLACKCAPS playing group and was further celebrated at the ANZ New Zealand Cricket Awards in Christchurch in March 2024.

Tim Southee

NZC Annual Report:

New Zealand cricket great Tim Southee bowed out from international cricket in winning style during the 2024-25 season, finishing his career back where it all started, on his home ground of Seddon Park in Hamilton against England.

The BLACKCAPS all-time leading international wicket-taker (776) and 14-time Test captain received a standing ovation as he walked from the field for the final time, having claimed 2-34 in the second innings to help his side secure an emphatic 423-run victory in the third and final Test.

Raised on a farm in Waiotira, Whangarei and hailing from the Maungakaramea Cricket Club, Southee's illustrious 18-year international career saw him chalk up 394 internationals and numerous national and international records (listed below).

Southee's impressive all-round skillsets, durability, and consistency saw him become the only player in the world to claim more than 300 Test wickets, 200 ODI wickets and 100 T20I wickets.

"Representing New Zealand was all I ever dreamed of growing up," he said.

"To play for the BLACKCAPS for 18 years has been the greatest honour and privilege, but the time feels right to now step away from the game that has given so much to me.

"I'll always be so grateful to my family, friends, coaches, our fans and everyone involved in the game who has supported me and my career over the years.

"It's been an amazing ride, and I wouldn't change a thing."

Sam Barriball

Sam transferred to ND from Auckland in 2016. Her consistent run scoring for Auckland ,1673 runs at an average of 30 in 65 List A games, had seen her gain selection in the White Ferns. She went on to play 20 ODIs and 8 T20 internationals between 2014 and 2017.

Sam played 58 List A games for ND, scoring 1101 runs at an average of 22, including five half centuries. Her highest score was 77no v Auckland in 2021/22. In that innings she shared an ND record first wicket partnership of 188 with Catie Gurrey. Sam also holds the ND record second wicket partnership with Brooke Halliday – 160 v Auckland in the 2022/23 season.

Sam also played 56 T20 games for the Brave, scoring 648 runs at an average of 15. This included two half centuries, with a top score of 60no off 40 balls v Auckland in 2018/19. Though this was a modest run return, Sam contributed mightily in the field and was an inspiration to others. She took 43 catches for ND across the two formats.

Sam captained ND in the 2018/19 season.

Sam has also played a major role in the promotion of Maori women's cricket. She has been leader of the ND Maori Wahine team and represented the NZ Maori Wahine team in the Pacific Cup in 2023/24.

Sam paused a law career in 2023 to take up the role of Operations and Infrastructure Manager at ND. She is now returning to her law career.

Shriya Naidu

Shriya made her debut for the ND Women's team in 2019 and over the next six seasons went on to play 33 List A and 29 T20 games for ND.

Shriya bowled right arm medium pace and was especially threatening when conditions suited her ability to swing the ball. She enjoyed a particularly successful 2022/23 season when she took 11 List A wickets at an average of 22. That included her best figures of 4/52.

Shriya took 24 wickets in List A games at an average of 40, and 7 wickets in T20 games with an economy rate of 6.6.

Jesse Prasad

Jesse came to ND in the 2023/24 season, after previously representing Auckland.

A right arm medium pace bowler, Jesse played 16 List A games for ND over the 2023/24 and 2024/25 seasons. She took 19 wickets at an average of 26, with best figures of 5/40 v CD.

Though primarily selected as a bowler, Jesse was deserving of all rounder status in List A cricket. She was a consistent contributor with the bat, usually at No.8 in the order, finishing with 262 runs at an average of 37. Her highest score was 49no v Otago.

She also played 7 T20 games for the Brave. She had minimal opportunities with the bat and took 3 wickets with an economy rate of 8.0.

Joe Walker

Joe retired before the start of the 2024/25 season after a career that spanned 14 seasons from his debut as an 18- year-old in the 2010/11 season. Joe had played 55 first class, 45 List A, and 32 T20 games for ND.

A right arm off spinner, Joe took 104 first class wickets for ND at an average of 41 runs per wicket, with best figures of 5/25. He took 38 List A wickets at 42 and 33 T20 wickets at 19.

Like many spinners, Joe was reaching his prime in his late 20s-early 30s. After an outstanding Plunket Shield season in 2021/22 [18 wickets at 19] he was selected for the NZ A team's tour to India in September 2022. He played two first class and three OD games on that tour. Unfortunately, a wrist injury affected his performances and availability over the next two seasons and this and a job opportunity in the racing industry resulted in his decision to retire.

Pathway cricket continues to evolve and the experience for each player is a crucial part of their cricketing journey.

The 2024/25 tournaments were spread across the association and hosted in Cambridge, Counties Manukau, Gisborne and Whangārei. A range of formats were played to ensure each tournament was suited to the playing cohort and included T20, 40-over and 50-over fixtures. These tournaments each showcased the talent which is spread across Northern Districts and the brand of cricket on show was both exciting and entertaining whilst player development continues to be prioritised before, during and after this experience. The 2024/25 season underscored Northland's enduring passion for cricket, with robust participation and significant developments across all levels of the game.

N.C.A

Participation and Club Competitions

With clubs from Ahipara in the north to Kaipara Flats in the south, the cricket season was a true Northland-wide competition. Senior club competitions saw participation from 22 teams, reflecting the widespread engagement across the region.

Junior and youth cricket saw 23 teams engaged in structured competitions. Additionally, over 300 young players participated in Super Smash Hubs across the region. 100 girls also took part in our Girls' Smash/Summer Series. The Rodney Cricket Association contributed four teams to Auckland's youth and junior competitions, reflecting the region's commitment to nurturing young talent.

Representative Cricket

The Northland Men's team embarked on a developmental journey, fielding 21 players across the three formats, including six teenagers. While on-field results were modest, the experience gained is expected to strengthen the team's future performance.

Cultural Milestone: Formation of Northland Māori Team


A significant highlight was the establishment of the Northland Māori team, which played two matches: an unofficial game against Northland B and an official fixture against a South Asian Invitation XI. The latter match was part of a well-attended Whānau/Multicultural Day at Cobham Oval, supported by New Zealand Cricket's community initiatives. The event fostered community engagement and set the stage for an expanded schedule of fixtures in the upcoming season.

Infrastructure Developments

The anticipated launches of two new cricket grounds—Te Puawaitanga (Kerikeri CC) and Te Hiku (Far North CC)—were delayed due to logistical challenges. Both venues are now set to open for winter sports this year and will be fully operational for cricket in the next season. These multi-sport facilities will provide dedicated spaces for training, playing, and hosting cricket hubs, significantly enhancing the region's cricket infrastructure.

Umpiring and Officiating

In response to player feedback, two pre-season player-umpire courses were conducted in Kerikeri and Kaipara Flats. The sessions were well-attended, leading to the addition of three new regular umpires—two of whom are female—bringing the total number of regular umpires to ten, with one additional part-time umpire. This development was positively received by players and officials alike.

To address this, there is a need to develop innovative formats that appeal to a broader demographic, including those unable to commit to regular Saturday play. Leveraging technology can play a pivotal role in this endeavour.

Securing sustainable and equitable revenue streams for community cricket is critical, especially in the evolving landscape of franchise cricket. Collaborative efforts with secondary schools and clubs are essential to implement effective solutions. Acknowledging the necessity for change and working collectively will be key to ensuring the vitality of community cricket.

It is encouraging to note that the importance of thriving community cricket is recognized within the broader New Zealand cricket ecosystem. Ongoing efforts aim to build upon successes and proactively address challenges to sustain the game's growth at the grassroots level.

We are also grateful to the staff of Northern Districts, who worked tirelessly to support our association. Their efforts have contributed to a more positive and efficient experience for clubs, coaches, and players alike. Feedback from the community — both formal and informal — highlights improvements in systems, facilities, and communications, and is a testament to our shared commitment to excellence.

One of the year's standout achievements was the upgrade and playability of our grass wickets, made possible through the actions of Hamilton City Council staff. These enhancements have significantly improved the playing experience and will serve our cricketing community well into the future.

Another major highlight was the reintroduction of women's cricket in Hamilton. The enthusiasm and quality of play were inspiring, culminating in finals at Seddon Park. Our Hamilton women's team delivered strong performances against other Districts, pointing to exciting growth opportunities ahead for female participation and competition.

- Participation: 2,197 participants across 264 teams female participation grew by 5%, now at 13%
- Junior Engagement: 6,229 students reached through Super Smash school programmes (59% of schools engaged)
- Coaching: 73 registered coaches; 80.82% police vetted and 57% completed Vulnerable

- Pathways: Continued delivery of structured development programmes for Year 9–13 players and coaches
- Super Smash Hubs: 199 registrations
- · Rangatahi teams: Full capacity in both Tane and Wahine tournaments
- · Tamariki teams: Numbers remained stable, with only a minor decrease from last season

Our Hamilton Senior Men's team enjoyed a successful campaign, finishing second in both the Fergus Hickey Rosebowl and Brian Dunning competitions, and proudly representing HCA in the Hawke Cup. Congratulations to Michael Dodunski and his squad on an outstanding season and for nurturing promising young talent.

At the senior club level, 13 competitions continued to thrive. Congratulations to Marist Suburbs for an exceptional year with seven trophies, Hamilton Old Boys for their three titles, and Little Masters, Fraser Tech, and Star University, each securing a win. The female Waikato-wide competition also grew significantly, offering a full-season structure with two formats and five teams — a promising sign for the future.

While the Business House League experienced a slight dip to 51 teams (\downarrow 3%), overall engagement and enthusiasm across age groups remain strong. 2024/25 has been a memorable season for cricket in the Bay of Plenty with accolades for our Senior and Rangatahi teams, as well as enhancements in the management capabilities of BOPCA.

I extend heartfelt appreciation to the BOPCA Board for their steadfast support and commitment to establishing a strong foundation for these successes, and our sponsors (Craigs Investment Partners, Venture Developments, Classic Builders and Jensen Steel Fabricators) for their valuable contribution to community cricket. We all take immense pride in our diverse and passionate district, and we remain collectively dedicated to fostering cricket throughout our region.

The BOP Men's team had a highly successful campaign with (coach) Jono Boult and (manager) Paul Wadsworth in their second season at the helm. The positive culture they're building within the squad is reflected in its results. With its 9-win, 1-loss record the team won both the Brian Dunning Cup and the Fergus Hickey Rosebowl and were unlucky runners-up in the rain-affected T20 tournament by the narrowest of margins on net-run-rate. With strong competition for spots, players are motivated to train harder, prepare more thoroughly and ultimately perform better when given the chance. With a mixture of seasoned veterans and younger players, we are looking forward to seeing more BOP players in higher representative teams.

Sam Owen continued his role as our BOP Women's coach. Despite efforts to arrange fixtures, the women's team were only able to play two matches during the season, with several opposition teams pulling out of planned fixtures – we are looking forward to seeing ND provide a formalised competition platform for our female players to participate in against other District Association teams in 2025/26.

Our BOP Premier Men's competition has moved from strength to strength in the last few seasons and now consists of ten teams. All three competition formats were incredibly closely fought, and it is testament to the quality of cricket in the Bay of Plenty that so many teams were vying for semi-final and final spots late in the season. The Venture Developments Williams Cup final was a fitting end to the season - in front of a large crowd at the Bay Oval, Mount Maunganui achieving a narrow victory over Te Puke in the 100th over of the day. Umpire recruitment remains a challenge, and we look forward to NZC and ND providing leadership and tools to assist community cricket here.

In the pathways space, BOP teams continue to perform well. With all our teams sponsored by Classic Builders, we were able to offset significant costs for our players to attend the valuable ND tournaments. Special mention must go to our BOP Coastlands and BOP Lakelands teams who finished first and second in the ND Emerging Rangatahi tournament –a wonderful achievement for BOP as the only district association to have two teams! And congratulations also to the BOP Coastlands Youth team who went through their tournament undefeated too. With so many players vying for spots in our six teams, we will continue to evolve the selection criteria to ensure all our players who wish to have the opportunity to be selected.

We still have obstacles ahead as we begin the new season. We continue to have challenges around the suitability and upkeep of grounds and facilities to support the growth in cricket. Moreover, the continued 'creep' of winter codes into our summer season continues to put pressure on grounds - but we will continue to work with local councils to ensure we can provide the grounds we need.

Junior cricket numbers continue to fall, and we need to collectively work together to address this. Retaining players, especially through key transition points such as junior cricket hubs to softball, or softball to hardball, or 'hub to club' are critical and require a holistic view of cricket can be challenging to achieve, particularly given funding and programmes can often be siloed. Empowering clubs and facilitating true community involvement is key in this space.

Prior to the start of the 2024/25 season the board made a commitment to further support cricket in our region with stronger operational processes. A successful recruitment process led to the employment of our new GM of Operations, Shaun Anastasi. Starting in July 2024, Shaun oversees all BOPCA competitions, funding, sponsorship, and operational tasks for BOP representative and pathways teams. The level of leadership and professionalism in this area has improved greatly since Shaun began his role and we're delighted with his problem-solving skills, transparency of processes, and manner of dealing with our clubs, captains, and stakeholders.

Finally, the BOPCA Board wishes to express our deepest appreciation to everyone involved in crickets – coaches, administrators, volunteers, managers, players, umpires and supporters. Thank you for your unwavering commitment to the game we all love.

DISTRICT ASSOCIATION OVERVIEW POVERTY BAY



Despite the continued absence of Senior Men's Representative Cricket, the game continued to take positive steps in the 2024/25 season.

Super Smash Awareness Programmes were delivered in schools from the last week of Term 3, which, alongside Skills Programmes, continued throughout Term 4 and Term 1. Hundreds of rangatahi in te Tairāwhiti are enjoying organised cricket throughout the summer, and into autumn

The annual Super Smash Festival Day for primary schools had 24 teams registered to play - a total of 239 participants, which is over double the number of teams when compared to the previous edition. Local intermediate schools came together to play modified cricket, with 12 teams enjoying a Festival Day of their own.

Our challenge now is to find coaches and managers to facilitate matches and trainings!

Currently, we have 19 registered coaches in the system. As our player numbers continue to grow, it is essential to keep developing our coaching network to maintain a strong foundation for the sport.

Encouragingly, there has been an increase in coaches within the primary hard-ball and Junior Colts age groups. However, a key challenge remains retaining these coaches as players transition into the secondary school space. Addressing this will be crucial for sustaining player development and long-term engagement.

For Seniors the Reserve Grade pre-Christmas competition was adjusted to a T20 format. There was some positive feedback with this as it created variety in addition to the 30-over Stanley Hope Cup.

Across the season, two qualified umpires in the Poverty Bay area umpired our Premier Competition only. Two registered players - Daniel Stewart and Clarence Campbell - umpired the Hope Cup Final between Chicking HSOB and CPS Ngatapa, which was much appreciated. As for all regions, recruiting, upskilling and empower umpires must be a priority for our game to survive.

In the 2024/25 season, Poverty Bay teams participated in all of the Rangatahi tournaments. Thanks to Emma and Courtney Hayes, U17/U19 Female coaches, a tailored Poverty Bay programme for our female Rangatahi has been set up. The key for next season is to keep building on the momentum from last season.

Keegan Russell (former Bays Pathway and Talent Coach) created real opportunity for consistency and a season-long programme for the Youth and Emerging squads in both genders. He ran fortnightly sessions on a Thursday for Youth and Emerging Rangatahi male and female players. Currently there is no plan as to what's happening in the Pathway space and is something that will need to be discussed in the off-season.

In terms of accolades, Johny Gray had a hugely exciting season - it has been great to see one of our local cricketers make the most of the opportunities in front of him. He represented Poverty Bay U19 Emerging Rangatahi, Northern Māori Youth and Senior teams, is a member of the Northern Districts Academy and U17 team. Most recently he represented his country for the Aotearoa Māori Schoolboys team who played a Tri-Series in Auckland.

- Spaces and Places Spaces and places to support a game for all
- Our People it is all about the people, our people.

Who are we?

Northern Districts Cricket Association is the governing body for the sport of cricket in the Northern Districts and is recognised as such by New Zealand Cricket Incorporated.

We represent our six members and the broader cricket network across our defined region.

Why do we exist?

As one of the six Major Associations affiliated to New Zealand Cricket, ND exist to deliver cricket across our defined region with the goal to be a game for all. This includes everything from the first time someone experiences cricket through a programme, playing opportunity or attending a game, through to representing the country. The purpose of the Association is to:

- control, manage and be responsible for the promotion and administration of cricket in the Northern Districts
- control all matches played by teams representing the Association
- foster, encourage and assist in the development of cricket player between teams representing the Members
- affiliate with New Zealand Cricket
- be bound by the rules, playing conditions and regulations for the playing of cricket promulgated by New Zealand Cricket Incorporated, including rules for the conduct and regulation of the game under the management and control of the Association and to be bound by the Laws of Cricket published from time to time by the International Cricket Council and/or the Marylebone Cricket Club
- foster and encourage participation in and support for cricket by all players and supporters of the game at all levels in the Northern Districts
- encourage and promote cricket as an activity which promotes the health and safety of all participants, including one which respects the principles of fair play and is free from performance-enhancing drugs

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What did we do?

Amateur Cricket: Govern, promote and administer amateur cricket for the recreation or entertainment of the general public of the Northern Districts region.

Professional Cricket: Undertake cricket activities and competitions in which paid players and paid officials participate. FY25 was a successful season with a full schedule of competitions, programmes and events delivered across the region. We also successfully hosted international and domestic cricket across our elite venues – Seddon Park, Bay Oval and Cobham Oval – with the highlight being the Test Match vs England at Seddon Park.

Our community game continues to thrive with a large number of volunteers ensuring cricket is delivered across club and school environments throughout the region.

Northern Districts teams enjoyed significant success over the season. The Men's team won the Plunket Shield, the premier competition in men's domestic cricket, for the first time since 2011-12. And for the first time both the Northern Brave Men and Northern Brave Women qualified for the elimination finals in the Super Smash in the same season. Our ND age-group teams also consistently performed well with all our teams finishing 2nd in their respective National Tournaments. Our district associations continued to compete in various ND competitions. This included the Northern Brave T20 Smash, Fergus Hickey and Brian Dunning competitions for the Men's Senior teams; District Association Women's teams have been revived with competitive fixtures during the season that will lead into a more comprehensive playing program next season; ND Mãori Tane and Wahine teams competing at National tournaments; and District Association Rangatahi tournaments at Youth and Emerging levels.

We acknowledge the huge contribution from the entire cricket community including volunteers, umpires, scorers, coaches, managers, parents/guardians and supporters in making cricket happen throughout the year.

How did we perform?

Amateur Cricket: All annual offerings were completed in alignment with identified goals and/or adapted in accordance with local grassroot participant preferences.

Professional Cricket: All annual offerings were completed in alignment with the required targets and events.

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In formulating the service performance data for the period, Northern Districts has exercised considerable judgment in determining the information to present. This decision was based on an evaluation of what data would be most relevant and meaningful to users assessing performance against the objectives. This task posed a challenge due to the wide-ranging nature of Northern Districts' activities and its various funding sources, including government grants. The selection of service performance information was a collaborative effort involving key management personnel at Northern Districts. The most influential judgments that affected the non-financial data displayed were associated with choosing what Northern Districts accomplished during the period – the "what did we do" reported. Northern Districts opted to base its service performance metrics on verifiable data provided to/by New Zealand Cricket . The organisation decided against reporting on performance metrics evaluating the outcomes or impacts of its activities because, currently, such measures are not independently verifiable. It should be noted that the data provided is different to the previous year, as a result of New Zealand Cricket changing the competition database platform. Due to this change, information is now available in different categories and formats. While NZC are committed to evolving the data and insights captured and available, it is presumed that the majority of information now presented will be repreatable moving forward, so long that NZC remains with the current competition provider in PlayHQ.

Report on the Audit of the General Purpose Financial Report

Opinion

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Notes to the Financial Statements

Northern Districts Cricket Association For the year ended 31 July 2025

1. Statement of Accounting Policies

Reporting Entity

Northern Districts Cricket Association Incorporated ("Northern Districts Cricket") is incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908.

Northern Districts Cricket is a public entity for the purposes of financial reporting in accordance with the Financial Reporting Act 2013

Statement of Compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with New Zealand Generally Accepted Accounting Practice ("NZ GAAP"). They comply with Public Benefit Entity Standards Reduced Disclosure Regime ("PBE Standards RDR") and Public Benefit Entity International Public Sector Accounting Standards ("PBE IPSAS") that have been authorised for use by the External Reporting Board for Not-for-Profit entities.

Northern Districts Cricket qualifies as a Tier 2 reporting entity as for the two most recent periods it has had between \$5M and \$33M of operating expenditure and is not publicly accountable.

Measurement Basis

Unless otherwise stated, the measurement base is that of historical cost. Reliance is placed on the fact that Northern Districts Cricket is a going concern.

Functional and presentation currency

The financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars (\$) which is the entity's functional currency, rounded to the nearest dollar.

There has been no change in the functional currency.

Use of judgements and estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the Board and management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

(a) Judgements

Judgements made in applying accounting policies that have had the most significant effects on the amounts recognised in the financial statements is revenue recognition- non-exchange revenue (conditions vs. restrictions).



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(b) Assumptions and estimation uncertainties

Assumptions and estimation uncertainties that have a significant risk of resulting in a material adjustment in the year ending 31 July 2025 is the useful life, recoverable amount and depreciation method and rate of property, plant and equipment.

(c) Assumptions on depreciation rate and useful life

Standard industry rates are used for deprecation rates and the useful life of property, plant and equipment which are reassessed annually for any impairment.

(d) Changes in accounting estimates

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements and have been applied consistently by Northern Districts Cricket.

2. Specific Accounting Policies

The following specific accounting policies have been used in preparing these financial statements.

Revenue

Revenue is recognised when the amount of revenue can be measured reliably and it is probable that economic benefits will flow to Northern Districts Cricket and is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

The following specific recognition criteria in relation to Northern Districts Cricket's revenue streams must also be met before revenue is recognised.

Revenue from non-exchange transactions

Non-exchange transactions are those where Northern Districts Cricket receives an inflow of resources but provides no (or nominal) direct consideration in return. With the exception of services-in-kind, inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions are only recognised as assets where both:

- · it is probable that the associated future economic benefit or service potential will flow to Northern Districts Cricket, and
- fair value is reliably measurable.

Inflow of resources from non-exchange transactions that are recognised as assets are recognised as non-exchange revenue, to the extent that a liability is not recognised in respect to the same inflow.

Liabilities are recognised in relation to inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions when there is a resulting present obligation as a result of the non-exchange transactions, where both:

- it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying future economic benefit or service potential will be required to settle the obligation, and
- the amount of the obligation can be reliably estimated.

The following specific recognition criteria in relation to Northern Districts Cricket's non-exchange transaction revenue streams must also be met before revenue is recognised.

Grants from New Zealand Cricket - General Funding and other non-exchange revenue

New Zealand Cricket (NZC) - General Funding and other non-exchange revenue is recognised when the conditions attached to the grant have been complied with. Where there are unfulfilled conditions attached to the grant, the amount relating to the unfulfilled condition is recognised as a liability and released to revenue as the conditions are fulfilled. Stipulations that are 'conditions' specifically require Northern Districts Cricket to return the inflow of resources received if they are not utilised in the way stipulated, resulting in the recognition of a non-exchange liability that is subsequently recognised as non-exchange revenue as and when the 'conditions' are satisfied.



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Stipulations that are 'restrictions' that do not specifically require Northern Districts Cricket to return the inflow of resources received if they are not utilised in the way stipulated, do not result in the recognition of a non-exchange liability, resulting in the immediate recognition of non-exchange revenue.

Revenue from exchange transactions

Gate Receipts

Entrance fees for functions and events are recorded as revenue when the function or event takes place and are measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

Commercial Activities

Hosting and hospitality income is recorded as revenue when the function or event takes place and is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

Coaching & facilities

Revenue is recognised immediately where members, groups or individuals purchase specific services relating to coaching and development courses. At year end any revenues for which the conditions of receipt have not been met are then transferred to deferred revenue. Once the conditions have been met, the revenue is recognised in that financial year.

Sponsorship Revenue

Northern Districts Cricket receives cash and non-cash sponsorship in the form of goods and services. The fair value of the cash, goods and services received is recognised as Sponsorship revenue when it is probable that the associated future economic benefit or service potential will flow to the entity, and the fair value is reliably measurable.

Grant Revenue from NZ Cricket, Funding Organisations and Other Grants

Grant revenue, with the exception of NZC General Funding as discussed above, is recognised when the conditions attached to the grant have been complied with. Where there are unfulfilled conditions attaching to the grant, the amount relating to the unfulfilled condition is recognised as a liability and released to revenue as the conditions are fulfilled.

Employee Benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, annual leave and accumulating sick leave are recognised in surplus or deficit during the period in which the employee provided the related services. Liabilities for the associated benefits are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Financial instruments

Northern Districts Cricket initially recognises financial instruments when Northern Districts Cricket becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Derecognition

Northern Districts Cricket derecognises a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or it transfers the rights to receive the contractual cash flows in a transaction in which substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset are transferred or in which Northern District Cricket transfers nor retains substantially all of the



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risks and rewards of ownership and it does not retain control of the financial asset.

Northern District Cricket enters into transactions whereby it transfers assets recognised in its statement of financial position but retains either all or substantially all of the risks and rewards of the transferred assets. In these cases, the transferred assets are not derecognised.

Northern District Cricket derecognises a financial liability when its contractual obligations are discharged or cancelled or expire. Northern District Cricket also derecognises a financial liability when its terms are modified and the cash flows of the modified liability are substantially different, in which case a new financial liability based on the modified terms is recognised at fair value. On derecognition of a financial liability, the difference between the carrying amount extinguished and the consideration paid (including any non-cash assets transferred or liabilities assumed) is recognised in surplus or deficit.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount presented in the statement of financial position when, and only when, Northern Districts Cricket has a legal right to offset the amounts and intends either to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Initial Recognition and Measurement

Trade receivables and debt securities issued are initially recognised when they are originated. All other financial assets and financial liabilities are initially recognised when Northern District Cricket becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

A financial asset or financial liability is initially measured at fair value plus, for an item not at fair value through surplus or deficit, transaction costs that are directly attributable to its acquisition or issue. At initial recognition, an entity may measure short-term receivables and payables at the original invoice amount if the effect of discounting is immaterial.

Northern District Cricket classifies financial assets, on initial recognition, as measured at: amortised cost for assets where cash flows are solely payments of principal and interest; or fair value through surplus or deficit.

Northern Districts Cricket's financial assets include: receivable from exchange transactions, cash and cash receivables, and equity investment through a managed portfolio. Subsequent measurement is dependent on the classification of the financial instrument, and is specifically detailed in the accounting policies below.

Financial assets at fair value through surplus or deficit

Financial assets at fair value through surplus or deficit include financial assets held for trading and financial assets designated upon initial recognition at fair value through surplus or deficit. Financial assets are classified as held for trading if they are acquired for the purpose of selling or repurchasing in the near term.

 $Northern\ District\ Cricket\ has\ designated\ financial\ assets\ from\ Craig's\ Investments\ at\ fair\ value\ through\ surplus\ or\ deficit.$

Financial assets at amortised cost

Financial assets at amortised cost are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. After initial recognition, these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any allowance for impairment. The Entity's cash and cash equivalents, debtors and non-equity investments fall into this category of financial instruments.

Financial Liabilities

Financial liabilities are creditors (excluding GST and PAYE). All financial liabilities are initially recognised at fair value (plus transaction cost for financial liabilities not at fair value through surplus or deficit) and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

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Property, plant and equipment

Items of property plant and equipment are initially measured at cost, except those acquired through non-exchange transactions which are instead measured at fair value as their deemed cost at initial recognition.

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured under the Cost Model which shows initial cost including any expenditure directly attributable to the acquisition, delivery or installation (or fair value for items acquired through non-exchange transactions) less accumulated depreciation and impairment. Northern Districts Cricket's items are subsequently measured in accordance with the Cost Model.

Any gain or loss on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment (calculated as the difference between the net proceeds from disposal and the carrying amount of the item) is recognised in surplus or deficit.

Depreciation is recognised in surplus or deficit on a straight-line or diminishing value basis over the estimated useful lives of each component of an item of property, plant and equipment. Assets under construction are not subject to depreciation.

Depreciation methods, useful lives, and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted if appropriate.

The straight line and diminishing value depreciation rates for 2025 are:

Impairment of non-financial assets

The carrying amounts of Northern Districts Cricket's non-financial assets, other than inventories, are reviewed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, then the asset's recoverable amount is estimated.

Leases

Leases in terms of which Northern Districts Cricket assumes substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership are classified as finance leases.

Operating leases

Leases that are not finance leases are classified as operating leases. Operating leases are not recognised in Northern Districts Cricket's statement of financial position. Payments made under operating leases are recognised in surplus or deficit on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease. Lease incentives received are recognised as an integral part of the total lease expense, over the term of the lease.

Income Tax

Northern Districts Cricket is exempt from Income Tax under section CW46 of the Income Tax Act 2007.



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Goods and services tax (GST)

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the Inland Revenue Department is included as part of receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are included in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities, which is recoverable from, or payable to, the Inland Revenue Department is classified as part of operating cash flows.

Equity

Equity is measured as the difference between total assets and total liabilities and is made up of the following components:

Accumulated comprehensive revenue and expense

Accumulated comprehensive revenue and expense is Northern Districts Cricket's accumulated surplus or deficit since its formation.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Short term term deposits, those with original maturities less than three months, are classified as cash equivalents. All other term deposits are included in current investments or, if original maturity is greater than twelve months, non-current investments.

Inventories

Inventories held for consumption in the provision of services that are not sold on a commercial basis are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. For inventory that was acquired through non-exchange transactions, the cost of the inventory is its fair value at the date of acquisition. For inventory held for the distribution or consumption in providing goods and services to be distributed at no charge or for nominal charge, these are measured at cost adjusted for any loss of service potential.

Prepaid Lease Assets

Prepaid Lease Assets are recognised in the Statement of Financial Position and are amortised over the life of the remaining lease.
