After so much interruption to previous seasons it was great to have so much cricket played over the summer. So many highlights throughout the season that made it a memorable one.

The cricket network doesn't function without the amazing volunteers across our District Associations, Clubs and Schools. We say thank you for your efforts and dedication to the game and your communities.

Our men's and women's teams had mixed results. At Christmas all trophies across all five competitions were in sight. The Men's white ball season proved challenging, however we took the Plunket Shield all the way to the final fixture against Wellington in what became a mini final. The Wellington men took the points with some inclement weather proving critical. The women made their first Super Smash Qualifying Final with some great performances and are getting closer to that elusive trophy.

Our Northern Māori Tāne and Wāhine competed in the Māori Nationals including the Wāhine competing in the inaugural tournament. We couldn't be prouder that an initiative of ND more than 10 years ago has led to a situation where there are now national Māori tournaments.

The ND Foundation ran its first campaign with Bat4Change to put the quality equipment in the hands of our female cricketers to continue the build towards equality. The players that were beneficiaries were extremely grateful for the support provided.

At the ND Awards night Tim Seifert was elevated into our Life Member - Immortal Category having represented NZ over 50 times in the T20 format. We also welcomed Caitlin Gurrey, Bernadine Bezuidenhout and Jeet Raval into our Life Member Category for their extended and exceptional service to ND as players.

Our BLACKCAPS continue to be recognised at the highest level with Mitch Santer winning the NZ Men's T20I player of the year and Kane Williamson the NZ Test Player of the Year at the NZC Awards.

Brett Hampton was recognised for a huge season across domestic cricket with the Daniel Vettori Medal as the Male Player of the Year. Brett was brilliant across all three formats with his bowling providing a weapon for the attack along with some excellent innings with the bat.

Star bowler Marama Downes was awarded with the Nicola Browne Medals for Female Player of the Year after excelling in the Super Smash including the first Northern Brave 5-wicket match 5/12.

Once again, our partners provided excellent support to help make cricket happen. We appreciate their ongoing support and look forward to welcoming some new sponsors in the coming seasons.

Our funders, in particular NZC, Grassroots Trust, The Lion Foundation and NZCT provide significant revenue that is used to support the growth and delivery of the game and allow us to achieve our purpose of Connecting People, Creating Memories.

It gives me great pleasure to reflect on the 2023-24 season across our Performance and Talent programmes.

We are acutely aware that our performance teams are our 'shop window' and I'm extremely proud of the achievements of our teams, players, and staff over the year. They showcase the best of ND with their cricket exploits, but just as importantly, in how they carry themselves, represent our region, and live our purpose of 'Connecting people, Creating memories'.

At a high level, seeing our players grow, develop and succeed is what drives us. We continually seek to be the leading HP programme in NZ and the commitment of all involved to keep improving and evolving what we do is crucial to that. Therefore, before I get into the detail of the report, I want to acknowledge those key groups who contribute so much to what we do.

Firstly, to our playing groups. Thank you for the outstanding skill, dedication and effort you continue to put into your cricket. There have been some outstanding team and individual performances over the season and we have much to celebrate.

To the wider Performance and Talent staff, thank you for the huge contribution you all make to our programme. I talk at length that our role is to provide the platform for our players to shine, and there is absolutely no doubt that you do this for our athletes. Your skill and dedication is second to none and we are extremely lucky to have such quality people leading our programmes.

I would like to add a couple of special mentions at this point. To Brett Sorrenson, our Pathway & Talent Manager, thank you for the huge amount of work you do in leading our pathway and talent programmes. The regional academy, our ND age-group and A programmes, and our district pathway opportunities continue to go from strength to strength off the back of your leadership.

Janice Fraser, our Team Operations Lead, you do so much of the unseen work to make everything tick along smoothly. You are the rock of our programme and I appreciate everything you do to support our teams.

As I start to delve into the detail of the season, it would be remiss to not mention the significant change that took place over the winter. We recruited four new HP coaches to lead our domestic squads this year – new Head and Assistant coaches for both the male and female programmes. This is a significant undertaking and change for all involved and I appreciate all the support and input from those that helped in this process.

The outcome was that we were able to secure the services of four excellent coaches and quality people. This included BJ Watling (Men's Head Coach) and Daniel Flynn (Men's Assistant Coach) to lead the male programme, and Peter Borren (Women's Head Coach) and Debu Banik (Women's Assistant Coach) to lead the female programme.

All four of these coaches have brought an energy, professionalism and outstanding commitment to their programmes. They have made a huge impact in their first year, creating outstanding performance team environments and I know they can continue the momentum from this season.

We also had some further recruitment within our support staff and wider coaching network. Deepak Joon (Waikato Pathway & Talent Coach) secured a new role within the CD women's programme and we were pleased to have Anton Devcich join us over the course of the season as his replacement.

On the field, our ND Women had a breakthrough season in many respects. The undoubted highlight was the team making the Elimination Final of the Super Smash for the first time. Unfortunately, the team weren't able to get over the line and make the grand final, but the historic campaign was full of superb moments and outstanding individual and team performances.

In the HBJ, the team started the campaign strongly and were in 2nd place after the first six rounds after excellent wins against Wellington and doing the double over Canterbury for the first time ever. However, the team struggled in their final two double-header rounds against Otago and CD which saw them drop out of finals contention and finish a disappointing 5th.

Some highlights for the season included having Sri Lankan superstar, Chamari Athapaththu, join us as an overseas player for the Super Smash. Chamari put in a number of matchwinning performances and the competitiveness and professionalism that she brought to our young group was outstanding.

There were some excellent individual performances including Marama Downes 5-12 vs Auckland in the Super Smash fixture at Eden Park. The first 5-wicket bag in T20 cricket for an ND women's player. Kayley Knight also broke the record for the best figures in a domestic match for ND with her phenomenal 7-35 vs Central Districts at New Plymouth.

There's no doubt that the team showed strong growth and development over the season. The Super Smash campaign was a highlight but, ultimately, the overall improvement in the performance team environment and the consistency of skill execution have been highlights from my perspective. This team has a large cohort of young, exciting players with big futures in the game, and under the guidance of Peter Borren and Debu Banik, they have made huge strides as they mature as a playing group together.

In the male programme, our ND Men's team enjoyed a mixed season across the three domestic formats. The team hit the ground running after an excellent pre-season and with the energy and freshness of a new coaching team. The results in the first half of the season were outstanding with the team leading the Plunket Shield and sitting 2nd in the Ford Trophy at the halfway point of both competitions.

Unfortunately, the shift to T20 cricket and the challenge to defend our Super Smash crown never really gained momentum and we finished a disappointing 6th in this competition. We simply didn't play the cricket we wanted throughout and there were plenty of lessons learnt for the group. Unfortunately, our white ball form had fallen away and this carried over into the 2nd half of the Ford Trophy as we just weren't able to get some key wins at crucial times to make the final, eventually finishing 4th.

The team however continued to play excellent red ball cricket and in an exciting climax to the season, played what was in effect a final in the last game of the season against Wellington at Seddon Park. With the game very evenly poised going into the last day and a strong chance of us being able to force the win, unfortunately the weather gods intervened and the day was washed out. This meant Wellington claimed the Plunket Shield with the narrowest of margins through bonus points. It was hugely disappointing for the team, but they can be proud of their excellent campaign throughout the season.

As always, it's a real pleasure to highlight some of the outstanding individual performances during the season, including: Brett Hampton scoring his maiden First Class and List A hundreds, his 7/41 vs Otago, and topping the Ford Trophy batting averages at 86.50.

Kristian Clarke (twice), Scott Kuggeleijn (twice) and Matthew Fisher all taking 6-wicket bags in the Plunket Shield, and Kristian finishing as the top wicket taker in the Ford Trophy (18). Sandeep Patel scoring his maiden First Class hundred (145) against Otago, along with Joe Carter, Henry Cooper, Bharat Popli and Tim Seifert all scoring first class or List A hundreds over the course of the season.

These were BLACKCAPS Mitchell Santner, Tim Southee, Kane Williamson and Neil Wagner, and WHITE FERN Bernie Bezuidenhout. Tim Seifert and Scott Kuggeleijn also represented NZ during the summer on the back of some excellent domestic performances.

During the course of the summer, Neil Wagner, announced his retirement from international cricket. Congratulations to Neil on an outstanding international career and he will go down as one of our greats. We do look forward to him continuing to play for ND and bringing his vast skill and experience to our squad next summer.

Bernie Bezuidenhout also announced her international retirement after the end of the season. Congrats to Bernie on her international career, and we look forward to her continuing to play for ND next season and bringing her great skill, energy and experience to that environment.

In term of additional representative honours, Scott Kuggeleijn, Henry Cooper and Tim Seifert represented NZ A on their Australian tour in August/September, and Marama Downes and Nensi Patel were selected for the 'North' team in the North vs South series. Nensi went on to be selected for NZ A and played in the series against England A.

Finally, in celebrating our player's achievements I wish to congratulate our Daniel Vettori Medallist Brett Hampton and Nicola Browne Medallist Marama Downes, who both had fantastic seasons.

In summary, the 2023-24 season has once again been a successful and hugely rewarding one. The collective growth and development across our entire performance and talent programme is down to a tangible commitment from top to bottom within the organisation to continue as industry leaders, providing the best environments and opportunities we possibly can.

I would personally like to thank CEO Ben MacCormack and the ND Board for their support at all times. With this continued support and with the quality people we have involved across the board, I know we can continue to be leaders on and off the field over the next few seasons.

COMMUNITY REPORT

The 2023/24 season marked another important period for Northern Districts Cricket as we continued to drive engagement and inclusivity across our six District Associations.

Our efforts focused on expanding participation, increasing diversity, and fostering stronger relationships with communities throughout our region. With community cricket at the heart of Northern Districts' vision, we prioritised creating opportunities that ensure everyone feels welcome and able to participate, regardless of background or experience.

Through strategic collaborations and an unyielding commitment to enhancing accessibility, we achieved significant progress in reaching more people than ever before, engagement with underrepresented groups, and volunteer support across our regions.

CONNECTING PEOPLE, CREATING MEMORIES

Once again cricket brought people together all across our region. Our tournaments are an important part of interconnecting the wider region. Participation census recording has changed from a NZC perspective however on the like for like record we saw slight growth from 11,039 traditional and modified participants to 11,718. The main objective continues to be establishing opportunities of experience and participation across all communities with a vision to 'Connect People, Create Memories'.

A GAME FOR ALL

It was an exciting year for regional programmes where we aimed to back up the amazing results of the previous season.

Throughout the season a total of 81,701 tamariki (51:49% male:female) received Super Smash Programme experiences which surpassed the annual target of 78,000. This is a 2% increase on the 2022/23 season, a pleasant indication of the continued school system openness and excitement to welcome back cricket and Northern Districts to local communities after a number of disrupted summers. The Super Smash Programmes achieved a 97% participant satisfaction rating and a regional school saturation rate of 58%, which is the highest annual achievement since records started in 2019. Of this 58% school saturation, 119 of these schools received a first ever Super Smash Programme session (since records started in 2019/20). Since the new regional strategy was launched in July 2021, the rolling 'unique school saturation' after a third year of delivery is 70% regionally, which is 10% higher than forecasted targets. This continues to be a positive indicator of the growth and success of the SuperSmash programme structure which is a key tool the regional and national strategic vision to be a 'A Game for All'.

Despite having a regional 5% annual decrease of Super Smash Hub registrations (1,974 total), the hubs across Northland (+22%), Bay of Plenty (+12%) and Poverty Bay (+14%) all enjoyed registration increases.



This season's rangatahi tournaments provided competitive youth cricket in a positive environemnt.

In December 2023 and January 2024, Super Smash Holiday Festivals were set up in five main locations– Counties Manukau, Hamilton, Taupō, Rotorua and Tauranga. SuperSmash Holiday Festivals ran for a full day and combined skills learnt in Awareness sessions with the modified games offered at a school Festival. There was a total of 460 registrations across all Holiday Festivals which was a 229% increase in engagements compared to the same time period in 2022/23, an encouraging indication of community reception to the new version of holiday programmes which also included t-shirts for each registration.

As New Zealand Cricket and Northern Districts continue to strive towards delivering "A Game for All", engaging with Kura Kaupapa across the region continues to be a challenge – 46 Kura Kaupapa (61% of the national total) are established within the NDCA region, and are predominantly in Hamilton, Bay of Plenty and Poverty Bay. Further alignment with Te Aho Matua (the governing principles) is required to successfully integrate cricket into the holistic curriculum of a Kura Kaupapa, and to ensure cricket is providing optimal experiences for all New Zealanders.

Overall, there was plenty to celebrate across the year and most importantly cricket was again played and delivered at every possible opportunity. The collaboration and connection of various community members and communities continues to be the driving force behind everything that Northern Districts is and does, and this was evident throughout the summer. A huge thanks must go to all the club and school volunteers and/or staff as well as officials, players and parents for the positive approach to the season and spirit for which the game was played and delivered.

A special mention to the staffing network across the region which continues deliver on the vision for cricket to be 'a game for all'. Northern Districts is privileged to lead the game alongside all our shared communities and to collaborate with so many enthusiastic and passionate people which share a drive for cricket to 'Connect People, Create Memories'.

The Northern Māori Tuakāna Tāne team also had an unprecedented year with the exciting introduction of a national tournament to compliment the regular annual schedule. The tournament was hosted in Whangārei and was a great showcase of our regional talent and celebration of Māori culture within the game. The Northern Māori Rangatahi team will provide a great platform for rangatahi to progress into the Tuakāna Tāne team and while the exhibition fixture for the Northern Māori Rangatahi Kōtiro was cancelled due to weather, there is great anticipation for the inaugural National Māori Tuakāna Wahine tournament in October 2023.

Overall, there was plenty to celebrate across the year and most importantly cricket was again played and delivered at every possible opportunity. The collaboration and connection of various community members and communities continues to be the driving force behind everything that Northern Districts is and does, and this was evident throughout the summer. A huge thanks must go to all the club and school volunteers and/or staff as well as officials, players and parents for the positive approach to the season and spirit for which the game was played and delivered.

A special mention to the staffing network across the region which continues to hold strong and persevere towards the vision for cricket to be 'a game for all'. Northern Districts umpires had another very successful 2023/24 season. Umpires were appointed to all Senior District and Rangatahi tournaments. Umpire numbers have passed the 80 mark and is well represented in all District Associations. The umpire group had eleven off-season training sessions and has extended training to the regions. Practical training sessions were also introduced and several of our Brave players took part in these sessions.

The Northern Māori programme had an unprecedented year with the exciting evolution of the opportunities provided.

This year for the first time saw three Northern Māori teams competing throughout the summer and this was highlighted on Waitangi Day with the Waitangi Festival held in Tāmaki Makaurau – this festival involved all three Northern Māori teams competing side by side vs Tāmaki Makaurau Tāne, Wāhine and Rangatahi. This programme continues to be the beginning of a journey for many to reconnect to their people, whenua and culture through cricket.

The Northern Māori Tāne continue to strengthen the relationship with their traditional fixtures with Tāmaki Makaurau Māori, NZ Croatia XI, Waikato University Chancellors XI, Kaipaki Cricket Club and this season saw the broadening of the schedule with additional fixtures vs a Northern Districts XI, Waipuna Valley Cricket Club and Seddon Cricket Club. This season saw their first night fixture at Seddon Park which was the first time any of the 12 members of the team had played under lights. This summer was on the back of the inaugural Men's national tournament last Easter and their next national tournament will be taking place concurrently in February 2025 with the Wāhine nationals. This season saw 36 players represent the Northern Māori Tane team from October through until March.

The Northern Māori Wāhine programme began their inaugural year of competition with the first Wāhine nationals competition in Heretaunga in October. The team finished 2nd place after a week of significant performances. The introduction of the national tournament represented a new opportunity for Wāhine Māori to express their talent on a national stage and connect with other talented players from across Aotearoa. A highlight of this inaugural tournament was the cultural experience, but also the competitive nature of the tournament which saw many young Wāhine competing against those with international or domestic playing experience. Dayle Anderson led the wickets for Northern Māori with 6 across the 4 matches and Samantha Barriball led from the front with the bat amassing 126 runs. This season saw 14 players represent the Northern Māori Wāhine team.

The Northern Māori Rangatahi programme continued for its second season of competition and a highlight of this programme continues to be the Northern Districts Youth Rangatahi tournament which was held in December. Beyond the tournament the Rangatahi were brought together to play around the region against other Districts Association teams and a focus being on playing fixtures at historically significant cultural locations. This season saw the first Rangatahi fixtures vs Tāmaki Makaurau Māori and a Pasifika Schoolboys team. This season saw 22 players represent the Northern Māori Rangatahi team.

The 2023-24 season saw a total of 72 Māori players and three Māori Head Coaches represent Northern Māori across the programme and a chance to represent their Whakapapa with pride. Ryan Metcalfe, Samantha Barriball and Ethan Price were named as the Rangatahi, Wāhine and Tāne players of the year respectively. The evolution of this programme will see the addition of the Northern Districts Māori Emerging Rangatahi team for the 2024-25 season and we look forward to four Northern Māori teams competing.

International Cricket at Bay Oval

BLACKCAPS v Bangladesh 2nd T20i – 29 December 2023

Mount Maunganui had a solid Friday turnout to start off the year-end weekend, but rain had the final say in the second T20I between New Zealand and Bangladesh after only 11 overs of action.

Stand-in skipper Mitch Santner lost the toss and the BLACKCAPS were put in to bat under the floodlights at Bay Oval.

ND's Tim Seifert opened the batting in typical aggressive style, scoring 43 in 23 balls with six fours and one six.

Bangladesh pegged New Zealand back and at 72 for 2 from 11 overs, the game looked an even contest.

Unfortunately, heavy rains came down and despite everyone's best efforts, the game ended in a no result with New Zealand 72-2 in 11 overs.

BLACKCAPS v Bangladesh 3rd T20i - 31 December 2023

James Neesham and ND's Mitchell Santner spared the BLACKCAPS blushes by helping the hosts fight back from 49 for 5 to seal victory in a low-scoring third T20I to share the series honours 1-1 with Bangladesh.

Bangladesh finished on a below-par 110 courtesy of captain Santner's 4 wicket middle over spell, but the bowling of Mahedi Hasan and Shoriful Islam led a fightback. When Neesham and Santner partnered, the early wickets had put New Zealand well behind the game, but their unbeaten 37-ball 46 run partnership swung the match back towards the BLACKCAPS.

Rain arrived with New Zealand well on track for victory - needing only 16 more runs in 5.2 overs. With no further play possible from this point New Zealand were adjudicated winners by 17 runs on DLS.

BLACKCAPS v South Africa 1st Test - 4-8 February 2024

Jamieson, Santner bowl NZ to victory after Williamson's twin centuries and Ravindra's 240.

The first Test of the series was opened with the unveiling of the Tangiwai Sheild. The Shield commemorates the tragic events of the 1953/54 Test series, when 151 passengers on the overnight Wellington-Auckland express, including Nerissa Love, the fiancée of New Zealand fast bowler Bob Blair, lost their lives in the country's worst rail disaster when a railway bridge over the Whangaehu River collapsed beneath the train. Test series between the two nations will now be played for the Tangiwai Shield.

The BLACKCAPS constructed an impressive first-innings total of 511 at Bay Oval, spearheaded by 118 from local boy Kane Williamson and a huge 240 from Rachin Ravindra. From there, the South Africa side were well up against it and collapsed for just 162 in their first innings with Matt Henry and Mitch Santner taking 3 wickets apiece. Skipper Tim Southee decided to bat again, with Williamson becoming just the fifth New Zealander to make twin centuries in a Test match with a knock of 109 as the BLACKCAPS declared on 179/4, setting South Africa a mammoth 529 runs to win.

International Cricket at Seddon Park

BLACKCAPS v Pakistan 2nd T20i – 14 January 2024

Blistering Finn Allen sets up 2-0 series lead for the BLACKCAPS

A sell-out crowd at Seddon Park were treated to a BLACKCAPS victory to put them 2-0 up in the five-match T20I series against Pakistan.

Finn Allen's blistering 41-ball 74 laid the foundations as the BLACKCAPS posted 194/8, with Kane Williamson adding 26 and Mitch Santner 25.

4 wickets from Adam Milne and 2 from Tim Southee helped bowl Pakistan out for 174 to secure a 20-run victory.

BLACKCAPS v South Africa 2nd Test - 4-8 February 2024

Kane Williamson's measured fourth-innings century made it all quite comfortable for New Zealand as they pulled off a record chase - the highest at Hamilton's Seddon Park - to complete their first Test series win over South Africa, a 2-0 sweep.

The second Test match against South Africa was a much closer contest than the first, with South Africa setting New Zealand a nervous fourth innings target of 267. David Bedingham showed his class with a maiden Test century, whilst debutant Will O'Rourke looked every bit a Test match bowler taking 4/59 in the first innings and 5/34 in the second.

Similarly to the first Test however, Kane Williamson proved a huge thorn in the Proteas side, scoring his third century of the series (133*) to guide the BLACKCAPS home by a 7 wicket margin.

Will O'Rourke was named the Player of the Match for his nine wickets in the Test, while Williamson took back the series award for his 403 runs across two Tests.

Victory saw the BLACKCAPS winners of the Tangiwai Shield.

WHITE FERNS v England 2nd ODI - 4 April 2024

New Zealand could only muster 196 in their chase of 253 as England sealed the series with a game to play.

Tammy Beaumont's well-crafted 81 led England to a comprehensive win over New Zealand in their second ODI to help England to an unassailable 2-0 lead in the series with one match to play.

Amy Jones backed up her unbeaten 92 in the opening game with 48 to help lift the tourists to 252.

Brooke Halliday threatened with a fifty and combined with Izzy Gaze to put on a century partnership for the fifth wicket which gave New Zealand hope, but Nat Sciver-Brunt's 3 fer saw the WHITE FERNS bowled out for 196 in 45 overs.

England's win by 56 runs sealed the series with one match to play.

WHITE FERNS v England 3rd ODI – 7 April 2024

Devine century delivers NZ consolation win in the final match of the ODI series.

Sophie Devine's 8th ODI century spearheaded a dominant New Zealand victory at Seddon Park. Batting on 88* with just 12 runs to win, bringing up three figures looked a tall order for New Zealand's number 4 but she did just that, finishing the game off with two 6's to spark jubilent scenes.

Devine combined with Amelia Kerr (31) and Maddy Green (38*) to knock off 195 for just 3 wickets down, having earlier been reduced to 14 for 2 against the new ball.

Earlier in the piece, seamers Jess Kerr and Hannah Rowe both took 3 wickets each as England were bowled out for a below par 194 inside 47 overs.

Plunket Shield Review

It all came down to the final match of the season. With the Firebirds four points ahead, we needed to win outright to claim the Plunket Shield. Losing the toss and bowling first, we managed to put the Firebirds under pressure after a decent opening stand. At 246-9 we were in a strong position, unfortunately a last wicket stand propelled Wellington to 323.



Ford Trophy Review

The Ford Trophy began promisingly. At the halfway stage we were well placed, after three wins, a washout draw, and a solitary loss. However, any momentum we had was lost during our disappointing Super Smash campaign. On the resumption of the Ford Trophy, our last five games saw us manage only one win, with another washout draw and three losses. ND finished 4th on the points table, just missing out on the playoffs.

The season started well with wins over CD in Nelson and Wellington at Seddon Park in Hamilton. Jeet Raval [96] and Brett Hampton [88no] featured in our 28-run win over CD. Our pace bowlers dominated in the Wellington game – Kristian Clarke 3/42, Scott Kuggeleijn 3/40, Hampton 2/20 – leading to a six-wicket win off only 32 overs.

A rained-out game v Otago at Seddon Park was followed by a loss to Auckland at Cobham Oval in Whangārei. A Finn Allen century helped Auckland to a 300 plus score. We chased bravely, led by Brett Hampton's 67 [including five sixes], but fell short by 54 runs.

We bounced back with another win over CD at Cobham. Kristian Clarke, Kuggeleijn, and Hampton again shared eight wickets as CD managed only 185 runs. An opening partnership of 84 between Katene Clarke and Tim Seifert, followed by a 78-run partnership between Joe Carter and Henry Cooper, set us up for a comfortable four-wicket win in the 42nd over.

We started the second half of the competition with a big win over Auckland at Eden Park by 106 runs. Centuries by Joe Carter [106] and Brett Hampton [126] helped us to 319/6. In a reversal of our previous game v Auckland, it was their turn to struggle to chase a big total and they were dismissed for only 199 runs. Matt Fisher [5/46] took his first List A five-wicket bag.

Unfortunately, the wheels then came off our campaign. Wellington turned the tables on us, defeating us by 45 runs at the Basin Reserve, despite a century to Henry Cooper [121] and Kristian Clarke's first five-wicket bag in this format [5/67]. Our next game was a washed-out fixture v Canterbury at Hagley Park. Then followed a loss to Otago by six wickets in Queenstown – Jeet Raval's 78 our only innings of note. Ewald Schreuder, just back from the U19 World Cup, made his ND debut in this game.

We went into the final round robin game needing a win to keep our playoff hopes alive, but this never looked likely after we were dismissed for only 160 runs, with only Joe Carter [56] providing any resistance. Canterbury reached their target for the loss of just two wickets off only 36 overs.

Despite the results, there were still some significant performances:

- Brett Hampton was our Ford Trophy Player of the Season. He scored 346 runs at an average of 86, with a strike rate of 116, and also took eight wickets.
- Kristian Clarke was the competition's top wicket taker in the qualifying rounds, taking 18 wickets at an average cost of 22 runs and with an economy rate of 5.3 runs per over.
- Joe Carter was the 4th highest run scorer in the competition, with 350 runs at an average of 43.
- Our young bowlers showed they have the potential to develop into a strong unit in future seasons - as well as Kristian Clarke, Matt Fisher [12 wickets] and Tim Pringle [11 wickets] enjoyed success and Josh Brown and Ewald Schreuder made promising debuts.

The campaign began at Seddon Park in Hamilton with a resounding 55-run win against the Central Stags. The dangerous duo of Tim Seifert and Katene Clarke set the tone with the bat at the top of the order and paved the way for skipper Jeet Raval to carry on the momentum to see the team score 196 which would be our highest total of the campaign. The bowlers followed this up with a strong showing of their own, knocking the Stags over for 141 on an excellent batting surface. Santner, Southee and Kuggeleijn picking up two wickets each.

Unfortunately, the following game at Fitzherbert Park in Palmerston North against the same opposition ended with a tough loss. From there, the team struggled to find any momentum throughout the campaign with the only other highlight being a strong win against the Wellington Firebirds at the Basin Reserve on what was a tricky wicket.

Runs proved hard to come by throughout the season with Jeet Raval scoring two 50s and topping the run charts for the side with 194 runs at a strike rate of 119. With the ball, Tim Pringle was a standout taking 10 wickets at 24 and often being tasked with bowling the tough overs for the side. This, along with batting contributions in which he averaged 23 at a strike rate of 122, saw him crowned our Super Smash men's player of the season.

Finishing at the foot of the table doesn't reflect the skill and ability of the squad, but certainly provided us all with some lessons as we look forward to the 2024/25 campaign.

A wet trip North to Whangārei for our first two fixtures saw a rain out and then a disappointing loss to Auckland. In a game in which we found ourselves in dominant positions in both innings, we failed to capitalise. Tash Wakelin with her maiden List A half century (59), being the highlight.

Our next two games saw us play a strong Wellinton team in Hamilton. Solid top-order contributions and 57* from the skipper Eimear Richardson led us to 245-5, a total which proved too much for Wellington. With what became a bit of a theme for the season, we executed a couple of crucial run outs when it mattered and bowled them out for 188.

It was over the Kaimais to Bay Oval for our next two fixtures against Canterbury. In the first game Jesse Prasad took 3-25 and we bowled them out for 175. After some middle order jitters Lucy Boucher (23*) got us over the line and we won by 2 wickets. On the Sunday we delivered a thoroughly professional performance in the day/night fixture. Batting first, Katie Gurrey [86] and Jess Watkin [56]shared a partnership of 128 as we made 260-8. Marama Downes took four wickets and Jess Watkin completed a fine all-round performance with three wickets, as the Canterbury reply never really threatened. A 60-run win.

So, as we hit the break for the Super Smash, we had found our rhythm in the HBJ. We had won three on the bounce and were tied for second place on the table. Unfortunately, that would be as good as it got for us this year in the 50-over competition.

When we returned after the Super Smash we struggled, limping to a 5th place finish with two losses apiece to Otago and Central Districts. In these games we had opportunities to win but our top order never really got going. There was some excellent fight from the lower order, but we could not produce match- winning totals. To compound that, apart from Kayley Knight's List A record 7-35 against CD, our bowling also lacked penetration. A disappointing finish to a campaign which promised much before the break.

Katie Gurrey finished as the top runscorer for us with 299 runs at 33. Kayley Knight was the top wicket taker with 18 wickets at 15. Kayley finished with the second most wickets in the competition and earned our HBJ "Player of the Season" award.

Despite the finish, I was really encouraged by a lot of what we did this season as a team. There were some excellent wins and some promising individual performances. Positive, fun, competitive women. Willing to learn and a pleasure to coach.

After a great start to the chase, we tried hard to throw the game away but eventually snuck over the line with two balls to spare. Our first win of the competition and against Wellington no less. It would prove to be their only loss of the Super Smash.

Back over to Seddon Park and back down to earth in our next match. We were comprehensively beaten by Otago in a rain-reduced match.

Canterbury at Hagley next where top-order runs from Chamari was followed by useful middle-order contributions as we posted a par score of 136. At the halfway point of their chase, Canterbury were 70-1 and cruising. However, the match, ended in a tie with a Kayley Knight run out (one of 4 runouts in that final 10 overs). We had bowled and fielded brilliantly and deserved to take home 2 competition points.

A comfortable 19- run win over a strong Auckland team followed at Mount Maunganui. That was our last game at the Bay Oval for the season. Four wins out of four across both competitions - the ground proved quite the fortress for us this year.

Chamari then threatened to do something special at the Basin against Wellington, but we struggled after her dismissal. Wellington chased our modest 118 with ease. This left us with no choice but to win our last three games if we wanted to make the finals.

Batting first, Katie Gurrey, Eimear Richardson and Eve Wolland batted well for us against Canterbury at Seddon Park. In a rain reduced 7-over chase for Canterbury, there was once again a last ball run-out and this time we won by a solitary run. DISTRICT ASSOCIATION OVERVIEW NORTHLAND

The cricket season in Northland has once again demonstrated strong support across the region. Clubs from Ahipara in the north to Kaipara Flats in the south contributed to senior competitions with 22 teams participating. Additionally, our junior and youth competitions featured 23 teams, complemented by over 300 participants in the Super Smash hubs located Northland wide. The Rodney Cricket Association also had four teams competing in the Auckland youth and junior competitions.

The Northland Men's team had an unbeaten season, winning the T20 competition and securing second place in both the Brian Dunning Trophy (lower NRR) and the Fergus Hickey competition. This season also marked a historic milestone with the formation of the Northland Women's team. Although there is currently no official competition available, we arranged a match against the Bay of Plenty women's team. Unfortunately, rain severely impacted the game, resulting in only 1.5 overs being played.

This season saw the addition of a new cricket ground at Caledonian Park, where an artificial wicket has been installed to serve as the home ground for Bream Bay CC. Additionally, Kerikeri CC (Te Puawaitanga) and Far North CC (Te Hiku) are set to open their new multi-sport grounds in the upcoming season, which will provide these clubs with dedicated facilities for playing, training and their hubs. These developments are expected to enhance our ability to promote and expand cricket across Northland.

However, we are facing challenges with umpiring in the region. Currently, there is a core group of six regular umpires, supplemented by three additional individuals who contribute intermittently. The Northland Cricket Association is actively addressing this issue through player and umpire surveys to develop a comprehensive plan for both retention and recruitment. This plan may include player education initiatives, recognising that player umpiring remains an integral component of club cricket.

We look forward to continued growth and improvement in the coming season, building on the successes and addressing the challenges that lie ahead. The challenges have been consistent for a number of years now. Retaining players, especially through key transition points, like starting or finishing secondary school, softball to hardball, or when mismatches become marked. We need to work harder at innovative formats that are attractive to both younger and older players who may not want to commit to Saturday play, as well as more diverse participants. Technology can play an important role here. Obtaining a sustainable and fair revenue stream for community cricket and using it effectively is critical. Finding the right ways to work with schools and clubs is key.

The solutions are there but require all stakeholders to work collaboratively and to accept that change is needed. It's a cliche, but if Community Cricket is not thriving, then it is only a matter of time before nothing else in cricket will be either. It is heartening to hear that this view is shared in the New Zealand cricketing ecosystem, and work is ongoing to build on successes and address the challenges.

I also want to acknowledge the exceptional contributions of Fabian Pathirana, our past chair and director of HCA cricket. Fabian, your wisdom and leadership have been deeply appreciated.

A special thank you goes to everyone who embraced PlayHQ as a crucial tool for ensuring accuracy in results and data collection. Your commitment has been instrumental in embedding this platform within our community. To all the players and volunteers, your efforts are the backbone of Hamilton Cricket, and we are immensely grateful for the opportunities you help create for participation in the sport.

Key Achievements:

- Participants: 2,687 (↓9%) across 200 teams, with an 8% female participation rate (↑2%).
 Additionally, 256 Super Smash Hub registrations (↓4%).
- Schools & Students: 68% of schools participated, reaching 12,759 students through the Super Smash school programme.
- Coaching: 86 coaches registered, with 78% completing the Vulnerable Children modules and 93% successfully vetted.
- · Pathways: Programmes and opportunities delivered for players and coaches from Year 9-13.

The HCA Senior Men's team had a particularly productive year, developing young talent and finishing the season as Fergus Hickey Rosebowl champions. Congratulations to Michael Dodunski and the senior players for this outstanding achievement.

At the senior club level, 13 competitions continued to thrive, offering both male and female divisions. Hamilton Old Boys dominated by winning three trophies, while Marist Suburbs, Fraser Tech, and Star University each claimed two. Little Masters and Suburbs also had victories, with Morrinsville-Piako taking home the Spark Limited Overs trophy. However, the HCA Business House league saw a decrease in entries to 55 teams (+13%). On a positive note, the female Waikato-wide competition expanded to a full season this year with two formats.

Unfortunately, Rangatahi team entries declined by seven teams compared to the previous year (excluding St. Paul's now affiliating with WVCA), and tamariki team entries saw a 16% drop. This decrease is attributed to a 26% reduction in school entries (16 teams) and a 7% decline in club entries (5 teams). Hardball teams experienced the most significant drop, with a 22% decrease, particularly among Year 6 teams, which accounted for 10% of the decline.

We are excited to report the re-introduction of senior women's representative fixtures, starting with an exhilarating win over Waikato Valley. This match marks the beginning of many more to come, and we look forward to further growth in this area.



Hamilton Cricket Association's senior men's team were Fergus Hickey Rosebowl champions this year. Cricket in Hamilton has faced challenges due to the lack of adequately prepared grass wickets. However, in partnership with the Hamilton City Council, systems are now in place to ensure marked improvements for the 2024/2025 season.

In response to requests from eligible secondary schools in Hamilton, we have investigated a stand-alone First XI competition. We anticipate that, with Northern Districts' involvement, similar teams from outside Hamilton will contribute to the formation of a broader First XI competition in time to come.

Finally, the HCA Board wishes to express our deepest appreciation to everyone involved in cricket—your dedication and energy have ensured that cricket remained at the forefront of our community, even in challenging times. Thank you for your unwavering commitment to the game we all love.

The Versatile Williams Cup Final was a highlight of the cricket calendar, the 90-year-old trophy final at Bay Oval saw a great crowd and a win from the Cadets Cricket Club. As we look forward to the 2024/2025 season the board made a commitment to support cricket in our region with strong operational processes. A previously strong cricket school, often fielding up to 10 teams. We are planning on working with TIS to support them in their rebuild. Junior grassroots cricket remains a focus for BOPCA.

2023/24 Bay of Plenty Pathways season has been exciting with many highlights. The season-long programme aimed to provide elevated training and playing opportunities, starting with a well-attended Pathway information session. Wider squads were named at the start, narrowed down for December tournaments, and then reopened for the rest of the season.

The Pathway explored various game formats and opponents to maximise experience and align with modern needs. Highlights included a F-15 Youth/Emerging Female round on March 17th at Waikato University, three 2-Day matches over Easter Weekend with five Bay of Plenty teams, and four Rangatahi tournaments in December. These tournaments were successful in both results and player development, with positive reflections from participants.

Efforts were made to ensure fair and transparent selection processes, involving clubs and schools as much as possible. For the 2024-25 season, nominations and observation days will be introduced.

The quality of Pathway cricket was driven by the dedication of coaches and managers, who played a significant role in player development. Thanks are due to them, as well as parents and volunteers. This season showcased the talent and strong culture in the Bay of Plenty region, promising an exciting future ahead.

Governance

The successfully-functioning Shared Services agreement has significantly lighted the workload on the committee, allowing members to focus on volunteering aspects of running the association. Social activities surrounding the bar have been reinvigorated for a modest profit.

Northern Districts staff have been a noticeable presence in the region, at strategic as well as delivery-level.

Three brand new nominations for committee members were received, requiring a vote from those in attendance at the AGM for the first time in decades.

Representative Cricket

Four Poverty Bay players featured in a showpiece fixture between ND Māori and NZ Croatia at Seddon Park, that resulted in an exciting tied match.

A nationwide quest for suitable opposition for Senior Men's and Women's teams resulted in expressions of interest from multiple sub-associations in the South Island, leading the association to the current point of seeking funding to assist travel costs for players making themselves available for selection, as well as identifying these players.

The Emerging Rangatahi Tāne tournament was again hosted at Harry Barker Reserve and travelled to Whangārei for the 'Youth Rangatahi Tāne' tournament as well. It was pleasing to see the Emerging Rangatahi Girls tournament scheduled again, but this was not able to be played due to weather.

Senior Leagues

The local competitions continued to function with good numbers and competitive fixtures.

Two-day cricket made its return, with HSOB requiring an outright win against OBR to secure the competition in the final. The 'B Grade' Hope Cup continued to be a keenly-contested competition, with Ngatapa regaining their title over OBR.

Tamariki and Rangatahi Leagues

Term 4 saw an increase in participation by teams and numbers, but Term 1 (2023) was highly impacted by Cyclone Gabrielle - though participation by teams and numbers still increased from Term 1 in 2022. Tairāwhiti Women's Cricket Club continued to offer a 'Girls Only' option for participation in local competitions and club/school composite sides attended Hawke's Bay Cricket Camps (formerly 'Riverbend') in the Year 6, 7, and 8 brackets respectively.

National and International Representation

Local products Kayleigh Knight and Thorn Parkes continued to succeed at domestic level.

Knight was named the Northern Districts Hallyburton Johnstone Shield Player of the Year, taking 7/35 versus Central Districts at Pukekura Park on the way: the best figures ever for an ND player in the Hallyburton Johnstone Shield. She also represented a NZ XI v the touring Pakistan side in a T20 at Bert Sutcliffe Oval, taking 3/19 off her 4 overs.



Harry Barker reserve again hosted Rangatahi cricket this year. Parkes continued to perform regularly for the Otago Volts, securing a playing contract after making his debut first class hundred the previous season.

Johny Gray named in ND Māori team who compete in Youth Rangatahi Tournament. Also named in the ND Academy which is a huge milestone for PB as it has been a long time since this has happened.

Te Reimana Gray was named in the ND XI to compete at T20 Tournament in Taupō.

External Relationships

Richie Tikaroa (Recreational Services/Green By Nature) has continued to hold the responsibility of maintaining the pitches at Harry Barker Reserve, with good levels of success and feedback following the Emerging Rangatahi Tournament.

Dialogue continues with the Gisborne District Council and Recreational Services to improve the level of maintenance and care invested in local facilities, as well as work around establishing an independent committee to investigate the sharing of the pavilion between cricket, hockey and football.

Whiti Ora (formerly Sport Gisborne Tairāwhiti) is undertaking processes to support the construction of a multi-code indoor centre in Gisborne. Whiti Ora also supported the promotion of Cricket and connection with schools as well as wider community.



Who are we?

Northern Districts Cricket Association is the governing body for the sport of cricket in the Northern Districts and is recognised as such by New Zealand Cricket Incorporated.

We represent our 6 members and the broader cricket network across our defined region.

Why do we exist?

As one of the six Major Associations affiliated to New Zealand Cricket, ND exist to deliver cricket across our defined region with the goal to be a game for all. This includes everything from the first time someone experiences cricket through a programme, playing opportunity or attending a game, through to representing the country. The purpose of the Association is to:

- control, manage and be responsible for the promotion and administration of cricket in the Northern Districts
- control all matches played by teams representing the Association $\,$
- foster, encourage and assist in the development of cricket player between teams representing the Members
- affiliate with New Zealand Cricket
- be bound by the rules, playing conditions and regulations for the playing of cricket promulgated by New Zealand Cricket Incorporated, including rules for the conduct and regulation of the game under the management and control of the Association and to be bound by the Laws of Cricket published from time to time by the International Cricket Council and/or the Marylebone Cricket Club
- foster and encourage participation in and support for cricket by all players and supporters of the game at all levels in the Northern Districts
- encourage and promote cricket as an activity which promotes the health and safety of all participants, including one which respects the principles of fair play and is free from performance-enhancing drugs

What did we do?

Amateur Cricket: Govern, promote and administer amateur cricket for the recreation or entertainment of the general public of the Northern Districts region.

Professional Cricket: Undertake cricket activities and competitions in which paid players and paid officials participate.

FY24 proved to be a season with full competitions and programmes delivered across the whole region and once again our world-class grounds at Seddon Park, Cobham Oval and Bay Oval shone brightly on both the international and domestic stage.

There are always so many people across the cricket network and various grassroot organisations (clubs and schools) that have volunteered and worked many long hours to make cricket happen.

Our men's and women's teams have had mixed results but certainly the highlight was the Northern Brave (W) making the elimination final for the first time in our history.

Our Northern Māori Wāhine team competed in the first ever Māori Nationals in October 2023 with the tane to compete in their tournament at the start of the 2024/25 summer.

After a significant project to audit all cricket facilities in the region we launched our \$250,000 Regional Facilities Fund to help improve facilities under our Spaces and Places focus. The majority of those funds will be distributed in FY25. We remain thankful for the numerous Regional and District councils that continue to support facilities and access to them by our cricket network.

Counties Manukau Cricket Association competed in the Hawke Cup challenge match, while the wider District Associations competed across the (i) Northern Brave T20 Smash, (ii) Fergus Hickey Rosebowl and (iii) Brian Dunning Trophy, these were in addition to the Northern Districts Regional Rangatahi tournaments and the local colleges competiting across local, regional and even National secondary school tournaments.

We acknowledge the entire cricket community including members, supporters, parents/guardians, coaches, managers, scorers, umpires, match referees, and schoolteachers.

How did we perform?

Amateur Cricket: All annual offerings were completed in alignment with identified goals and/or adapted in accordance with local grassroot participant preferences.

Professional Cricket: All annual offerings were completed in alignment with the required targets and events.

In formulating the service performance data for the period, Northern Districts has exercised considerable judgment in determining the information to present. This decision was based on an evaluation of what data would be most relevant and meaningful to users assessing performance against the objectives. This task posed a challenge due to the wide-ranging nature of Northern Districts' activities and its various funding sources, including government grants. The selection of service performance information was a collaborative effort involving key management personnel at Northern Districts. The most influential judgments that affected the non-financial data displayed were associated with choosing what Northern Districts accomplished during the period – the "what did we do" reported. Northern Districts opted to base its service performance metrics on verifiable data provided to/by New Zealand Cricket . The organisation decided against reporting on performance metrics evaluating the outcomes or impacts of its activities because, currently, such measures are not independently verifiable. It should be noted that the data provided is different to the previous year, as a result of New Zealand Cricket changing the competition database platform. Due to this change, information is now available in different categories and formats. While NZC are committed to evolving the data and insights captured and available, it is presumed that the majority of information now presented will be repeatable moving forward, so long that NZC remains with the current competition provider in PlayHQ.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Northern Districts Cricket Association Incorporated For the year ended 31 July 2024

1. Statement of Accounting Policies

Reporting Entity

Northern Districts Cricket Association Incorporated ("Northern Districts Cricket") is incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908.

Northern Districts Cricket is a public entity for the purposes of financial reporting in accordance with the Financial Reporting Act 2013.

Statement of Compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with New Zealand Generally Accepted Accounting Practice ("NZ GAAP"). They comply with Public Benefit Entity Standards Reduced Disclosure Regime ("PBE Standards RDR") and Public Benefit Entity International Public Sector Accounting Standards ("PBE IPSAS") that have been authorised for use by the External Reporting Board for Not-for-Profit entities.

Northern Districts Cricket is a public benefit not for profit entity and is eligible to apply Tier 2 PBE standards on the basis that it does not have public accountability and is not defined as large.

Measurement Basis

Unless otherwise stated, the measurement base is that of historical cost. Reliance is placed on the fact that Northern Districts Cricket is a going concern.

Functional and presentation currency

The financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars (\$) which is the entity's functional currency, rounded to the nearest dollar.

There has been no change in the functional currency.

Use of judgements and estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the Board and management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

(a) Judgements

Judgements made in applying accounting policies that have had the most significant effects on the amounts recognised in the financial statements is revenue recognition- non-exchange revenue (conditions vs. restrictions).

(b) Assumptions and estimation uncertainties

Assumptions and estimation uncertainties that have a significant risk of resulting in a material adjustment in the year ending 31 July 2024 is the useful life, recoverable amount and depreciation method and rate of property, plant and equipment.

(c) Assumptions on depreciation rate and useful life

Standard industry rates are used for deprecation rates and the useful life of property, plant and equipment which are reassessed annually for any impairment.

(d) Changes in accounting estimates

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements and have been applied consistently by Northern Districts Cricket.

2. Specific Accounting Policies

The following specific accounting policies have been used in preparing these financial statements.

Revenue

Revenue is recognised when the amount of revenue can be measured reliably and it is probable that economic benefits will flow to Northern Districts Cricket and is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

The following specific recognition criteria in relation to Northern Districts Cricket's revenue streams must also be met before revenue is recognised.

Revenue from non-exchange transactions

Non-exchange transactions are those where Northern Districts Cricket receives an inflow of resources but provides no (or nominal) direct consideration in return. With the exception of services-in-kind, inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions are only recognised as assets where both:

- · it is probable that the associated future economic benefit or service potential will flow to Northern Districts Cricket, and
- fair value is reliably measurable.

Inflow of resources from non-exchange transactions that are recognised as assets are recognised as non-exchange revenue, to the extent that a liability is not recognised in respect to the same inflow.

Liabilities are recognised in relation to inflows of resources from non-exchange transactions when there is a resulting present obligation as a result of the non-exchange transactions, where both:

- it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying future economic benefit or service potential will be required to settle the obligation, and
- the amount of the obligation can be reliably estimated.

The following specific recognition criteria in relation to Northern Districts Cricket's non-exchange transaction revenue streams must also be met before revenue is recognised.

Grants from New Zealand Cricket - General Funding and other non-exchange revenue

New Zealand Cricket (NZC) - General Funding and other non-exchange revenue is recognised when the conditions attached to the grant have been complied with. Where there are unfulfilled conditions attached to the grant, the amount relating to the unfulfilled condition is recognised as a liability and released to revenue as the conditions are fulfilled. Stipulations that are 'conditions' specifically require Northern Districts Cricket to return the inflow of resources received if they are not utilised in the way stipulated, resulting in the recognition of a non-exchange liability that is subsequently recognised as non-exchange revenue as and when the 'conditions' are satisfied.

Stipulations that are 'restrictions' that do not specifically require Northern Districts Cricket to return the inflow of resources received if they are not utilised in the way stipulated, do not result in the recognition of a non-exchange liability, resulting in the immediate recognition of non-exchange revenue.

Revenue from exchange transactions

Gate Receipts

Entrance fees for functions and events are recorded as revenue when the function or event takes place and are measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

Commercial Activities

Hosting and hospitality income is recorded as revenue when the function or event takes place and is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

Coaching & facilities

Revenue is recognised immediately where members, groups or individuals purchase specific services relating to coaching and development courses. At year end any revenues for which the conditions of receipt have not been met are then transferred to deferred revenue. Once the conditions have been met, the revenue is recognised in that financial year.

Sponsorship Revenue

Northern Districts Cricket receives cash and non-cash sponsorship in the form of goods and services. The fair value of the cash, goods and services received is recognised as Sponsorship revenue when it is probable that the associated future economic benefit or service potential will flow to the entity, and the fair value is reliably measurable.

Grant Revenue from NZ Cricket, Funding Organisations and Other Grants

Grant revenue, with the exception of NZC General Funding as discussed above, is recognised when the conditions attached to the grant have been complied with. Where there are unfulfilled conditions attaching to the grant, the amount relating to the unfulfilled condition is recognised as a liability and released to revenue as the conditions are fulfilled.

Employee Benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, annual leave and accumulating sick leave are recognised in surplus or deficit during the period in which the employee provided the related services. Liabilities for the associated benefits are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Financial instruments

Northern Districts Cricket initially recognises financial instruments when Northern Districts Cricket becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Derecognition

Northern Districts Cricket derecognises a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or it transfers the rights to receive the contractual cash flows in a transaction in which substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset are transferred or in which Northern District Cricket transfers nor retains substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership and it does not retain control of the financial asset.

Northern District Cricket enters into transactions whereby it transfers assets recognised in its statement of financial position but retains either all or substantially all of the risks and rewards of the transferred assets. In these cases, the transferred assets are not derecognised.

Northern District Cricket derecognises a financial liability when its contractual obligations are discharged or cancelled or expire. Northern District Cricket also derecognises a financial liability when its terms are modified and the cash flows of the modified liability are substantially different, in which case a new financial liability based on the modified terms is recognised at fair value. On derecognition of a financial liability, the difference between the carrying amount extinguished and the consideration paid (including any non-cash assets transferred or liabilities assumed) is recognised in surplus or deficit.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount presented in the statement of financial position when, and only when, Northern Districts Cricket has a legal right to offset the amounts and intends either to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Initial Recognition and Measurement

Trade receivables and debt securities issued are initially recognised when they are originated. All other financial assets and financial liabilities are initially recognised when Northern District Cricket becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

A financial asset or financial liability is initially measured at fair value plus, for an item not at fair value through surplus or deficit,

transaction costs that are directly attributable to its acquisition or issue. At initial recognition, an entity may measure short-term receivables and payables at the original invoice amount if the effect of discounting is immaterial.

Northern District Cricket classifies financial assets, on initial recognition, as measured at: amortised cost for assets where cash flows are solely payments of principal and interest; or fair value through surplus or deficit.

Northern Districts Cricket's financial assets include: receivable from exchange transactions, cash and cash receivables, and equity investment through a managed portfolio. Subsequent measurement is dependent on the classification of the financial instrument, and is specifically detailed in the accounting policies below.

Financial assets at fair value through surplus or deficit

Financial assets at fair value through surplus or deficit include financial assets held for trading and financial assets designated upon initial recognition at fair value through surplus or deficit. Financial assets are classified as held for trading if they are acquired for the purpose of selling or repurchasing in the near term.

Northern District Cricket has designated financial assets from Craig's Investments at fair value through surplus or deficit.

Financial assets at amortised cost

Financial assets at amortised cost are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. After initial recognition, these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any allowance for impairment. The Entity's cash and cash equivalents, debtors and non-equity investments fall into this category of financial instruments.

Financial Liabilities

Financial liabilities are creditors (excluding GST and PAYE). All financial liabilities are initially recognised at fair value (plus transaction cost for financial liabilities not at fair value through surplus or deficit) and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Property, plant and equipment

Items of property plant and equipment are initially measured at cost, except those acquired through non-exchange transactions which are instead measured at fair value as their deemed cost at initial recognition.

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured under the Cost Model which shows initial cost including any expenditure directly attributable to the acquisition, delivery or installation (or fair value for items acquired through non-exchange transactions) less accumulated depreciation and impairment. Northern Districts Cricket's items are subsequently measured in accordance with the Cost Model.

Any gain or loss on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment (calculated as the difference between the net proceeds from disposal and the carrying amount of the item) is recognised in surplus or deficit.

Depreciation is recognised in surplus or deficit on a straight-line or diminishing value basis over the estimated useful lives of each component of an item of property, plant and equipment. Assets under construction are not subject to depreciation.

Depreciation methods, useful lives, and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted if appropriate.

Impairment of non-financial assets

The carrying amounts of Northern Districts Cricket's non-financial assets, other than inventories, are reviewed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, then the asset's recoverable amount is estimated.

Leases

Leases in terms of which Northern Districts Cricket assumes substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership are classified as finance leases.

Operating leases

Leases that are not finance leases are classified as operating leases. Operating leases are not recognised in Northern Districts Cricket's statement of financial position. Payments made under operating leases are recognised in surplus or deficit on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease. Lease incentives received are recognised as an integral part of the total lease expense, over the term of the lease.

Income Tax

Northern Districts Cricket is exempt from Income Tax under section CW46 of the Income Tax Act 2007.

Goods and services tax (GST)

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the Inland Revenue Department is included as part of receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are included in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities, which is recoverable from, or payable to, the Inland Revenue Department is classified as part of operating cash flows.

Equity

Equity is measured as the difference between total assets and total liabilities and is made up of the following components:

Accumulated comprehensive revenue and expense

Accumulated comprehensive revenue and expense is Northern Districts Cricket's accumulated surplus or deficit since its formation.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Short term term deposits, those with original maturities less than three months, are classified as cash equivalents. All other term deposits are included in current investments or, if original maturity is greater than twelve months, non-current investments.

Inventories

Inventories held for consumption in the provision of services that are not sold on a commercial basis are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. For inventory that was acquired through non-exchange transactions, the cost of the inventory is its fair value at the date of acquisition. For inventory held for the distribution or consumption in providing goods and services to be distributed at no charge or for nominal charge, these are measured at cost adjusted for any loss of service potential.

Prepaid Lease Assets

Prepaid Lease Assets are recognised in the Statement of Financial Position and are amortised over the life of the remaining lease.
